Deferred Articles.

THE REFORMERS OF THE MINISTRY.

The Reformers of the North Riding are already giving evidence that the trucking and trembling Administration are to expect a determined opposition at the next election. They at length begin to see the acts of the Ministry in their true colors, as being solely for the benefit of themselves and adherents, and entirely contrary to the well-understood wishes of the people. The next Session will be the last before the general election, and these traitors to their party are dreading the time for meeting the House, when they will have to render to the country an account of their past misdeeds.

The appointment of two or three Conservatives lately to office by such a Government as Canada at present possesses, has rather a suspicious appearance, and is not likely to diminish its unpopularity with the Rads, or gain the confidence of those whose principles are adverse to Republicanism. The flagrant abuses, infamous jobbing, and unprecedented extravagance of the existing Administration, have disgusted all parties, and in consequence they are deserted by every political section. Even the Globe and Pilot, both of which are accredited as organs of the Government, have been for some time at loggerheads, and the Mirror, which lately most miraculously jumped "Jim Crow," from the opposition to the defence, states that "the Globe is not the organ of the Ministry, or of any member of it." All these are peculiar symptoms of a regular disorganization amongst our reckless rulers and their late outrageous supporters, which strongly forebode an approaching downfall.—Hamilton Gazette.

Extraordinary Trial—Bel Air Md.

Dec. 24—One of the most extraordinary occurrences that have disturbed this part of the world for the past half century, took place to-day. Sometime ago the body of a man named Hammond was found near here, bearing evidence that he had been cruelly murdered. Suspicion was fixed upon 2 persons, Stump and Griffith, as the villains who committed the bloody deed and they were accordingly arrested, and duly indicted Stump for being the principle, and Griffith as being an accomplice. Stump's trial came on a few days since, and he was acquitted, the jury thinking that the testimony against him was not sufficient for hanging. Griffith, the accomplice was next on trial, and the Court having been occupied with it for the past few days, to-day they brought in a verdict of not guilty, upon the following singular testimony, Stump having been acquitted of the murder, his evidence was of course admissible, and he was called to the stand in behalf of Griffith.—Being sworn he was asked—"Do you know anything of the murder of Hammond?" "Yes." "Do you know who killed him?" "Yes." "Who was it?" "I did it myself!" "Had Griffith any agency in the act?" "None; and he did not know it, until four hours afterwards!" The Jury immediately returned a verdict of Not Guilty against the prisoner, and he was discharged.—N. Y. Sun.

ARRIVAL OF THE NIAGARA. NEW YORK, Jan. 4. The Niagara on her arrival at Halifax, was completely encased in ice. On some parts of her nearly a foot in thickness. She will be due at Boston to-night, too late for her mails to come south before Monday afternoon, unless despatched by special train to-morrow. This will probably be done by the post office authorities.

SPAIN. A quarrel has occurred between Narvaez and the Queen, who affronted him publicly at the theatre. PRUSSIA. Berlin dates to the 17th say that the dismissal of the landwehr has been accomplished very quietly, except in one or two provinces. MARSHAL REDTZY has left Vienna and returned to Lombardy. News about the rebellion in the south of China somewhat conflicts with the accounts previously received. The Government troops have been again defeated. The Portuguese frigate Donna Maria blew up off Macao on the anniversary of the birth-day of the Consort of the Queen of Portugal. All the officers and men on board, including some of the officers of the United States ship Marion, perished, except one officer and fifteen men belonging to the frigate.

TEMPERANCE FESTIVAL. The Winter Festival of the Guelph Total Abstinence Society was held on the 10th inst. The thaw of the preceding day had considerably marred the roads for sleighing, and a bitter northwester with sleet showers, was not particularly propitious to the gathering of a large concourse on the occasion. We have, notwithstanding these drawbacks, had no similar demonstration in the County of Waterloo at all equaling in amount or respectability the turn out on Friday last. About eleven A. M., a party of the Guelph Division of the Sons of Temperance, preceded by the Mechanics' Band, went some three miles on the Waterloo Road to meet the Galt and Berlin Divisions, which had formed a junction at Green's, and from 70 to 80 Sleighs and Cutters entered town in this direction bearing a number of banners with suitable devices &c., preceded by Mr. Lionel Foster, the D. C. W. P. of the Galt District, in appropriate costume and the regalia of his office, passed through the Market Square to the British, where 50 stalls had been previously ordered. Other parties of the Sons drove in from Stewarstown, Georgetown, Erin, &c., while Nichol, Woolwich, Eramosa, and Puslinch, contributed their quota of friends and supporters of the cause. Soon after noon, the different Divisions of Sons and Sections of Cadets assembled in the Temperance Hall, where also as many other parties were accommodated as the room could possibly contain. The W. P. having taken the chair, and the officers their respective places on the platform, the Mechanics' Band occupying the orchestra on the left, and the Temperance Choir on the right, the Rev. W. S. Griffin, Chaplain of the Division, opened the meeting with prayer, when the Conductors announced that a deputation of ladies desired admission in order to present gifts to the Division. On the entrance of the Deputation preceded by the Rev. J. G. McGregor, of the Free Church, the Sons and Cadets rose, while the Choir sang a "Welcome" composed for the occasion—meaning the deputation having been arranged by the Conductors in front of the platform, Mr. McGregor spoke as follows:— MR. PRESIDENT.—I appear before you in the name and behalf of the ladies subscribers for the gifts now about to be presented, consisting of a very handsome copy of the Sacred Scriptures, and the appropriate badges for the respective officers-bearers of this Division of the Sons of Temperance. In regard to the first, I need not say that it is the most valuable gift which can be presented, being nothing less than the Word of the Living and Eternal God, for I think that I speak the sentiments of this numerous and respectable assemblage, that we are all convinced that God has spoken to us in the Scriptures, so that it is our duty, in all the plans which we contemplate, and the operations which we carry forward, whether as individuals or Societies, to study that they should be in accordance with its sacred dictates. Let me express a hope, therefore, that if on any point the clearly expressed authority of the Word of God should run contrary to our preconceived notions, we shall ever be ready to bow to it with reverence and submission. In respect of the second of these gifts, it is proper that in this, as in other institutions, the officers-bearers should have their respective emblems of office and these badges, the work of female hands, alike become the donors and recipients. From the records of History, we know that the Spartan mothers used to present their sons with the spear and the shield when about to depart to do battle with the enemies of their country, and by such gifts, from such hands they found their resolutions confirmed either to conquer or die, but the contest in which you are engaged is of a nobler and higher character, and against an enemy of old growth and giant form, with whom you have as firmly resolved to wage a war of utter extermination. We are reminded by these emblems, that, although the age of chivalry has passed away, the spirit of chivalry remains, and as the pilgrim warrior was often animated to deeds of daring courage on the battle fields of far distant lands by the sight of the favors of his lady love, so let these gifts stimulate you to increased exertion against the dreaded enemy of our race. I would advert for one moment to the condition and circumstances of those who have contributed to the bestowment of these offerings. They are the representatives of the mothers and daughters of our land—nay more, they are the representa-

tives of the mothers and daughters of the human family—whose scene of duty is the domestic circle, and whose general efforts, are to render home a scene of pure peace and happy enjoyment, but who have too frequently found all their hopes blasted, and their best endeavors frustrated, by the desolating inroads of the enemy to which we have referred. Doubtless, if any rejoice at the progress of the cause in which you are embarked, the full success, which is hoped, it will ultimately obtain, will not fail to cause the hearts of your benefactresses on the present occasion to be filled with unalloyed delight. I cannot, therefore, impress upon your minds a more persuasive argument, that you should adhere to the resolutions to which you have pledged yourselves, not to cease from your efforts, until they shall have been crowned with victory, and your enemy retire vanquished from the field. The Bible and Regalia were then deposited by the ladies on the W. P.'s table, who replied as follows:— Ladies, friends of Temperance.—I have listened with feelings of intense gratification to the address which has been delivered in your name by the rev. gentleman you have selected as your organ, feelings which I am sure are participated by all present; and now, on the part of the Officers and Brethren of this Division of the S. of T., I most cordially and gratefully accept your proffered gift. Six thousand years have rolled on since Creation echoed the first footsteps of the march of Time, and the curses of inebriety, early introduced, had darkened the hearths and the homesteads of earth; and woman, with comparatively small guilts of the cause, and with but small ability to avert or mitigate the plague, has most largely suffered from its effects. The juggernaut of Intemperance has passed in triumph through the world, crushing beneath his chariot wheels, youth, manhood, and age, and woman has beheld friend and lover, son and sire, with maniac fury casting themselves in his path, howlings and imprecations have gone before, weepings and wailings have followed after. The feeble hand of woman might not stay for a moment nor retard by a hair breath the progress of the destroyer, she could but follow with streaming eyes and uplifted hands, witnessing the destruction of her hopes, aggravated by the fearful consciousness of her inability to do battle with the destroyer. But now that in the Providence of God there has been added to the Bible Societies, and Missionary Societies, and Sabbath School Societies, and other kindred institutions auxiliary to the progress of the Gospel, an Association for the suppression of Intemperance, and when a scion of that noble tree has sprung up, a detachment of that mighty host has taken post in these backwoods of Canada, our wives and sisters and daughters have brought us gifts to testify that they are not unconcerned spectators of the conflict in which we are engaged, but that they daily appreciate our motives and estimate their results, and the warmest sympathies of their hearts are with us, their vows and prayers are offered for our encouragement and success. The Officers of the Division, having received from the Conductors the Collars and Emblems appropriate to their respective offices, were then addressed by the W. P.:— Return in Office.—I am well assured you gratefully received and highly value these decorations now presented to us by the ladies, in testimony of their approval of the cause we advocate, and their earnest desire for its promotion. We have heard long in the olden time, in the days of chivalry, the cavalier received from female hands the scarf which, borne by him on helmet or lance, stimulated to gallant bearing in the battle-field—how the Spartan matrons were wont to arm their husbands and sons for the fight, thus exciting and serving them to encounter their country's foes; and shall not we, who are engaged in a nobler warfare, fed animated by such gifts to more zealous exertions in the warfare we wage with the most potent foe of humanity. Do you then promise never to relax your efforts until the destroyer of our kindred is driven from the land, until the Dragon of Inebriety shall be found prostrate and broken before the Arm of Temperance. The Officers simultaneously responded "We do." The W. P. then, addressing the Chaplain of the Division, said—I will not presume, reverend sir, in your presence, to offer thanks for this holy book now presented to us; but while devoting that duty on you, I would seek your testimony as to the truth or falsehood of the charge brought against us by the opponents of the Temperance Movement, that we put Total Abstinence in the stead of the Gospel—a weak device of the enemy—and whether you know aught in the principles of our Association, or have observed aught in our carrying out of these, inconsistent with the Word of God. I feel assured, reverend sir, that should you have cognizance of such error, you will deem this Book, holding authority paramount to that of all the laws and requirements of our Order, a sufficient warrant for your interference. The Bible was then carried to the Chaplain's table, who said—In answer to the appeal which has just been made to me, I do most cheerfully bear my testimony to the fact that the cause for the promotion of which the Institution of the Sons of Temperance is formed, is essentially founded on, and in strict conformity with the Word of God, and that I have never, in my intercourse with this Association, observed anything on its rules or practice at variance with the requirements of God's Word. We attach no ordinary degree of importance to these gifts, which the ladies have so kindly presented to us; but more particularly are our hearts possessed with feelings of gratitude to God, and at the same time of thankfulness to the ladies, for that invaluable boon which has this day been entrusted to my care. We value the gift because of the givers. A gift not unusually derives its importance from the character of the parties by whom it is made. We are called to contend continually against obstacles of no ordinary description. In such circumstances to receive pecuniary patronage, to receive it unsolicited, and especially to receive it from such a source, affords us no small degree of satisfaction and encouragement—for we conceive this gift to be an unequivocal evidence of the deep interest the ladies take in the prosperity of our Order. We value this gift because it is an index to the views which they have formed of the character of this Association. There can exist in no mind a doubt in reference to the character with which they have seen fit to invest us; it is very clear that they apprehend distinctly that we are not a society of infidels, an allegation which men under the influence of a malicious spirit have presumed to make. But we are proud of this gift also, because of its intrinsic excellence. Its value can never be properly esti-

CORONER'S INQUEST.—On Thursday last, an inquest was held on the body of Humphrey Sullivan, laborer, who died suddenly on the preceding evening, not without suspicion of his death being caused by blows received in a fight in which he had been engaged the previous week. The jury returned the following verdict:—"That Humphrey Sullivan came to his death in consequence of exposure to cold whilst in a state of intoxication, this inducing fever and erysipelas, which was kept up and aggravated by the deceased continuing the use of ardent spirits whilst in a state of fever, and not by any violence to the knowledge of the jurors, from the evidence adduced."

TO THE EDITOR OF THE GUELPH HERALD. "DISREPUTABLE ELECTION TACTICS."—Under this heading, the Editor of the Herald has published, as editorial matter, the contents of a handbill issued from the Herald office on the morning of Saturday last. Said handbill was concocted for the purpose of throwing discredit upon certain statements made in last Advertiser respecting the Temperance Election Committee's agreement with the Reform Committee in reference to the proposed Candidates at the Municipal Election. The sophistry contained in this handbill met with a crushing exposure in another handbill issued from the Advertiser Office, on Monday morning by an Elector, who had been behind the scenes, and who was too honest to support the double-dealing of Mr. Pirie, and too clear-headed, to be humbugged by soft-sawder. In justice to the Advertiser we ought to have published said Elector's address to-day; and one chief reason for not doing it is, that we are anxious that any harsh feelings which may have been engendered during the late struggle may be cast into oblivion as soon as possible.—Advertiser, 9th January.

SIR.—When statements such as the above are given to the public, calculated (if believed) to injure not only individuals, but an institution of a purely benevolent character, it is matter of rejoicing that your columns are always open for their refutation and exposure. As there may be some who are still disposed "to take for gospel what the spasm gives," and whose prejudices against a cause which we love, and are anxious to promote, the above extract is calculated to strengthen, we desire to offer a few words in reply. The Editor of the Advertiser refers in the above paragraph to an agreement between the Temperance and Reform Committees. We stated publicly that such an agreement was never thought of

never hinted at. To this plain statement we cheerfully and deliberately subscribed our names, and yet Mr Keeling continues to assert that such an agreement was entered into by the respective Committees. Is this courteous, is it mainly, is it what might be expected of a *professionally Reform* Editor, because he has the advantage arising from press and types, to stigmatize his fellow townsmen as liars, while he can produce no evidence whatever to support such unfounded and insulting imputations? Truly, Mr Editor, if such conduct is not universally repudiated, if it is allowed to pass unpunished, we may conclude that regard for integrity and honesty of purpose is at a discount, and we may expect that our local press, instead of being a boon and a blessing, will be rendered a nuisance and a curse. Can you tell us, Mr Editor, what Mr Keeling means, when he says that you published our handbill as "Editorial matter?" Matter may appear in Editorial columns, but men of a small measure of discernment can trace to the legitimate author; but when an article is so inserted, subscribed by five individuals, how in the name of wonder can that article be deemed Editorial? But the handbill contained "sophistry"—that is, we the subscribers used what Walker calls "Fallacious ratiocination." We stated facts, plain facts. No deductions whatever were made, no arguments employed; and yet we are sophists. If Mr Keeling wrote in ignorance of the meaning of language, we pity him as an Editor; if he wrote in malice, we must both pity and condemn. But the "Editor" who gave a "crushing exposure" of our sophistry, was "behind the scenes." If he was one of those over-droppers who, eager for scandal, seek a position where they may listen without detection, the report which such an one makes should be valued at its proper worth. But if "behind the scenes" means sitting at the same table, and entering into social converse, proposing and sanctioning resolutions, &c., then the "Editor's" statements are negated and condemned by all the other members of the Temperance Committee. And yet the "Editor" gives a "crushing exposure!" Does Mr Keeling himself credit it? If he does, we hope and believe none else are so destitute of charity. In justice to Mr Pirie, we must state that although charged with "double dealing," we have never been able to discover the slightest indication of it—but, on the contrary, have observed in him a fixed determination to support, at whatever cost, the noble cause of Temperance; and we firmly believe, that had he been called upon to give his vote at the Municipal election, he would, as he declared, "have gone the whole hog" for cold water candidates, irrespective of their political opinions, and that those who put any other interpretation on his language, although they may be pronounced more "clear-headed" by Mr Keeling, are nevertheless deficient in that "charity which thinketh no evil." We are as anxious as Mr Keeling that "harsh feelings" should be "cast into oblivion;" and we can assure him that he will greatly accelerate this consummation, by either proving his statements, or publicly acknowledging his errors.—Should he fail to do either, we may endeavor to subdue "harsh feelings," yet those of merited contempt we cannot cease to entertain.
