Russian Criminals.

Must Suffer Death or Life Imprisonment for Murders and Robberies.

St. Petersburg. June 18.—Penalties of death or life imprisonment have been meted out to the men and women members of the vouthful band that for eighteen months during 1907-8 committed a series of murders and robberies that kept the residents of a lake territory in a state of terror. The sentences pronounced were recently sumbitted for confirmation to General Haenkampf, commander of the St. Petersburg garrison. Twentynine men, ranging in ages from 18 to 25 years, were sentenced to death. Eigth women escaped hanging because of their sex, but were sentenced to imprisonment for life. A fifteenyear-old boy, who was shown to have been an active outlaw, was sent to the colony for juvenile offenders. The exploits of the band are described in forty volumes of testimony that was heard at their trials. The most sensational feat was accomplished on August 23, 1907, when they held up a train on the coast railway and robbed the cashier of the Sestraretska Imperial Arms Factory, of \$6,500. Col. Sudeikin, who sat near the cashier, was shot and fatally wounded. This daring robbery was committed when the train was nearing the St. Petersburg station.

Many factories and wineshops were looted, and among those who suffered death at the hands of the desperadoes were a student, a woman, and several policemen. The condemned showed jested as their sentences were pronounced. Some of them turned to acquaintances in the court room and laughingly indicated how the halter would soon be about their necks. Several of the accused had been tried earlier and convicted of individual offences. One of the number committed suicide while in jail awaiting trial





vidual above the welfare of community?


It's just plain hysterical sentimentality. And if, whenever you meet with it.

Cut a Day Out.

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, June 18.

According to reports received here another hitch has been taken in the tightening girdle of the earth, and the effect is to bring China and Japan one day nearer for those who journey thither by way of London, Paris and the Siberian Railroad. 
