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MANITOBA CONSERVATIVES.
Foundation of a Provincial Conservative Association.

Wednesday, March, Oct. 20.—The Conservative Convention met again last evening with increased attendance. A series of resolutions were presented and discussed, and the discussion resumed in the morning when they were finally adopted. They set forth—Whereas, the inauguration of party government in the province has been progressing since the year 1870, and is likely to be fully consummated in the result of the approaching provincial elections; and whereas it is expedient the policy of the Conservative party in Manitoba should be fully directed by this convention.

Resolved, 1. That the Conservatives of Manitoba will continue to support the party of the Dominion for the promotion of British interests in Canada, and the development of the vast British Canadian empire by the support of those broad national measures which have characterized the records of Conservative Governments during the past twenty years of Canadian progress.

2. That the Conservatives of Manitoba hold it to be their duty to support every measure which will reach to the province for every right of self-government and other advantages enjoyed by the other provinces of the North American continent.

3. That the Conservatives of Manitoba believe it to be in accordance with the policy of the province that the ungranted public lands within the Provincial boundaries should be vested in the Provincial Government, and that the liberal allowance of lands within the province granted for educational purposes should be placed under the control of the Provincial Government, and otherwise to be made available for educational purposes in general.

4. That the Conservatives of Manitoba endorse the contract entered into with the Canada Pacific Railway, and believe it does not involve the necessity of disallowance of the Provincial Government, or the extension of the Provincial boundaries to the westward, and claim our rights to grant such charters.

5. That the policy of the province in order to strengthen the western boundary, to secure ports on Lake Superior and the Hudson Bay, should receive the support of all parties.

6. That the great extent and inexhaustible resources of the province, together with its magnificent natural resources, and its position in every department of industry manifested in the province, fully entitle the people to a voice in the Provincial Government.

7. That the policy of local self-government by means of municipal incorporation is one which should be promoted by every class of representative, and that the power and wisdom of the Legislature to grant.

8. That the redistribution of electoral districts in order to give equal representation to all classes and people of the province, and where Acts are passed by every class of representatives, they will urge all efforts to prevent the reserve power being used where no constitutional reasons intervene.

9. That the Conservatives of Manitoba insist upon equal rights, under the law
