Toronto, Feb. 18.—Apparently, the natural gas situation in Western Ontario has improved since the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board on February 8 issued its drastic order, restricting consumption to domestic consumers, as this morning the board issued a supplementary order permitting persons and corporations whose daily average, in November, 1917, did not exceed 10,000 cubic feet, to get gas. The former order of the board is suspended as regards the Glenwood Natural Gas Company, Beaver Oil & Gas Company, Southern Oil and Pipe Line Company, Dominion Natural Gas Company, Manufacturers' Gas Company, and their distributing agents.





NEW YORK, Feb. 17 .- "The British and Canadian recruiting mission is beginning a special drive to get 20,000 men from the United States in the next men from the United States in the next two months," said Gen. W. A. White, head of the mission, today. "At mist sight this seems unnecessary, in view of the fact that the draft recruiting convention is about to be signed between the United States and Great Britan whereby all British subjects in the United States between the ages of 20 and 40 (both inclusive) will be subject to draft into the American army.



Out of this number the British and Canadian recruiting mission has actually enlisted 20,000 man and rejected 15,000.

Dental Supervision.

Through the London Dental Society, Dr. J. A. Bothwell, supervisor of the dental hospital clinics of Toronto, was secured as the chief speaker for closing night of Child Welfare Week, his lecture on "Dental Supervision in Schools" illustrating in a striking manner the close relationship existing between proper care of the teeth and general health, and the supreme importance of dental clinics in connection with medical clinics for children of preschool age.

"The world aim today," said Dr. Bothwell, "in war, in business, in every work undertaken, is to obtain the maximum of efficiency. Mental activity depends largely on physical health, and the best work can only be done when every organ is in good condition. It is said that Napoleon lost the battle of Waterloo because he indulged too heartily in his favorite dish for breakfast that day, fried potatoes.

"According to Dr. Mayo, one of the famous Mayo brothers of Rochester, 80 per cent of ills have their origin above the collar. The teeth dominate the whole well-being of man. A severe toothache is not the supreme penalty for neglect of teeth, though many people hold this mistaken view."

Serious Results.

Capt. Ernest W. Lawrence, M.C., formerly of Watford, and who trained as an officer in this city, later being attached to the 20th Pattallon is in the course.

To illustrate the need of dental attention for children, Dr. Bothwell stated that 90 per cent of school children have defective teeth. Since the dental clinic was established for the Toronto schools four years ago the number of school children suffering from defective teeth has been reduced from 35 per cent to 51 per cent. Toronto now has nineteen dentists giving service in the schools. Dr. Bothwell strongly advocated pre-school clinics, and also the importance of giving the same advantages to children in the rural school districts, so far as care of the teeth is concerned, as those in towns and cities.

Dental Inspection.

"The Ontario Dental Association." he said, "is trying to induce the Government to provide dental inspection and education for the rural districts." So far as clinics for children of pre-school age are concerned, the speaker told of cases which had come under his observation where great suffering resulted, and in one instance, permanent injury, through lack of dental attention in preschool years. A little girl of 7 in Toronto has suffered the loss of part of her lower jaw on one side as a result of an abscess from a tooth, which might have been prevented.

Another case which had come under Dr. Bothwell's observation was one in which marked mental and moral improvement resulted after proper attention to the teeth of the small patient.
