COUNTY JUDGES

Major Hugh Clark has introduced a bill into the legislature which is designed to limit the number of county judges. The promoter of the bill says this of it in his paper, the Kincardine Review: "In most of the counties where there are two judges there is need for only one. Perhaps no statute has had so much juggling done to it as this feature of the local courts act. When the Conservatives were in power in Ottawa, the Liberals in Toronto amended the act so as to limit junior judges to counties having over 80,000 of a population. (It should be stated that while the province has this power, the Dominion Government has the appointing of judges.) When the Liberal's got into power at Ottawa, the Liberal Government at Toronto added a clause to the act stating that where the commission of a judge recited that the county to which he was appointed had a population of 80,000, that that recital was sufficient, it must be presumed to be true and could not be controverted. This clause allowed their friends at Ottawa to appoint several junior judges in counties that did not need two

"Another section of the act allows two judges in all counties having cities. Mr. Clark's amendment reduces this to counties having cities of over 50,000 population. This will give two judges to York, Wentworth and Carleton, and to none others.'

# How Red Rose Tea is Grown

TUESDAY, MARCH 27, 1906.

TEA is a native plant of Northern India. Transplanted to Ceylon it lost much of its strength and richness, but gained in fragrance and delicacy. That is why Ceylon tea is not a strong tea.





It is probably not expedient to attempt the withdrawal of the rights thus utilized. The commercial value of the waterpower at Niagara Falls is very great, but if compared with values set aside by wealthy communities elsewhere for

There is no special ceremony among the Alaskan Eskimos connected with marriage. If the parties are young, it is largely arranged by the parents. Among some of the tribes the husband joins the wife's family and is expected to hunt and fish for them. If he refuses to give his father-in-law the furse he takes he is driven out of the house, and some one else more active and obedient is installed as husband of the girl. Sometimes a young woman has in turn Sometimes a young woman has in turn ten or twelve husbands before she finally settles down to a permanent married state. Under this condition of things it is not strange that the wo-men become indifferent and often un-true to their husbands. Love and mu-

true to their husbands. Love and mutual affection have so little to do with the marital relation that occasionally husbands and wives are interchanged. For instance, in one of the northern villages dwelt a family of expert fishers and another that was successful at hunting the reindeer. One year the fisherman thought he would like to hunt reindeer. Finding that his neighbor would like to try fishing, they exchanged wives for the summer. The woman who was a good hunter went off with the fisherman, and vice versa. Upon returning home in the fall they returned to their respective husbands. Eskimo wives are frequently beaten by their husbands and sometimes to escape abuse commit suicide. Occa-

by their husbands and sometimes to escape abuse commit suicide. Occasionally a wife resists and if physically stronger thrashes the husband. Polygamy prevails to a limited extent. Frequently the second wife is looked upon and treated as a servant in the family.

Among Eškimos, the same as among all uncivilized people, woman's is a hard lot, and yet, notwithstanding all her disadvantages, she has a voice in both village and family affairs. The husband neither makes an important bargain nor plans a trip without consulting and referring to his wife. Large families of children are the exception; few have above four. The drudgery of women is such that they sometimes destroy their offspring, particularly if the child be a girl. If a family is very poor they sometimes give away to childless neighbors all their children but one. Thus during childhood a boy may pass from one to another, to be adopted by several families in turn. Children are also sold by their parents, the usual market price of a child being a sealskin bag of oil or an old suit of clothes. The children are given names



# THE FENIAN RAID VETERANS

Get Scant Sympathy from the Government Benches

GOVERNMENT MAJ. IS 50

Ottawa, March 27.—Quite a debate sprung up at the evening session of the House yesterday upon a resolution offered by Mr. Monk to the effect tion offered by Mr. Monk to the effect that the Canadian Government recognize in some substantial manner the services rendered by the volunteers in the Fenian raids of 1866 and 1870. Mr. Monk advocated the resolution, as did also Mr. Barker (Hamilton).

Sir Frederick Borden was inclined to think that the danger to the country from the Fenian raid was largely magnified.

Col. Worthington (Sherbrooke), Dr. Daniel (St. John), Dr. Walsh (Quebec), Mr. Bergeron (Beauharnois), Col. Sam Hughes (Victoria), and the Conservatives generally favored the resolution.

Mr. Logan (Lib. N.S.), said that the Government could be trusted to do what was right, but the resolution was political, and he would vote against it, although he was in sympathy with any effort to aid the veterans of the Fenian raid

Messrs. Telfer and Stewart (Liberals) questioned the sincerity of the Opposition, and announced that they

Opposition, and announced that they would support the Government.
Upon division the vote stood: Yeas 40, nays 90.
The Rain Making Contract.
Hon. George E. Foster entertained the House of Commons in the afternoon by a bantering speech concerning the recent contract made by the Yukon council with a reinvalue from Califor. council with a rainmaker from California, Chas. N. Hatfield, who is to receive \$10,000 if he produces sufficient rainfall for placer mining during the four months commencing May 1. Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that he

knew nothing of this contract. He suggested, however, that Mr. Hatfield should go to North Toronto and furnish the hon. member the cold water for which, at one time, he had developed a penchant.
Mr. R. L. Borden thought it strange

Mr. R. L. Boréen thought it strange that the Government had no knowledge that this contract was made last year by the Yukon council.

Hon. Mr. Oliver, Minister of the Interior, questioned the propriety of the Government interfering with the council. He favored autonomy.

Mr. Borden answered that if the Government favored autonomy, why

Government favored autonomy, why was the council appointed from Ottawa instead of being elected by the

instead of being elected by the people?

Policy For Waterpowers.

A Federal policy for waterpowers, which will prevent the export of energy developed at Niagara to an extent to starve Canadian industries, was an acunced by the Minister of Public Works. The matter arose in discussion on the motion by Mr. Monk for a return describing all waterpowers inder Dominion control. Mr. Hyman said there was no doubt of Federal control over the export of electric power. The Government had therefore laid down a policy to govern their course, several applications being now before them. Right to export would only be granted subject to revocation at short notice; there would be no claim against either Provincial or Dominion Government arising out of such revocation, and the companies would be subject to such rules and regulations as the Government saw fit to impose. Action would also be taken to prevent spoliation of the scenit beauty of the Falls.
