

The Chairman reported several resolutions agreed to, and Supply closed.

The Bill to settle doubts relative to titles of lands sold for Assessment on this Island, was read a third time and passed.

Mr. McLennan, Chairman of the Special Committee on Public Accounts, submitted the Report of that Committee, which was ordered to be referred to a Committee of the whole House to-morrow.

The following Committee was then appointed to select such accounts as should be published in the Appendix to the Journals, viz: Hon. Messrs. Hanley, Longworth, &c.

On motion of the Hon. Leader of the Government, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole, on the Deputations.

A debate then ensued, and was kept up till a very late hour, on the subject of the Resolutions submitted by the Hon. Leader of the Government, in amendment to which the Hon. Mr. Whelan submitted the following, viz:

Resolved, as the opinion of this House, that the Confederation of Her Majesty's American Colonial Possessions would be desirable in conformity with Her Majesty's frequently expressed desire, relative to their affairs, individually and generally.

And, this House believes that a plan of Confederation might be so framed, as not to involve the sacrifice of any material interests on the part of any Province, but, inasmuch as the people of Prince Edward Island do not appear to be prepared to regard with any favor the project of Confederation, it is unnecessary to press it upon public attention, as its discussion is only calculated to produce excitement and apprehension, without any real benefit.

And further Resolved, as the opinion of this House, that there should be no vote passed by the Legislature of this country in favor of a Confederation of the Provinces, until the people shall first be afforded an opportunity of pronouncing their judgment on the question at a General Election.

Progress was reported. House adjourned.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

(Continued from our last.)

Hon. the President: I also will give this measure my warmest support. There are two such Bills now before the House, and I consider it an indication of the prosperity of the country.

Hon. Mr. Ramsay: I think it is a movement in the right direction, and I hope it will prove such a profitable investment to stockholders that bills of this kind will become as numerous as bank incorporation bills. I will give the measure my hearty support.

Hon. Mr. Coles: I have always considered that the prosperity of the country depended in a great measure on the establishment of manufactures amongst us; and I am glad to see that factories of different kinds are now springing up in the Colony. We have shoe factories, tanneries, and cloth factories; and if there is one more required than another, it is just the one which is to be incorporated by this bill.

There is an immense quantity of cloth used on this Island, and if we had factories, farmers could have their wool made into cloth at home, and thus the necessity for exporting it would be obviated. It would also afford employment to our surplus population, for great numbers of our young men are leaving the Island for want of such employment. I also hope to see a flax factory established ere long, which is as much required as a woollen factory, seeing that the price of cotton is so high. I think it is the duty of the Government to encourage a factory of that kind. A machine that would cost £50 or £60 for each County would not be any great expense to the Government, and I think it is more desirable than a model farm, though that may be doing good. The Government should import a machine and have it suitably for the preparation of flax tested. Many persons have told me that if there were such a machine here, they would raise a much greater quantity of flax. If the Government did not like to give them out, they might yet turn them into the Agricultural Society to sell them. There has been a good deal said on this subject, and I hope it will not be lost sight of. I am glad to see that there is to be a woollen factory established in Charlottetown, the centre of the Island, and I hope there will soon be one in each County. There is already one in Prince County, Mr. Stanfield's, but though it is giving great satisfaction, it is not sufficient to supply the requirements of the community.

The Hon. Mr. Anderson and the Hon. Mr. McLaren also expressed their satisfaction at seeing this bill before the House, and their willingness to give it their support; after which the House was resumed, and the chairman reported the Bill agreed to.

A message was brought from the House of Assembly by the Hon. Mr. Haviland, with a Bill "to continue certain Acts therein mentioned."

Adjourned till four o'clock, p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

A Bill to incorporate the Mechanics' Fishing Company of Charlottetown, was read a second time, passed through committee, and reported agreed to without any amendment.

A message was brought from the House of Assembly by the Hon. Mr. Haviland, with a Bill to incorporate the Grand Lodge of the British Order of Good Templars of Prince Edward Island, and to provide for the County and Primary Lodges in connection therewith.

House adjourned.

FRIDAY, APRIL 27.

A Bill to incorporate the Minister and Trustees of St. Andrew's Church, Carleton, and a Bill "to incorporate the Mechanics' Fishing Company of Charlottetown," were severally read the third time and passed.

A Bill "to continue certain Acts therein mentioned," and a Bill "to incorporate the British Order of Good Templars," were severally read the second time, passed through committee, and reported agreed to without any amendment.

Adjourned till four o'clock, p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

A message was brought from the House of Assembly by Mr. Brecken, with a Bill to alter and amend the Act to incorporate the town of Charlottetown, and the Acts in amendment thereof. Also, a Bill "to carry into effect certain unexecuted agreements made by the late John Hodges Winstone, Esquire, deceased, for the sale and leasing of certain parts of his estate in this Island."

The Charlottetown incorporation amendment Bill was, on motion, read a second time and committed to a committee of the whole House—Hon. Mr. Beer in the chair.

Hon. Mr. Walker: I do not see why a property qualification of £200 should be required before a man could be elected, either as a Councillor or an Auditor. I do not know the object of making the change. There are no petitions asking for it, and I cannot see the connection between a property qualification and a man's ability to audit accounts.

Hon. Mr. Donald: Neither can I see the connection which his honor refers to, but perhaps it does not concern county members so much as those of your honors who are from the city.

Hon. Mr. Beer: I suppose it has been thought that the auditors should be men who have a stake in the country, so that the people would have more confidence in them than they would have in those who have no property.

Hon. Mr. Walker: That may have been the reason for making the change, but I do not see the necessity for a property qualification when a man is otherwise qualified to audit accounts.

The House was then resumed, and the chairman reported the Bill agreed to.

A message was brought from the House of Assembly by Mr. Brecken, with a Bill to continue certain Acts therein mentioned.

Adjourned till to-morrow at eleven o'clock.

SATURDAY, APRIL 28.

A Bill "to alter, add to, and amend the act to incorporate the town of Charlottetown, and the acts in amendment thereof," and a Bill "to incorporate the British Order of Good Templars," were severally read a third time and passed.

WINNIESE ESTATE BILL.

Hon. Atty. General, on rising to move that a bill for the settlement of the Winnie Estate be read a second time, said:—This bill is similar to one which, your honors will remember passed through the Legislature last session, and it appears that as it is an act relating to private property, and the interests of private individuals, His Excellency deemed it proper to reserve it for the assent of Her Majesty; and in doing so adopted a mode not hitherto acted upon in this Colony, though it has been adopted in Canada; that is, not giving his assent on the day the other bills were assented to, but reserving it for the signature of Her Majesty's pleasure. When home, it called forth some observations from the Colonial Minister, who conceived that as it was an act of a private or local nature, the Colonial Legislature was the best adapted to judge of the matter. This gave rise to a lengthy correspondence, which is before the House, and which I hope your honors will peruse at your leisure. It appears that, though there was no objection to the principle of the bill, yet, as it was a bill of a private nature, it was thought better to follow the old mode. And I perceive that the Colonial Minister thinks the passage in the Royal Instruction to the Governor General of Canada, on this subject, was introduced under some misconception. The correspondence has resulted in its being decided to follow the old way in passing bills of this kind. I deem it necessary to make these remarks because it may be satisfactory to those who are interested in this bill to know that it was nothing but these formalities that prevented it from becoming law. It cannot do any harm to any party, as the object of it is merely to carry out what Mr. Winnie agreed to do in his life time. It shows too, that the laws of Great Britain are extended upon a due regard to the interests of private individuals, and whenever the Legislature attempts to alter the laws of the land, it is necessary to use proper precautions, so that nothing may be done to injure private interests. However, there have been no objections made to this bill, and I therefore feel assured that there will be no objections made by this, any more than the other branch of the Legislature, in passing it in its present shape.

The bill was then read a second time, passed through committee, and reported agreed to without any amendment.

Adjourned till Monday next at eleven o'clock.

MONDAY, APRIL 30.

The Hon. the President informed the House that he had received a communication from the ladies of the Convent, requesting the members of the Council to favor that institution with a visit to-morrow at ten o'clock.

A Bill to continue certain Acts therein mentioned, and the Winnie Estate Bill were severally read the third time and passed.

On motion, a bill "to incorporate the Souris Bank," was read the second time and committed—Hon. Mr. Walker in the Chair.

Hon. Mr. McDonald: We have a great many applications for bills of this kind. This will be the sixth or seventh bank on this Island, and I am getting afraid that such a great increase in these institutions, represented by small capitals, will not have the effect anticipated. I believe that if parties in Souris wished to have accommodation, they could obtain it more effectually, and at much less expense, by applying to one of the city banks to establish a branch there, and other places likewise. They are better able to keep a certain amount of specie, to have proper safes and vaults,—it costs a good deal to get the notes printed and get the institution into operation, so that I am afraid they will be the means of getting the people into trouble and difficulty. Large numbers of persons sometimes land from the fishing trawlers in summer, and some of them might be tempted to make raids upon them and deprive them of their specie, when they are unprotected, as they must necessarily be, in such out of the way places. However, I will not oppose this bill, though I regret that the people of Souris did not take the course which I have indicated.

On motion, a bill "to amend the Act to incorporate the Souris Bank," was read the second time and committed—Hon. Mr. Walker in the Chair.

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CLOSING OF THE SESSION.

THE STRUGGLE IN NOVA SCOTIA AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

The Hon. Joseph Howe is doing noble work in Nova Scotia against Confederation. He has held several mass meetings in some of the Western Counties, where he carried all before him. His speech at Windsor, which occupied three hours in delivering, is a decidedly clever one, and a noble effort in the cause of freedom. His influence, it is confidently believed, will be felt to some purpose in the approaching struggle in New Brunswick, where the Constitutional Party are laboring earnestly and diligently to secure a decisive triumph. It is evident that if Nova Scotia had the chance of deciding at the polls upon Confederation, Dr. Tupper and his fellow-plotters, who betrayed the rights of the people, would receive a lesson that would serve them for the rest of their lives; and if New Brunswick, in the present crisis, does her duty as she is expected to do, Nova Scotia will yet have the chance to undo the foul and treacherous act which has lately trampled her noble Constitution and her liberty in the dust, and to punish the unhalloved aggressions of selfish and ambitious men. All eyes are now centered on New Brunswick. Prostrate Nova Scotia implores her to stand firm, and, in maintaining her own rights, succoring the betrayed Province; the friends of British connection and of constitutional liberty, throughout these Provinces, appeal to her to stand true; and, finally, self-interest and the instinct of self-preservation invite her to break the confederational coils in which she is sought to be forever bound. We have every reason to hope that these appeals will not be made in vain; but that New Brunswick will come forth successfully and triumphantly through this second ordeal through which she has had to pass, in order to secure the "priceless blessing" of self-government.

THE ISLANDER OF FRIDAY DOES NOT ATTEMPT TO DENY THAT MR. POPE HAS BEEN VISITING CANADA ABOUT CONFEDERATION.

THE VISIT TO HALIFAX OF THE UNITED STATES MONITOR MANTON.

The visit to Halifax of the United States Monitor *Manton*, two-turret ship, and the gunboat *Augusta*—the vanguard of the United States squadron of war vessels to the Fishing Grounds—created a good deal of excitement in this City. Both vessels were visited by His Excellency Vice-Admiral Sir James Hopes, K. C. B., and by thousands of the citizens of Halifax. The Monitor especially is conceded to be a most formidable vessel. Her deck is scarcely two feet above the water, and can be submerged when going into action. Both vessels left Halifax for St. John's, Nfld., on Thursday last.

SHIP NEWS.

The steamer "Island City" now lies between Halifax, Yarmouth and intermediate ports.
