The Grotesque Pelican With Its Husky Asthmatic Whisper.

Waxing Floors.

A good preparation for waxing floors, says the American Druggist, may be obtained as follows: Of yellow wax take 25 ounces, yellow ceresin, 25 ounces, burnt sienna, 5 ounces, boiled linseed oil, 1 ounce, and oil of turpentine, 30 ounces. Melt the wax and ceresin at a gentle heat; then add the sienna, previously well triturated with the boiled linseed oil, and mix well. When the mixture begins to cool add the oil of turpentine, or so much of it as is required to make a mass of the consistence of an eintment. Yellow ceresin is purified cookerite (fossil parafine) and may be had in almost any quantity. The burnt sienna may be used in smaller or larger quantity, occording to the thirt desired, or may be replaced by raw sienna, etc. Dieterich recommends the following: To 400 parts of boiling water add 200 parts of yellow wax; when this is melted add 25 parts of carbonate of 'spotassium; boil for a moment or so, then reshove the vessel from the fire and add 20 parts of oil of turpentine. Stir until cool, and dilute with water to make 1,000 parts. If the floors are well preserved the dilution may be carried to 1,500. The object of the potassium salt is to form an emulsion with the wax. Waxing Floors

Flames Sweep Over Minnesots, Licking Up \$700 as Hour.

THE Savings Stamp Bank system, which riginated at Frankfort-on-the-Main, originated at Frankfort-on-the-Main, in Germany, is becoming quite popular in the United States, particularly in Boston, where it is extensively used by co-operative institutions and building and loan associations. In Detroit the system has also been introduced and grows in favor among the working classes, to whom it specially appeals. The system and its working are thus described by the Boston Herald. Adhesive stamps, about the size and form of postage stamps, are sold by agents, and with them is issued a stamp-book with it pages divided into 20 squares, and a full postage stamps, are sold by agents, and with them is issued a stamp-book with its pages divided into 20 squares, and a full page of stamps is received at the office of the company that issued the stamps as \$1. One association in six months sold something over \$5.200 stamps, making the receipts over \$4,200, and the balance to the account of stamps was a little over \$300, which was more than the total charge of expense against the stamp department, including the 1 per cent. paid to the stamp agents?
