

The clan totem of the indian is one of the most interesting productions of the red man. These strange specimens of wood sculpture are still to be found in British Columbia, especially along the Pacific Coast, as well as in Alaska. In many a waterside village these curiously crested poles stand in prominent places, or along the main street, as in Alert Bay, or over the graves of bronze warriors who have gone to their happy hunting grounds. To the white man they are as mysterious as the druidical stones, but to the ladian they tell the clan to which the dead ludian belonged, as well as his tribal status.

Each clan of the Indians of Alaska and British Columbia has its own totem, from which it takes its name. Thus there is the clan of the wolf, the clan of the raven, the clan of the frog, and so on. All the members of the clan are supposed to be descended, actually and literally, from the snimals whose names they bear, and to conduct themselves always with due remembrance tof the fact. For example, a man isn't supposed to kill or eat his father, and, therefore, the indians of the bear clan, for instance, are not supposed to eat or kill bear. That animal is sacred to them, and the medicine man or "shaman" of the clan will invoke the direct penalties so any member who dares to transgress that rule.

The marriage customs of the clan are regulated by their totem, it is absolutely unthinkable that two members of the same clan should giver marry. With them a bear must mate with a raven, or a fox or a beaver or a shark or a member of some other clan, and never with a bear.





DRESSES YORK CO COUNCIL

The York County Council on Fri lay afternoon listened to an interest ng a dress from Coun Thomas Park er of Doaktown, a member of the Northumberland Municipal Council, who in reviewing current events, re ferred shortly to several matters which the various councils are called ipon to deal. He lid not appear to be very enthusastic with regard to the Provincial Government's scheme for distributing seed wheat and oats the iability to be shouldered by the Council, nor did he like the present system of laying out lands under the Labor Act, which he claimed only led to isolation, instead of community settlement. He referred also to the great need of a larger populat on, which would stimulate indust rial enterprise and greater production. A good many of the Government's officiats appeared to him (Parker) to result in "kind of a draw."
