Coalition Splits Over Conscription; Early General Election Is Assured

(BORDEN MAY FIRST TRY FOR UNIONIST MINISTRY)

British Launch Offensive Against Sharp Salient of Germans Southeast of Ypres Which Menaces Lille-Gains on Mile Front Made North of Scarpe.

London, June 7.—The British have opened an attack on a ninemile front between Messines and Wytschaete and have taken all their first objectives.

The official statement says that the British progress is being continued and that a number of prisoners have been taken. The text of the official statement follows:

'We attacked at 3:10 a.m. this morning German positions on the Messine-Wytschaete ridge, on a front of over nine miles. We have everywhere captured our first objectives and further progress is reported to be satisfactory along the whole front of attack. Numbers of prisoners are reported already to be reaching the collection stations.'

The new British offensive is against a sharp German salient three miles south of Ypres. For several days the British have maintained a tremendous bombardment for almost thirty miles on this portion of their front. The salient itself is about three miles in width and the same distance in depth. An effective advance in this sector would seriously menace the German hold on Lille, which is about five miles from the nearest British position.

THREE TOWNS TAKEN.

tion. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in a letter to Sir Robert Borden, outlines the latter's proposal which included:

1.—A coalition government. 2.—Passing of the conscription bill. 3.—An appeal to the country by the coalition government; the bill not be enforced in the meantime.

PROPOSALS REJECTED. Sir Wilfrid rejected these proposals on the conscription issue at the same time assuring Sir Robert that he would advise obedience to a conscription measure if the same were approved by the

Sir Robert, in his reply, declared conscription is an absolute essential in any coalition.

MEANS DISSOLUTION. This plainly means dissolution and general election immediately, with jrobably a new unionist party, composed of conscrip-

tionists from both old parties, led probably by Sir Robert Borden. It is expected Borden will press the conscription measure in the commons in the meantime, and whether it passes or not, will forthwith appeal to the country on this issue.

Says Reputation as Minister Injured by Malice.

CORRESPONDENCE IS READ

Minister of Public Works Says He Had No Opportunity to Explain.

TTAWA, June 6.—An investigation the facts on which Mr. Justice Galt ed his condemnation of Hon. Robert

asked for an investigation by a tribunal of high standing.

The prime minister stated that the request had been referred to the minister of justice, who had yesterday submitted a report to the cabinet council. Upon that report an order in council had been passed, naming the two commissioners mentioned as the investigators under the inquiries act.

In addition, Sir Robert Borden said, Hon, Mr. Rogers had asked to be relieved of the administration of his department pending the inquiry. That request had been granted.

Upon the orders of the day being called this afternoon Sir Robert Borden informed the House that a royal commission had been appointed to review and consider the findings and report of Mr. Justice Galt in so far as they reflect upon the honor and integrity of Hon. Robert Rogers.

By the terms of the order-in-council the royal commission is also to report whether in their opinion the findings and observations of Mr. Justice Galt were based upon or supported by any evidence. The two commissioners to conduct this inquiry are Chief Justice Sir Ezekiel McLeod of New Brunswick, and Hon. Louis Tellier, a retired judge of the superior court of the province of Quebec.

In 1882 the Victoria Hospital school had been established, and it was largely through the energy and high ideals of Miss Stanley that it had reached its present high standing.
