PLAYING ON TRAINS

Cost This Poor Boy His Life at Comber.

The adjourned inquest on the remains of the late Almer Victor Loyd, the lad who was killed on the M. C. R., at Comber, on Sunday, was held in the town hall. The train crew gave evidence, but none saw the accident or observed the boy on the train. Little Florence Plant and Councilor Jas. H. Ainlie testified concerning the finding of the body, and Masters Leslie Hatcher, Cecil Clark, Roy Clark and Clinton Kerr, companions of the unfortunate lad, gave evidence as to seeing him board a train, but never saw him after. The jury brought in a verdict that deceased came to his death by being run over by Ballantyne's extra west bound M. C. R. freight, leaving Comber on Sunday, May 6th, 1900, at 12:15 p. m., and that no blame is attached to any one. The jury recommended that the railway company be more stringent in future with boys jumping on and off trains.

IN TWO MONTHS' TIME, Predictions are Made That Roberts Will Soon be in Pretoria.

Kroonstadt May be Occupied by the British Before Monday—Boers Still Commandeering.

London, May 11.—Members of the House of Commons were freely betting in the lobbies last evening that Lord Roberts would be in Pretoria in two months. The ministerialists are building confident hopes upon the comprehensive plans he has communicated to the War Office. Predictions are definitely made that he will enter Kroonstadt next Monday, and it is believed his advance is probably already reconnoitering the vicinity of Ventersburg, where the hill country begins again.

Beyond Kroonstadt is an intricate and difficult country, and if the Boers should elect to fight, it is possible they could check the passage of the British until Lord Roberts' numerous cavalry had had time to ride around their flank and threaten their rear.

From 15,000 to 20,000 is the highest estimate of the Boers under the present command of Gen. Botha, who is said to have 46 guns. Gen. Botha and Gen. De Wet are reported to have quarreled.

Lord Roberts is pressing hard after this force, with 35,000 men and 140 guns, and 20,000 more men are easily available.

President Steyn, with 10,000 men, is reported to have been east of Thabanchu yesterday (Thursday) noon, and a battle was then imminent. The advance troops of Gen. Ruddle and Gen. Brabant were being fired on.

According to advices from Durban, dated Thursday, Gen. Buller's army is "showing activity," but a complete news embargo is imposed upon the correspondents with him.

New Zealand scouts burned the homestead of a farmer named Greyling in whose house arms were found at Deering.

During a concert for the relief of the sufferers from the English strike explosion, even Saturday evening at Pretoria in the Gaiety theatre, the doors were suddenly closed and every man in the audience was commandeered. All the horses were taken from the conveyances outside.

President Kruger has released the Daily Mail correspondents, Messrs. Hainwell and Hofmeyer. Yesterday the foreign merchants at Lorenzo Marquez held an indignation meeting to protest against the new regulations whereby blankets, clothing and "bully" beef are declared contraband.

The alarmist tone of Lord Salisbury's Prime Minister in the West-nesday has been much discussed in the lobbies of the parliament and the impression is that the apprehensions of the premier are even more serious than he expressed. His utterances are ascribed to the recent successes of the nationalist in France, hatred of England being one of the weapons of the campaign. The revival of military glory, one of the ideals set up in France, is regarded as dangerous to England. The Times publishes a letter from Bloemfontein, describing the Koorn

BRITISH CANNON SUPERIOR TO ANY IN THE WORLD.

At the banquet of the Iron and Steel Institute in London, George J. Goschen, first lord of the admiralty, responding to the toast "Army and Navy," said the government fully recognized that the finer troops sent out to battle for the country the greater was the obligation to provide for them the best means of success.

Therefore, he continued, they had not forgotten and must not forget the manufacturers of armor plate and of implements of war and other scientists whom they had pressed into the ranks to aid in solving the terrible problem they had to face.

"We have formidable competitors," he said, "in Herr Krupp and in the works at Le Creusot and in the United States, but we may rely upon the inventive genius and pertinacity of English manufacturers and scientists to secure results which are so vital to the British Empire."

THE GOVERNMENT OF PORTO RICO.

The Government of the Island of Porto Rico is to be exercised by a Governor, an Executive Council and a House of Delegates. The Governor and Executive Council are to be appointed by the President; the House of Delegates is to be elected by the people. The Governor is vested with the general powers of a Governor of a Territory of the United States.

They will consider the advisability of making pound and a half loaves to compete with the London bread. The bread-makers were considering the advisability of doing this some time ago but the expense in buying new pans deterred them. Now, however, they claim that they will have to do it. ADVANCE GOES ON

Roberts' Cavalry Only 22 Miles From Kronstadt
Main Force Eleven Miles Further Away—Routed Boer Army Demoralized.
London, May 11.—Lord Roberts enters the War Office from Riet Spruit, under date of May 10, evening, as follows:
"We have had a successful day and have driven the enemy from point to point. French, with Porter's and Dickson's brigades of cavalry and Hutton's mounted infantry, crossed the Zand at Vermenten's kraal and then worked around in a northeasterly direction to Mastachappi, being opposed continuously by the enemy. Pole-Carew's division and Gordon's brigade, augmented by 'J' battery of the Royal Horse artillery, and by Henry's and Ross' mounted infantry, crossed the river by a drift near the railway bridge. My quarters accompanied this force."
"With the infantry portion we are eight miles north of the river. The cavalry and mounted infantry are at Ventersburg Road station, and Tucker's division is at Deelfontein. Ian Hamilton's force and Broadwood's cavalry brigade were using for the crossing roads near Ventersburg when I last heard from them. Hamilton's column met with stubborn resistance, and Smith-Dorrien's brigade was engaged for some hours in protecting the rear and flank of his force."
"The only casualties reported at present are: Killed, rank and file, 4; wounded, 5. No returns yet received from the cavalry or Hamilton's force."
So quickly has Lord Roberts advanced that his cavalry is only 22 miles from Kronstadt, while the main army is only 11 miles behind them. Hence, in about a day, the British will be within striking distance of the Orange Free State headquarters. The critics differ widely in opinions as to whether any determined stand will be made there by the Boers.

London, May 11.—A special from East Spret, dated May 10, describing the successful crossing of the Zand river, says:
"Gen. Hamilton's scouts had on two previous days ascertained the Boer position, and strength. On Wednesday night the Cheshire regiment crossed the river, entrenched themselves and prepared to hold the passage for the regiment following them."
At daybreak on Thursday the main body crossed at two or three points. The mounted infantry were then in action, driving off the advanced Boers preparatory to the general advance. The movement the Boer right first gave way, but Tucker and Hamilton had a tougher task on the left. The Boers had, in fact, been working with great determination; but the British worked up closer and closer, their guns meantime firing incessantly.

The East Lancashire and Sussex regiments by 11 o'clock had worked well to the front. The order was given, and like a flash the two regiments sprang forward, the British working with great determination; but the British worked up closer and closer, their guns meantime firing incessantly.

The advanced line was now within 1,200 yards of the Boer main trench, the latter were already losing heart from the demonstration on their flank, but they kept up a rapid, though wild, fire.

At this moment the final charge was ordered, and away went the Lancashire, and the Sussex regiment again; but the Boers could not stand, and they fairly bolted, and the route of the Boers along the whole line was now judge Rankin.

NOW JUDGE RANKIN.

The Well-known Chatham Q. C., Appointed Drainage Referee.
J. B. Rankin, Q. C., this morning received the commission appointing him drainage referee for the province. It has been known for some time that the appointment would go either to Mr. Rankin or A. H. Clarke, Q. C. of Windsor, both of whom were known to be thoroughly conversant with the drainage laws of Ontario. The Ontario Government, however, at first preferred the absurdly small remuneration of \$2,000 a year, for which sum they expected the appointee to give up his private practice. This Mr. Rankin, it is understood, refused to do. Then they offered him the judgeship at the same salary, he to be allowed to retain his private practice except in the matter of drainage cases. On these conditions Mr. Rankin agreed to accept the office. At a meeting of the Cabinet in Toronto on Tuesday his appointment was duly confirmed. The selection of Mr. Rankin does credit to the Government. He is eminently qualified for the position of drainage referee, having had a very extended experience in cases of the description which will now come under his judicial notice. There will be no division of opinion concerning his fitness and ability and all sections of the community will join in congratulating him on his elevation.

VERY FINE CONCERT.

The concert at Christ Church lecture hall last night, under the direction of Prof. E. J. Forsythe, the energetic and efficient leader of the choir, drew a large and well-organized audience, who were thoroughly delighted with the program presented. H. Ruthven Macdonald, of London, formerly of Chatham, was the star of the evening. Mr. Macdonald has a magnificent voice, and last night he displayed it to the best advantage. The audience was very appreciative, so much so indeed that they treasured on good nature. Nine times Mr. Macdonald sang, and then he gave the audience a recitation. There were other capable and accomplished musicians, however, who also assisted in making the affair a success. J. W. Wilson gave an excellent flute solo, Henry McCaw a very fine violin solo, Mrs. John Cooper a much appreciated vocal selection, and Miss McCosh and Miss Barassin recitations which were much appreciated. Prof. Forsythe also joined Mr. Macdonald in a duet. One of the features of the program was the quartette by Mrs. John Cooper and Misses Blight, Simpson and Ross. It proved a delightful number.

A TURNCOAT VOTE

Is all That is Keeping the Prince Edward Ministry in Power.
Turbulent Scenes in the House—The Premier Makes Threats
Charlottetown, P. E. I., May 11.—The House met at noon yesterday with closed doors while reading the journals. The journals read that Mr. Wise had been removed from the House and placed behind the bars. The premier's motion was carried by 14 to 12, Pineaue again voting with the government."

HE WAS DEPORTED

Young Canadian Took His Wife and Family to the States

But the Authorities There Promptly Ran Him Out of the Country Again.

Ottawa, May 11.—In the Commons yesterday Mr. Taylor, the Opposition whip, drew the attention of the Government to the deportation of a Canadian from the United States under the United States alien labor law. He read a letter from a young man in Ogdensburg, N.Y., setting forth that a Canadian named John White, employed in a store in Ogdensburg, after he had brought his wife and family over, had been deported because of the Canadian law of imprisonment. The writer thought it was "an opportune time to make those howling Grits declare themselves on this question." Mr. Taylor said that the Government had placed on the statute books what was called an "alien" labor law, for it was nothing else and never intended to be anything else. It was arranged that while the international negotiations were in progress there should be mutual suspension of the alien law on both sides, but here were the Americans enforcing theirs, while the Canadian Government allowed Americans to come to Canada every day to obtain employment. Had the bill which he himself introduced been allowed to pass it would be of some use.

The Prime Minister replied that this was the second instance which had been brought to his notice of a Canadian subject being deported under color of enforcing the alien labor law. The other case had been brought up by the leader of the Opposition. The latter case was certainly one which called for diplomatic action and protest to the Government at Washington, who were going altogether beyond the scope of the United States alien labor law, to the injury of Canadian subjects.

BLUFF A FAILURE.

How a Woman Nearly Succeeded in Getting \$35.

Sharp Lawyer Outwitted Her to His Client's Great Relief.

A prominent and wealthy farmer, resident of one of the neighboring townships, came into this city on sport in about some few weeks ago. He promptly fell in with two of Chatham's fair dames with corrupted reputations and they proceeded to divorce him from his long green bank notes and incidentally at the same time to make him forget in the oblivion of pleasure certain portions of the 20th chapter of Exodus. This is quite surprising since he is a leading church member. Be that as it may, however, this sportive benedict in company with the two divinites went out to a house on Park avenue where an evening of pleasure was spent. All went merry as a marriage bell. In the morning the rural visitor wended his way homeward and thought no more of his evening's sport. A few days afterwards he was horrified to receive a letter from the woman of the house he had visited stating that one of his enamored dames had swiped a diamond worth \$35 and unless the gem was returned or the loss made good there would be trouble. The venerable sport was not so much surprised at his companions being accused of theft as he was troubled lest his wife should discover his perfidy and he should be disgraced in the community. He hitched up his fast road horse and drove to this city to consult a lawyer. The lawyer said it was clearly a case of blackmail and he could easily settle it.

"Take the \$35 and give it to the woman," cried the terrified victim. "Give her anything she asks and avoid the exposure."

The lawyer took the money and went out to interview the hostess above referred to. He talked police court, how necessary it would be to call in the police, and appeared anxious for anything but a settlement. What he harped on was the necessity for a thorough investigation, with the object of bringing to justice the guilty ones.

The lawyer diagnosed the case correctly. The woman got frightened. She didn't want any exposure. She admitted there had been no theft and no diamond to steal. She simply wanted to play the old chap she said for a "sucker" to the tune of \$35. She thought that was about his limit or she would have gone higher.

After a long interview the lawyer finally consented to let the matter rest if she would sign a document setting forth the facts. This she was only too willing to do if nothing more would be said about it.

Now, here is the extraordinary part of the whole story which is a true one. The lawyer never charged the woman a cent for drawing up that legal document. He came away without even getting a chattel mortgage on her furniture. What is more, he went back to his client and returned him \$20 out of the \$35 keeping only \$10 for his services. The idea of both the woman and the countryman escaping from a lawyer at the sacrifice of \$10 may raise some question about the genuineness of this story but it happens to be true for all that.
