Toronto, June 20.—A few of the sales at the city cattle market today follow: Crawford & Hunslett sold 2 loads of short-keep feeders, averaging 1,100 lbs., at \$4.75 to \$4.90 per cwt. and bought 5 loads of mixed short-keepers and exporters at \$4.45 to \$4.55. R. J. Collins sold 75 cattle, averaging 900 to 1,100 lbs., at \$4.55 to \$4.65 per cwt. J. W. Steele bought 100 cattle at the Park, Blackwell Company at \$4.50 to \$4.65 per cwt. for best butchers, \$3.50 to \$4 for good cows and \$3 to \$3.50 for common. CANADIANS ARE TO THE FORE IN COMMERCIAL LIFE OF CUBA

Rev. J. G. Stuart Finds Them Outstripping American Cousins in Island.

Rev. J. G. Stuart, pastor of Knox Presbyterian Church, South London, who has lately returned from a six-weeks' trip through Cuba, gave a very interesting account of his travels to The Advertiser today. This is Mr. Stuart's third visit to the island, the last of which was made some five years ago, just after the Spanish-American war. Many changes have since taken place, and Cuba seems, in the opinion of Mr. Stuart, destined to play a great part in the commercial life of the North American continent. The features of this development is the fact that the Canadians are to the fore. Several companies of them are located in the island, and they are stripping their American cousins in commerce. They first were seized with the possibilities of the island, and were quick to take advantage of every opening. While the Americans hung back, awaiting what they expected would be the collapse of the Cuban government, the Canadians went about their business, and now control a large portion of the commerce of the country. Outside of the Spanish banks the only one doing business is the Royal Bank of Canada, and it so possessed the confidence of the Government that it gave the bank the distribution of \$300,000,000 granted to the island. The Canadians are to the fore in the development of the fruit industry, which in four or five years will reach tremendous proportions. They are interested in the cattle-ranching, and every year a vast amount of money is turned into the island. The Canadian railway is now in operation, and will be an influence in the future of the island. The road runs through the entire length of the island, and many miles of it through practically a primeval wilderness.

THE NEWS FROM PARIS

Latest Interesting Items From the Beautiful Capital of the French.

Paris, June 20.—Allow me to present to the readers a new Parisian personality: it is that of Monsieur Groult, maker of macaroni. Gifted with a strong artistic sense, and at the same time a clear business head, he has managed to combine the acquisition of a great fortune with judgment in spending it.

For the last twenty years he has been engaged in making a collection of paintings, in which are to be found the works of the masters of the French and English schools of the seventeenth century. Watteau, Fragonard, Boucher, Reynolds, Lawrence, Gainsborough and Turner are a few of those whose masterpieces may be found in the possession of Monsieur Groult. Though these treasures have been for many years collected in the galleries of his private residence, they have never yet been exhibited to the public, but have stood facing the wall and shown only now and then as a treat for some particularly appreciative group of friends.

Now Monsieur Groult, fired with enthusiasm over his purchase of King Charles X's little house in the Bois de Boulogne, has decided to transfer to all his artistic possessions, and to there a museum to which an admission fee will be charged. The funds raised in this manner will go toward creating at Bagatelle this historic resort into a music hall or a garage for automobiles.

Paris thus, in a single day almost, finds at the head of its artistic circles a great leader and a thorough connoisseur, to whom money alone cannot confer the honor of a gentleman and an artist. We have no kings now in France to be patrons of art, and Monsieur Groult, with the encouragement given to his intellectual pursuits by the owner of a macaroni factory.

For the first time in twenty years Paris has had a season of Italian opera. Notwithstanding the high patronage which it enjoyed, the opera was not a success. The company was generally considered to be good, and such artists as Caruso and Cavarini were greatly appreciated by us, as such can be appreciated by the Parisian public. The modern Italian composers, such as "Puccini," "Verdi," "Mascagni," "Zucchi," by Leon Cavallo, are absolutely worthless. High Parisian society have caught on, but it will not be so again, and if Monsieur Sanzago, of Milan, the impresario, objects that he is greatly obliged to listen to the opera of the modern productions which as musical director he has been foolish enough to push, he is greatly mistaken. The new music is uninteresting and disconcerting, badly orchestrated, and badly thought out, and taken all in all it is a social-climbing art. It will not be so again, assisting at its glorification. Let Monsieur Sanzago bring us next year some of the immortal works of Bellini, of Rossini and of Verdi, and he will be welcome, otherwise, let him stay at home. Paris has been duped once; it shall not be so again.

For the last eight days France has counted one more among the aspirants to her hand. The latest pretender is Monsieur Bertaux, ex-banker, thirty times millionaire, and once minister of war. He has been declaring through the medium of the papers, which are devoted to him, that he aspires to become master of the republic.

Monsieur Bertaux having so far seemed to possess all the ambitions, and without exception having realized them, we are obliged to take what he now says seriously. This financier understands the value of money and realizes its irresistible empire. He has made use of it freely enough to clear the road of his political ambition. If one is to believe public rumor, he has already lent more than ten million francs among the members of Parliament, and must not be forgotten that in France it is Parliament which directly elects the presidents of the republic.

And after all, why not Monsieur Bertaux as well as Monsieur Fallieres or Monsieur Loubet? He has an important way of disregarding public opinion which rather pleases me. Let us honor Monsieur Bertaux and vote for him.

A proposed marriage, which is causing considerable comment, is that of Prince Loches Radziwill with the daughter of Comte and Comtesse Alfred de Gramont. Like young Prince Roland Bonaparte, Prince Loches Radziwill is the son of a daughter of Monsieur Blanc. Taking into consideration the sensation which was caused last winter by the divorce between the parents of Prince Loches Radziwill, his marriage with Mademoiselle de Gramont is causing considerable surprise.

I hasten to say, however, that the young couple are themselves altogether charming, and that they are marrying for love of each other, and not to please their parents. Any gossip, therefore, connected with their family can really not affect

dustry is becoming of great importance. The Canadians were the first to take advantage of this, and their orchards are just now beginning to bear. The cattle-raunching is growing, some Western Canadian people being prime movers in this respect.

Some idea may be gained of the richness of the island by the fact that in two years the Government has paid the interest on \$30,000,000, given to its debtors. The Canadians have been doing something which the Spaniards have never built—spent enormous sums on public improvements and still had \$11,000,000 left. The Americans, however, are beginning to realize the richness of the country, and are pouring in in great numbers, buying all the land they can lay their hands on. The island is greatly in value during the past year in consequence.

When asked if he thought the Cubans capable of self-government, Mr. Stuart replied that the best evidence of that was the fact that they had governed themselves. He paid a tribute to President Palma, whose government, he said, was safe and businesslike. He had a good grasp of the situation, and was energetic and resourceful. The civil government was also very good, the cities being clean, well-lighted, and the sanitary conditions, of course, it must be admitted that the Americans during their two years' rule had done a great deal of good. A good example, and made the cities of Cuba models of administration during their regime. President Palma will no doubt do a great deal of good.

To the grand old soldier, Maximilian Gomez, who died lately, Mr. Stuart paid a glowing tribute. The finest soldier Cuba has ever produced, he had a handful of patriots and marched through the country, destroying and looting. They are interested in the Cubans' soldiers to rout, whose retreat was as much feared as his marches, who defied Spain and her legions no wonder he was the national hero of the plucky islanders. Gomez fought hard and long for Cuba's liberty, and he died in the cause of his country. He was a noble and a noble among the nations, prosperous and happy. He would undoubtedly have been a candidate for president at the last election, and would have been elected. His death was much lamented, and deep sorrow was universally expressed.

The state is hopeful, the prospects bright, and the Canadians are not to be left out of the picture. They will make a great amount of money.

The spring flower show of the London Horticultural Society opened today in the city hall, and it is expected that a large crowd will visit it this afternoon and evening. The exhibit of cut flowers is very fine, and includes some of the most beautiful specimens known to floriculture. All the exhibitors of former years are represented, and the interest taken by flower-lovers in the show is also keen. On the tables, in sparkling bottles of water, are to be seen some of the daintiest and most inviting of the rose family, ranging from the rich scarlet, double rose, to the dainty, cultured pink of the single-petaled variety. Intermingled with these beautiful hundreds of warm-colored Spanish Iris, and blushing in pink and white. Then there are to be seen some of the finest peonies grown in Canada today. There is no admission fee, though those who are so inclined may be seen such as the cost of holding the exhibition.

Prices ruled at 16c to 16 1/2c per pound. Eggs are firm at 15 1/2c per dozen; wholesale, quite a few sales were made at 15c per dozen by the basket.

Potatoes—The demand is slow; quantity offered is small, but sufficient for all requirements; most of the sales are made at 7c to 7 1/2c per bag.
Poultry—A good number of loads of \$2 per barrel or 6c to 8c per pair. Strawberries are scarce at 12c to 14c.
