Mr. Justice Wilnot and the St. John Sabbath School.

We take the following from the St. John Church Witness:— The progress of the Sunday school system is truly remarkable. The first school was only established about sixty years ago, in every land where Protestantism prevails, schools for the religious instruction of the young may be numbered by hundreds and thousands.

It is bound to no hierarchy. Church policy might be demolished, and church system be drifted down the stream of time, and Sunday schools nevertheless exist, for they are free as the air they breathe, and wherever a group of little children could be gathered, and a teacher full of love be found to meet them, there would stand forth that most catholic of all catholic things—a SUNDAY SCHOOL.

In St. John, as many of our readers are aware, Sunday schools have been established for nearly thirty years. It was one of the first efforts of Dr. I. W. D. Gray, the zealous rector of Trinity Church, on his arrival here, to form a Sunday school; and we need hardly say that he succeeded.

The school flourished, and we are happy to all still flourish; and no doubt, numbers can trace their first impressions of religious truth to the instructions received within its walls. On the erection of the parishes of St. James and St. Mark's, distinct schools were formed in them by the Rectors, the Rev. John Armstrong and the Rev. G. M. Armstrong, and we have now four schools connected with the Church of England in the city, exclusive of Carlton. Large and flourishing schools are also in active operation in connection with other Protestant churches of the city, as will be seen by the subjoined statement:
