And although the bonus is smaller than we espected, yet we are much better pleased with it, and think it augers better for the permament prosperity of the Society, than if the shares had been sold at 64 or nearly 65 per cent. For as appears to have been obtained at a late sale cannot conceive under what circumstances man would borrow money at such a per centage. Such speculations may be safe in Toron to, bu we could not advise their adoption in Goderich. We think, however, that thirty-five or thirty-six per cent. may be obtained at the next sale ; and this, we believe, would afford a reasonable prospect both to the purchasers and to the prosperity of the Society.

Throwing aside the extreme views and advan tages arising from speculation, and regarding the institution merely in the light of a Savings Bank, we are inclined to believe that it is calculated to do much good to all who choose to avail themselves of the opportunity.
