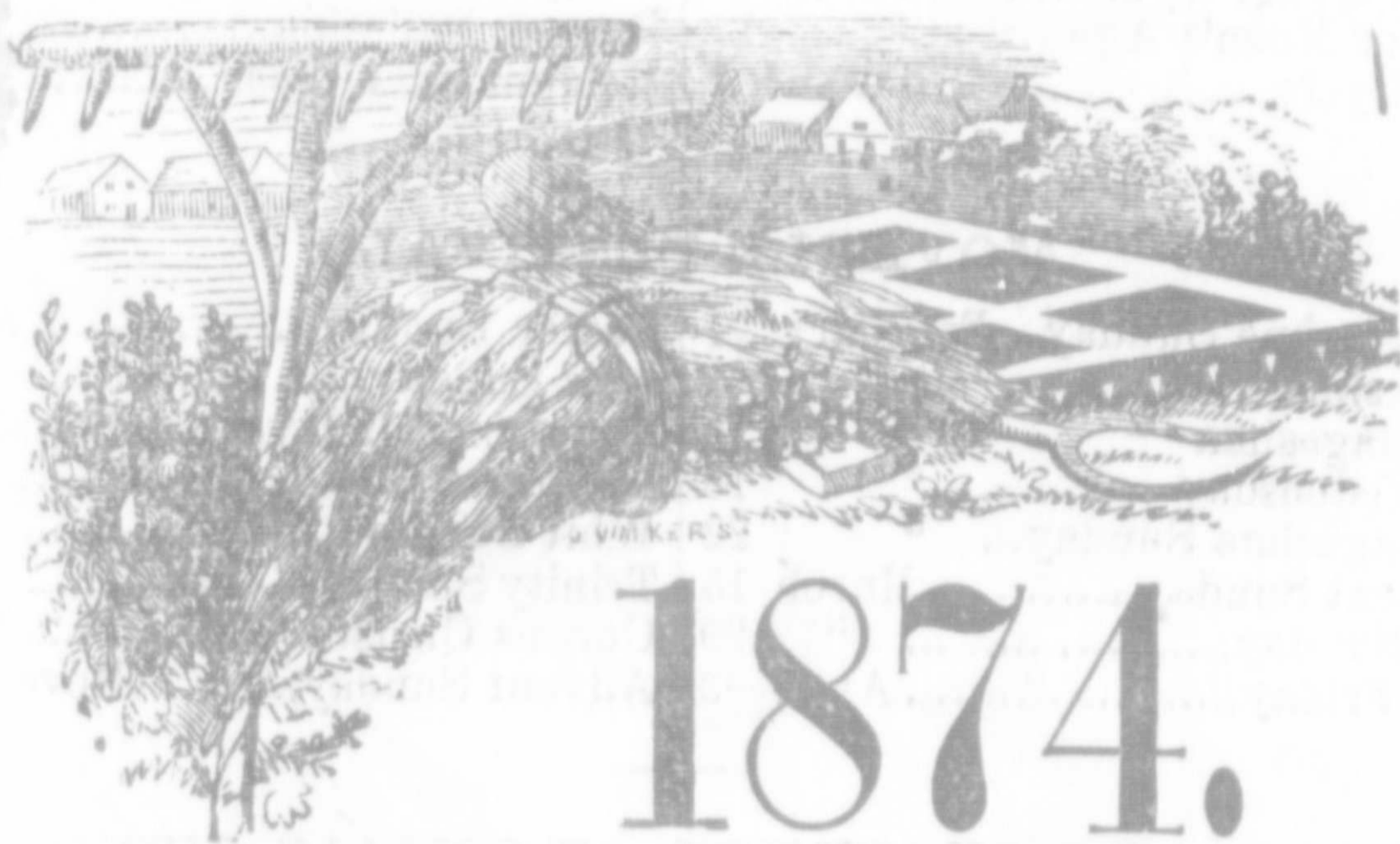

EXPLANATION OF CALENDAR PAGES.

The Publisher of this Almanac, with a view to increase its circulation and usefulness, has adapted its calculations for the whole country. The Moon's changes are given for five different places, viz. : Quebec, Montreal, Kingston, Toronto, and London. The rising and setting of the Sun are given for Montreal and Toronto. The rising and setting of the Moon are given with sufficient exactness for all practical purposes. The weather prognostications are again calculated according to the table of the celebrated Dr. Herschel; and for extraordinary accuracy this Almanac retains its wonderful popularity.

CHRONOLOGICAL CYCLES.

JANUARY.—A very excellent writer in the *Canada Farmer* says:—A very common mistake is that of supposing that any sort of land will grow wheat. There are adaptations of soil that ought to be carefully studied, so that each variety may be devoted to such purposes as best suit it. While most farm products have a faculty of accommodating themselves to circumstances, and will grow, after a fashion, anywhere, it will pay to make everything as favorable as possible to their best development. In selecting a piece of ground for wheat, the two extremes of light and stiff clay should be avoided, and a good strong loam chosen. Providence has given us abundance of the very best wheat-land in the world, but there are soils not so well adapted for it whereon other products should be cultivated.

**MARCH.**—The *Boston Cultivator* gives a capital receipt, which we gladly copy for the use of our farmers. Thus Professor Johnson recommends for fertilizing purposes, to mix one bushel of salt and two bushels of dry lime under cover, and allow them to decompose gradually, thus forming chemical union. The mixture should be made nine weeks before use, or, still better, three months; turning over the heap occasionally. This salt and lime mixture when applied at the rate of 20 or 30 bushels to the acre, forms an excellent top-dressing for many crops. It acts powerfully on the vegetable matter of soils. Fifty-six bushels applied to turnips have produced as large a crop as barn-yard manure. It is destructive to grubs and insects in the soil. **JULY.** The *Western Rural* gives a curious experiment respecting tomatoes. A correspondent says:—It occurred to me that tomatoes might be grown from cuttings of the bearing vine, in the fall, and wintered in greenhouses, in a bearing condition. Accordingly, I made several cuttings and potted them in four-inch pots, when well rooted, and have since continued them in a bearing condition. They are now in fruit (date not given.) The object is to have early bearing plants for spring by the time they can go out of doors, instead of waiting for the fruit of seedlings. The experiment thus far is a success. Strong and thrifty and more stocky than when grown from seed. They are disposed to branch at the axil of each leaf, and need pruning and cutting back. No plant roots easier from cuttings than the tomatoe.

It would have been, but for the fact that there are many who would rather experiment than accept the facts of long experience. They then say experience has taught me that seeding on spring grain is very unreliable for clover. Well, but that was known fifty years ago, and why experiment about it. On lands where winter grain can be grown, and you desire to raise clover there, be sure you sow your clover seed at the same time. As to grasses as a general rule they should be sown in the fall. This is the established practice in England, and the same is followed by the best practical farmers on this continent. Canadian farmers cannot far err in following these examples.

SEPTEMBER.—We give here a good receipt to clean a rusty plough. Take a quart of water, and pour slowly into it half a pint of sulphuric acid. The mixture will become quite warm from chemical action, and this is the reason why the acid should be poured slowly into the water, rather than the water into the acid. Wash with it, and let it remain on the iron till it evaporates. Then wash it again. The object is to give the acid time to dissolve the rust. Then wash with water and you will see where the rust spots are. Apply some more acid and rub over those spots with a brick. The acid and the scouring will remove most of the rust. Then wash the mould board thoroughly with water to remove all the acid, and rub it dry. Brush it over with petroleum or other oil, and let it be till spring. A little extra care, at the time of using, would render this prescription unnecessary.

OCTOBER.—It has been stated in the West, that there had never been such a failure of seed corn in coming up as in the present season. The observation of many has shown that corn that had been selected, and hung away from all heat, had its vitality destroyed by freezing. Corn husked and thrown on the floor, and covered with snow, had grown, at least seven-eighths of it. Corn left in the shock in the field had produced, while corn put in the crib had failed. It is therefore pretty well established that all seed corn, if husked, should never be allowed to lie on the ground over night; and that corn that is to be hung up in a cold room for seed should never be husked until the planting time arrives. As the facts here given are well attested, it will be quite proper to follow this light of experience. It will cost nothing, and cannot lead astray.

NOVEMBER.—How to cook a beef steak becomes a very grave question to all of us who have eaten so many tough and tasteless ones. We read of one cooked thus: He took the thin long-handled frying pan from its nail and putting it on the stove heated it quite hot. In this he put the pieces of steak previously pounded, but did not put a particle of butter in the frying pan, and did not salt his steak. He allowed the steak to merely glaze over, and then turned it quickly to the other side—turning it over several times until it was done. Four minutes were not employed in the operation, but I think I never ate a juicier piece of steak. When it was done, it was laid on a plate previously warmed, and was buttered and salted, and set a moment in the hot oven. Allowing the steak just to heat on each side helped to retain all its juices, while the salt drew them out.

*Home made Yeast.*—Take a handful of loose hops (a pinch only of pressed ones), and tie in a bit of muslin; boil twenty minutes in two quarts of water; take them out, and throw in four sliced potatoes, and boil till soft; strain all through a sieve, and add half a tea cup of salt, and the same of brown sugar; scald these and let it stand till lukewarm; add sufficient yeast to rise it. When quite light, or when it ceases to bubble up, put it in a jug or covered jar, set it in a cool place, and it will keep good a fortnight in hot weather, and a month or more in cold.

*To preserve Eggs.*—The most convenient and satisfactory way to keep eggs fresh that we have ever tried, is to punch numerous holes in a tin pail, fill it with fresh eggs, lower the pail with the eggs into a kettle of melted tallow, which is as hot as can be without burning one's fingers when thrust into the liquid; then lift the pail out quickly and the melted tallow will flow out, leaving a thin coating over every egg. Let the eggs be removed as soon as possible from the pail, and be placed on the end of a keg or barrel, which should be kept in a cool cellar until wanted for use. As the eggs are so much colder than the melted tallow, a thin pelicle of cold tallow will be formed almost instantly, which will render the shell almost impervious to air.

*Cane-bottomed Chairs.*—To clean cane-bottom chairs, turn up the chair bottom, and with hot water and sponge wash the canework well, so that it may become completely soaked. Should it be very dirty you must add soap. Let it dry in the open air, if possible, or in a place where there is a thorough draft, and it will become as light and firm as when new, providing that it has not been broken.

*Apple Marmalade.*—Peel and core two pounds sub-acid apples, and put them in an enamelled saucepan with one pint of sweet cider, or half a pint of pure wine, and one pound of crushed sugar, and cook them by a gentle heat three hours or longer, until the fruit is very soft, and then squeeze it, first through a collander, and then through a sieve. If not sufficiently sweet add powdered sugar to suit your taste, and put away in jars made air-tight with a piece of wet bladder. It is delicious when eaten with cream or milk.

MONEY ORDERS.

Every money order office in Canada issues money orders on every other money order office in Canada as well as on every money order office in the United Kingdom. Every money order office in the United Kingdom also issues money orders on every money order office in Canada.

MONEY ORDERS IN ONTARIO AND QUEBEC.

All the money order Post Offices in Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick are authorized to draw money orders on each other for any sum up to \$100, and for as many orders of \$100 each, as the applicant may require, upon the following terms, viz., in Ontario and Quebec.

MONEY ORDERS ON THE LOWER PROVINCES.

The money order offices in Canada draw also upon all money order offices in Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. Orders, like those of the United Kingdom, are made payable in sterling money, and for sums up to £10 sterling. The terms are :

For orders upon the Lower Provinces the same rates of commission as upon money orders drawn by Ontario or Quebec upon offices within those Provinces.

For money orders on the other Provinces the terms are :

- For orders up to £5, 25 cents.
- “ over £5 and up to £10, 50 cents.

No half cents can be introduced into orders.

No money order exceeding \$100 in amount can be granted in any office in Canada ; but Postmasters are at liberty to grant two or more orders for \$100, or for any lesser sum.—They cannot, however, grant two or more orders for sums of or under \$30 on the same day to the same applicant in favor of the same payee.

SAVINGS BANK DEPARTMENT.

The Postmaster General will receive at any of the Post Office Savings Banks, deposits paid to the postmasters by persons wishing to place their money in the Government Savings Banks.

2. The direct security of the Dominion is given by the Statute for all deposits made.

3. Any person may have a deposit account. Any deposits will be received daily, during the ordinary hours of post office business, of any number of dollars, from \$1 up to \$300, the total amount which can be received from a depositor in any one year, except in cases to be specially authorized by the Postmaster General.

4. The postmasters of the offices named will act as agents for the receipt of the money deposited for transmission to the Postmaster-General, and for the payment by the Postmaster-General of money withdrawn by depositors. They will also furnish all information with respect to the mode of depositing or withdrawing money.

5. Each depositor will be supplied with a pass-book, and the sums paid in, or withdrawn, will be entered therein by the postmaster receiving or paying the same. In addition a direct receipt for each amount paid in, will be sent to the depositor, from the Postmaster-General, and the Postmaster-General will issue a cheque, payable at any Post Office Savings Bank desired, for any sum withdrawn.

6. Every depositor's account will thus be kept with the Postmaster-General, and a depositor may pay into his or her account with the Post Office Savings Bank, at any of the Savings Bank Post Offices which at the time may best suit his convenience, and may exercise the same choice in drawing out money, subject only to the obligation of producing the pass-book, in proof of identity—whenever paying in or drawing out money.

7. Interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum will be allowed on deposits lying in the ordinary deposit accounts, but when a depositor has \$100 deposited, he or she may request the Postmaster-General to transfer the sum to a special account, and will then receive certificate of such special \$100 deposit, bearing interest at 5 per cent. per annum.

THE STAMP ACTS.

These Acts impose a duty on every promissory note, draft, or bill of exchange, not exceeding \$25, 1 cent; not exceeding \$50, 2 cents; less than \$100, 3 cents; *not less than* \$100, if executed singly, 3 cents per \$100 or fraction thereof; if executed in duplicate, 2 cents per \$100, or fraction thereof on each part; if executed in more than two parts, 1 cent per \$100 or fraction thereof on each part.

Any interest payable with the note at maturity must be counted as part thereof. The duty is to be paid by *bill stamp*, on which the date is to be written. Bank notes, checks, and money orders are exempt. These Acts impose heavy penalties for violation.

*For Freckles.*—Dissolve in half an ounce of lemon juice one ounce of Venice soap, and add a quarter of an ounce each of deliquated oil of tar and oil of bitter almonds. Place this mixture in the sun till it acquires the consistency of ointment. When in this state add three drops of oil of rhodium, and keep it for use. Apply it to the face and hands in the manner following: Wash the parts at night with elder-flower water; then anoint with the ointment. In the morning cleanse the skin from its oily adhesion by washing it copiously in rose-water.

SHEEP ON A POOR FARME.—Some farmers of our acquaintance feel an antipathy to sheep for the reason that they "bite close." We consider this their chief recommendation. They can also bite close where the pasture is short, and the pasture is short only on a poor farm. A poor farm will necessarily be covered with briars, weeds, and brush in the fence corners. Under these conditions, we would say to a farmer who has twenty dollars or upwards in cash (or credit for it), invest it in as many ewes, not older than three years, as you can get for that money. Put them in a field as we have described, and give them, in addition to as much as they can pick up, a pint of wheat, bran and oatmeal daily, with free access to water and salt. They will first "go for" the briars and clean them out; every portion of that field will be trodden over and over again, and the weeds will have no chance. Fold them on that field during winter, and carry to them feed sufficient to keep them thriving. Get the use of a good buck in season—Leicester ram would be preferable—and in spring if you would have luck (that means if you give them proper attention and feed regularly), you will have more lambs than ewes. The money will be more than double, and the manure and wool will pay for their feed and interest. In the spring you may put that field in corn with the certainty of getting fifty per cent. increase of crop.

*Courts of Law and Equity.*

**COURT OF QUEEN'S BENCH.**—The jurisdiction of this Court extends to all manner of actions, causes and suits, criminal and civil, real, personal and mixed, within Ontario, and it may proceed in such, by such process and course as are provided by law, and as shall tend with justice and despatch to determine the same, and may hear and determine all issues of law, and also with the inquest of twelve good and lawful men (except in cases otherwise provided for) try all issues of fact, and give judgment, and award execution, thereon, and also in matters which relate to the Queen's Revenue (including the condemnation of contraband or smuggled goods) as may be done by Her Majesty's Superior Courts of Law in England. Chief Justice—Hon. William Buell Richards. Puisné Judges—Hon. Joseph C. Morrison, and Hon. Adam Wilson. Clerk of the Crown and Pleas—Robert G. Dalton. Reporter—Chris Robinson, Q.C.

**COURT OF CHANCERY.**—This court has the like jurisdiction as the Court of Chancery in England, in cases of fraud, accident, trusts, executors, administrators, co-partnerships, account, mortgages, awards, dower, infants, idiots, lunatics and their estates, waste, specific performance, discovery, and to prevent multiplicity of suits, staying proceedings at law prosecuted against equity and good conscience, and may decree the issue, repeal or avoidance of letters patent, and generally the like powers which the Court of Chancery in England possesses to administer justice in all cases in which there is no adequate remedy at law. Chancellor—Hon. John G. Spragge. Vice-Chancellors—Hon. Oliver Mowat and Hon. Samuel H. Strong. Judges' Secretary—T. W. Taylor. Special Examiners—John Hector, Q.C., and James H. Esten. Registrar and Reporter, Alex. Grant. Clerk of Records and Writs—Arthur Holmstead.

**COUNTY COURTS.**—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed £50; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant, to £100; and to all bail bonds and recognizances of bail given in the County Court, to any amount; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills, or actions for libel, slander, criminal, or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law.

**SURROGATE COURTS.**—The jurisdiction of these Courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effects in Ontario, and all matters arising out of or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Courts. Chief Surrogate Clerk at Toronto, Sir J. L. Robinson, Bart.

**COURTS OF GENERAL SESSIONS.**—The County Judge in each county holds a Court of General Session in his county semi-annually on the second Tuesday in June and December, except in the County of York, in which county said Court is held three times, commencing on the second Tuesday in March, June and December, for the trial of cases of felony and misdemeanor, but treason and capital felonies are exempt from their jurisdiction.

*Terms of the Courts.*

**COURT OF ERROR AND APPEAL.**—This Court holds its sittings twice a year at Toronto, in the months of January and June, upon such days as it may by rule or order from time to time appoint, and may adjourn such sitting from day to day, or for any such longer period as it may deem expedient, and may also appoint days for giving judgment or for disposing of business as in its discretion it shall see fit.

**LAW TERMS.**—Hilary begins first Monday in February, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; Easter begins third Monday in May, and ends Saturday of the Second week thereafter; Michaelmas begins third Monday in November, and ends Saturday of the second week thereafter. By the Act 29 and 30 Vic. cap 40, Trinity Term, hitherto commencing on the Monday after the 21st August, is abolished; but the same statute gives power to the Court of Queen's Bench and Common Pleas, at their discretion, to hold sittings in banc in time of vacation (except long vacation), by virtue of a rule or order of the Court, respectively to be made in or out of term, for the hearing of such special cases or rules for new trials as shall be named in a list to be attached to any such rule or order, and for giving of judgments in cases previously argued, and for disposing of such other business as the Court in its discretion shall see fit. Notice of such rules to be given in form and manner prescribed by the Act, six clear days before the day appointed.

**CHANCERY TERMS.**—*Examination Terms.*—From 1st Tuesday of February to the Saturday after the 2nd Tuesday of April; and from 1st Tuesday of September to the Saturday after 1st Tuesday of November. *Hearing Terms*—From 4th Monday in April until Saturday of the following week, and from 3rd Monday in November until Saturday of the following week. The Court also sits every Tuesday (except during the regular vacations) throughout the year, for hearing motions for hearing motions for Decrees, motions for or to dissolve special injunctions, and appeals from the reports of the Master or Deputy Masters.

**COUNTY COURT TERMS.**—The several County Courts in Ontario hold four terms in each year, to commence on the first Monday in January, April, July and October.

**BOLOGNA SAUSAGES.**—To ten pounds of beef take four of pork; chop and mix it; season well with six ounces of salt, and some black and cayenne pepper, cloves powdered, and chopped garlic. Put the mixture into beef skins, tie them, and put them for three weeks into brine strong enough to bear an egg, turning them every day; then dry and hang them up to smoke.

**TO TAKE PAINT SPOTS FROM CLOTH AND SILKS.**—Dip a quill pen in spirit of turpentine, and transfer to the paint spot in sufficient quantity to discharge the oil and gluten. Let it stand some hours, then rub it well, and all trace of the discoloration will disappear. For large and numerous spots apply the spirit of turpentine with a sponge, if possible, before it is become dry.

**TO KEEP POTATOES FOR YEARS.**—Dust over the floor of the bin with lime ; put in about six or seven inches of potatoes, and dust with lime, as before. Put in six or seven inches of potatoes, and lime again, and repeat the operation till all are stowed away. One bushel of lime will do forty bushels of potatoes, though more will not hurt them, the lime rather improving the flavour than otherwise.

**HOW TO CURE CHILLS.**—A lady gives what she believes to be a sure cure for chills. She takes about a quart of new milk and stirs into it about a teaspoonful of ground ginger and then heats the milk as hot as it will do to drink without burning the patient. This is given to the patient as soon as he feels the symptoms of the chill coming on, and he goes to bed and covers up warm and the milk and ginger throw the patient into a perspiration which breaks the chill. After this a pill of blue mass, or some medicine that will operate on the liver, is given, and the patient is cured.

**TOP DRESSING AND SOILING.**—Were I able, with pen or voice, to reach every young farmer in the land, and to secure his attention, chief among all farm operations I would urge upon him to fully understand, and thoroughly to practice two things, namely: to top dress all meadows and fields of winter grain, and to soil all their stock. With all who have practiced it to any extent, applying manure and compost on the meadows and winter wheat and rye, it is found to be a most advantageous way to use manure, and bring the most speedy profit for the operation. Spread on winter wheat late in autumn it does much to prevent winter killing, by preventing the plants from being torn out by frost or blown bare by the wind in dry times in winter, as is often the case. This mulching or top-dressing also shelters the young grain and grass from the hot sun in spring, and prevents the moisture and ammonia from being evaporated this entirely avoids, or largely lessens, the evils of drought.

It also fertilizes and stimulates the growth of the young plants, by being leached and soaked into the soil gradually by the rains. We have succeeded in raising, and have seen others raise, bountiful crops of first rate winter wheat on lands where none before ever did, or even expected to get crops on account of winter killing; but top dressing or mulching makes winter grain a sure thing, otherwise it could not succeed.

Then we have taken old, dry, "sold bound" meadows, liberally spread manure and compost on them in the fall, and next summer cut three tons of good hay to the acre. The mulching kept the soil moist and soft, sheltered off the sun, leached down and stimulated the growing of the grass; we have also top dressed right after the first mowing in June, so the hot sun should not dry and scorch the ground and roots, laid bare by mowing, and thereby gained another good swath of over a ton to the acre. This operation pays well if done once in two years, and will prevent a good meadow from ever "running out" or getting sod bound, so that plowing and re-seeding is necessary, unless it is desired to plow occasionally and sow to grain; but if there be a good market for the hay it is by this process more profitable than grain raising.—*Maryland Farmer.*

**TREATING CANADIAN THISTLES.**—Our land is over-run with this pest, yet it is little regarded—not near so much as the daisy and some other plants. This is owing to the treatment, of course, for a thistle, left alone or cultivated (and growing grain cultivates it), will grow so rank as to prevent all usefulness to the land. The mode here is the common mode of sowing to clover and grass seed. The first year the thistles will grow rank, keeping down the clover. But cut when the stocks are hollow, or when the clover is cut, they will die or shrink away so as to be of little trouble hereafter, for the following seasons the grass will occupy their places, and form a sod which seems to be a guard against them. The few that remain are quite spindle. Plowing now will be pretty sure to finish them. But it must not be done in the fall early, then there will be a chance for the growth of the weed, and if the land is sown in the spring without re-plowing, there is sure to be a good thistle crop. But plow late in the fall or early in the spring, and the crop of grain which gets the start of the thistles will prevent a free growth, and the grass following, if seeds, will continue the check as before. But, if a clean thing is desired to be made, the land, when in sod, instead of being plowed in the fall or early in the spring should be summer-fallowed, so that not a thistle sees the sun during the season. Two winters and one summer (deprived of the light,) are too much for this pest.

**PROPORTION OF CREAM TO MILK.**—The proportion of cream to milk yielded by cows of the various breeds used in the dairy were ascertained by experiment in England some time since as follows:—Brittany cows, 19.27 to 22.00 per cent of cream; Jerseys, 18.65 to 20.00 per cent; cross of Jersey and Shorthorn, 17.95 to 19.05 per cent; Shorthorn or Durham, 15.32 to 18.56 per cent; Devon, 14.87 to 17.00 per cent; and Ayrshires, 13.47 to 14.84 per cent. The variations depended on the feed, which for the lowest yield was grass or hay only, and for the highest the most abundant food of the richest character that could be procured. As a general thing, however, cream is yielded in larger proportion in our dairies than in those of England. We have been assured by Mr. Crozier, of Northport, L.I., that he has taken one quart of cream from three quarts of milk from one of his Jersey cows.

The best method of tanning sheep skins with wool on, for use as door mats, rugs, &c., is as follows: Take the skin upon a board with the flesh side out, and then scrape with a blunt knife; next rub hard with pulverized chalk until it will absorb no more. Then take the skin from the board and cover it with pulverized alum; double half way over with the flesh side in contact; then roll tight together and keep dry for three days, after which unfold it and stretch it again on a board or door, and dry in the air, and it will be ready for use.—*American Artizan.*

**BLEEDING AT THE NOSE.**—A correspondent of the *Scientific American* says:—The best remedy for bleeding at the nose, as given by Dr. Gleason in one of his lectures, is a vigorous motion of the jaws, as if in the act of mastication. In the case of a child, a wad of paper should be placed in its mouth and the child instructed to chew it hard. Of course an adult does not need the paper. It is the motion of the jaw that stops the flow of blood. This remedy is so very simple that many feel inclined to laugh at it; but it has never been known to fail in a single instance, even in very severe cases.
