Monsignor Capel.

Monsignor Capel delivered a lecture at St. Francis Xavier Church, New York, from which we take the following extract—

It will be remarked we draw no distinction between truths which can or cannot be learned by the light of reason. For the definition covers both. In fact revelation re-asserts what we know of God and of ourselves by reason; but above and above this, revelation adds nothing to which unaided reason never could have attained. Therefore it is that revelation in the first firmly establishes intelligence in its own supernatural knowledge, fortifying the mind against error. And by the second the mind is initiated into the new secrets of God concerning himself, man's destiny, and man's duty to his Creator and to his neighbor. We are therefore enabled from this description and definition to draw conclusions of the most important kind. In the first place, revelation is not a body of scientific truth evolved from other truths, nor is it a scientific theory produced by the exercise of mind. It is a manifestation of God's mind to us, and consequently though there may be truths contained therein beyond the ken of human intellect, still they cannot be questioned, as they are declarations of God who is Truth. In this we have to remember the difference between comprehension and apprehension. Nay, even where a doctrine of revelation could have been obtained by the light of reason, still its certitude is of a higher order, for if we accept the testimony of man the testimony of God is greater. Consequently in this reason must ever be subordinate to revelation. In the second place we have to conclude that although the knowledge of the mind is increased by revelation, this argument is not brought about by an increase of the light of reason, but by a new light, that of grace. Both emanate from the same center, God of Truth. They are, as it were, concentric overlapping circles, that of revelation illuminated with a stronger and brighter light, having a greater circumference, enclosing the same center, God of Truth. The nature, though incidentally implying the truth of certain scientific facts, as for example, the unity of the human race underlying universal redemption. Still, as both reason and revelation are from God, who illumineth every man, they cannot be in contradiction, though the one is immeasurably above the other. To the uninitiated it is inexplicable how the sum of an infinite series is less than a finite quantity; to the man who knows it is a mystery how a flat surface can be by means of color and perspective rendered depth and distance; and yet these things are seen by the eye of faith, which it with the mysteries of revelation. In the third place, as it is God who, in His infinite wisdom, knowing the complete wants of man individually, and the needs of man collectively throughout all time, has made known the further manifestation of truth, called revelation, any of its divisions into fundamental and non-fundamental, implying thereby the importance or non-importance of certain truths, is an absurdity and a contradiction, for it virtually asserts the superiority of reason to revelation. This does not exclude a division of more and less prominently revealed truths; but the former of which must be explicitly known, while the latter need only be known implicitly by all who believe. Regarded from the level of man, it will be seen that revelation is commensurate to all the cravings of the human soul, and it meets the requirements of man in every condition and state of life. The poor and the rich, the feeble and the strong, the young and the old, the parents and children, the sinful and the holy, the educated and uneducated, all find lessons of wisdom and sources of strength in the teaching and the revealed means of redemption. The body of revelation is to be found in part in tradition, in part in Scripture. Jesus Christ, with whom ended all revelation, never wrote a word of his message of peace, some of his apostles, who were his contemporaries, did not produce a complete treatise on revelation, nor does there remain any written evidence that the Apostles ever received a command from Christ to perpetuate by writing that they had heard from him. The sacred penmen seem to have been inspired after the Christian Church was called into existence to write to the then existing Churches. Of the inspired, the new law is addressed to the converts from Judaism, while St. Mark's is written for Gentile converts. St. Luke's is the most universal. St. John's the most specific, and evidently written against the philosophers of his day. The Epistles are addressed in several instances to local churches, and in one instance even to an individual. As to dates, the earliest Gospel is written some sixty years after the ascension of Christ, while the book of revelation is not produced till about sixty years after the foundation of the Church. History passes it beyond doubt that three centuries before the Canon of Scripture was settled, and the varied parts of the New Testament collected. Consequently, the Christians of the first three centuries knew of revelation by tradition and by the authoritative voices of teachers. And indeed till our own day the custom of baptizing babies, the ignoring of the Apostolic precept of abstaining from things strangled, and the transference of the Lord's Day from the 7th to the 1st day of the week, are so many tangible proofs that revelation is practically in tradition, and in the written word, the Scripture. So far for the nature and extent of revelation. In our next conference we shall see how it is possible for man to accept with unerring certitude truths of revelation beyond the comprehension of the human mind.

What an Imperial Minister Says.

Mr. Chamberlain, the President of the Board of Trade, speaking at Wolverhampton, said that the members of the Government are firmly united. All are pursuing the same general object, and are animated with equal loyalty to the great chief. It is the bounden duty of the Liberal party to do its utmost to remove just causes of discontent and disaffection in Ireland. It must no longer tolerate such a sham, fraud, and transparent imposture as the present Irish Parliamentary representation system where only one man in twenty-five has a vote. The perpetration of this injustice would justify disaffection. It gave the leaders of the Irish party their strongest arguments for separation as showing that it was impossible to obtain justice from the British Parliament, and it gives fresh vigor to the agitation which it is our duty to ally.

General News Items.

The deficit in the Egyptian budget for 1883 is estimated at £3,000,000. Younger sons of the British aristocracy are now settling in the colonies. Colored linen is to be a la mode this season both in household and personal use. Advice from Zulaland report Cetewayo sulking, and the people in much distress.

It is reported that the Federal Council for the Australian colonies will be constituted. The Boston and Albany Railroad Company uses five tons of passengers' tickets annually. Admiral Lespes has sailed from Paris to take charge of the French fleet in Chinese waters.

The Orange Incorporation Bill will come up again this session, as declared at a late convention. Christiania, the capital of Norway, is reported to have lost 14,224 in population the present year by emigration.

The mail from San Francisco for Australia last week filled about 900 sacks. The most of it was from Europe. The Marquis of Tseng is a Chinese ex-Jesuit, who belonged to the Society in Kiang Nan, so says the newspapers.

The Kreuz Zeitung learns that England is disposed to utilize the Turkish troops and Turkish fleet against the forces of El Mahdi.

The District of Columbia authorities have directed that no more electric wires shall be strung without special permit.

A bill for the abolition of the sugar andollen goods tariff has been prepared for introduction into the United States Congress.

Judge Osborne, of Elkhardt, Ind., has instructed the grand jury to indict all dealers found selling the Police Gazette and similar papers.

A clergyman of Allegan, Mich., says that there is so much profanity in the streets of that place that they are unsafe for children and unfit for ladies.

A despatch from Salt Lake City says that the Utah part of President Arthur's message is received with demonstrations of joy by the "Americans" in that city.

A proposition is on foot to annex all the suburbs of Toronto, which will make the population more than one hundred and fifty thousand, or as much as Montreal.

A Conference of the National Temperance Society in New York, has adopted a resolution asking Congress to amend the constitution to prohibit the liquor traffic.

The police have seized a quantity of arms, ammunition, military pouches and belts in a house on Dolier Street, Dublin, occupied by a man named Dunn, who has been arrested.

Killing alligators for their skins and teeth employs a large number of men in Florida, who have engaged to furnish 500,000 skins to a French tannery in a given time.

The pay of the Archbishop of Paris has just gone down from \$9,000 to \$6,000. The Bishop of London has \$50,000 and two places, but the claims on him are innumerable.

George Bucknell, of Lake County, Cal., who is in his dotage, and has no confidence in banks, buried his bonds for greater safety, and has forgotten where he buried them.

The temperance people of Toronto are determined to make the approaching municipal elections the occasion of a movement to separate the liquor traffic from the grocery trade.

A Madrid despatch says active negotiations have been opened with the United States Government for reciprocal concessions beneficial to trade between Cuba and the United States.

The Grand Trunk traffic returns for the week ending December 1st, shows that the receipts were \$76,883, as compared with \$70,875 for the corresponding period of 1882, an increase of \$6,008.

Wages of lumbermen in the State of Maine are said to vary from \$18 to \$28 per month, but so many Provincials are flocking in that it is expected the figures will drop below the level of former years.

Boston's Law and Order League never brings a suit on evidence obtained by a spy. In this way it finds places where liquor is sold, but with great care and legitimate proofs before commencing an action.

A summary of the November report of the Bureau of Industries, just issued, says that the total crop of hay and clover in Ontario exceeds last season's by \$2,000,759 tons. The failure of fruit is general throughout the Province. In live stock a large surplus of hogs is reported.
