HOWARD P. ROBINSON NEW PRESIDENT

Howard P. Robinson, of Saint John was elected president of the New Bruns wick Tourist and Resources Association at the annual meeting held on Wednesday afternoor, at the Board of Trade rooms, succeeding C, C. Avard, retiring president. Raymond S. Peck, director of the Canadian Government Motion Picture Bureau, and F. C' Badgley, assistant director, received assurance of cooperation in their work of filming interesting provincial features.

President Avard, in his address, em phasized the importance of the tourist. industry and said the number of tourists coming to the province ould be at east fifty per cent greater than last year. Nore advertising, better hotel accommodation and an incr ased interest in the weifare of visitors were advocated. Oa Mr. Ava-d's suggestion, the date of the closing of the fiscal year was changed rom June to December 31.

The retiring president also advocated hat the financial s poort of hotels, garages and others, directly berefited by tourist travel, be sought. Also that private camp sites be encouraged and that the president and secretary-treasurer visit different sections of the province to ascertain actual conditions.

The question of advancing the membership fee to \$5.00 will be discussed at he next meeting.

New Law Provides **Stiff Penalties**

Smugglers of liquor, local bootleggers and even purchases of an occasional bottle, now face stiff jail sentences as an amendment to the Customs Act, passed at the recent session of the Federal Pariment, has greatly increased the penal ties for the smuggling of liquor into the country. The full text of the amend ment has been received by the Custem Officers and they are instructed that heavier sentences are possible for offend-

According to the instructions received the man who may be found with one bottle in his possession upon which th lawful customs duties have not been paid is liable under the amendment, and may be sentenced to prison at the discretion of the magistrate.

In the past the penalty for the offence which is now indictible, was an imprisonment for six months or pay convicted person. Under the amendment of a \$200 tine, optional with the ment upon the first conviction, the term of imprisonment to be imposed is not less than one year and not exceeding seven, while for an ald offender, the term may stretch anywhere from three to ten years. Fines when imposed will be in propartion to the value of the liquor seized.

Areas where thunder is rarely or never heard include the Arctic and the Antarctic regions. During an Arctic expedition lasting two or three years thunder may be experienced once, or, at most, twice.


