REV. DR. CHUTE ON OUR EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS.

It is pleasing to be able to say, Mr. Editor, in response to your request for a few words regarding our institutions, that the present College year has been passing in a very satisfactory manner. The absence of a President has been felt, and we are desirous of seeing a man appointed to that position with all the speed consistent with a wise choosing. But during the vacancy of the office the Administrative Committee, consisting of Dr. Tubb, Dr. Worsman and Prof. Haley, has successfully guided the internal affairs of the College. The attend-

ance at all the schools on the 21st has been exceedingly gratifying. This year, and the members are to be increased after the holiday season has gone. Statistics are not just at hand, but probably the total number of students is at present considerably in excess of any preceding year. The Freshman Class is the largest in the history of the Institutions. Favorable words are heard on all sides respecting the work of Prof. Morse, who stepped into the place so suddenly made vacant by the going of Prof. C. C. Jones to the University of New Brunswick.

Mention may be made of the visit paid us by the Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia.

He gave us a full day on the 14th of Dec., attending Chapel exercises in the morning, dining with the residents of Chipman Hall, taking tea at the Ladies' Seminary, and then being present at the reception in College Hall during the evening. On each occasion, except the last-named, the Governor spoke in an interesting and helpful way to the students. To what he said, among us at various times during the day he was pleased to refer in the most generous terms. The pastors of our town have lately favored us with their presence at the Chapel services. Rev. J. W. Morse, Rev. E. B. Moore, Rev. David Wright, and Rev. R. F. Dixon, each conducted the devotional exercises in College Hall for a week, in the order in which their names appear, and gratitude is felt for their timely messages. Permit expression of the wish that 1907 may be a truly prosperous year to THE ACADIAN in all that it attempts for the best interests of our community.

THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK.

DEAR SIR,—I have been asked to give a short paper on trade conditions and future possibilities of our town.

If we judge from the past our even years are the years of plenty and low prices, while our odd years, '01, '02, '05 and '07, are the years of high prices. It behoves us, then, to prepare for this by attempting more thorough spraying, earlier and more general cultivation, and above all more liberal fertilizing. This matter of orchard fertilizing has, to my mind, been more neglected, of late years, than any other requisite of fruit-growing and has contributed, I believe, in no small degree to the general shortage of the crop during the last three years. The acreage of orchards has been so largely increased, while the fertilizers have been more scattered, resulting in more diminished quantities being applied per acre.

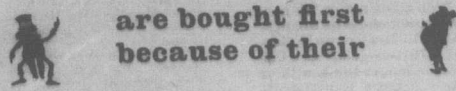
