The Evening Chit-Chat

Are you one of those people who think that vices and virtues or what commonly go by those names, are north and south poles? Because they aren't.

You may think that you can put all the vices in one box and label them "vices," and all the virtues in another and label them "virtues," and set them side by side and that they will never jump over into each other's compartments.

But they will.

We have as great a person as Goldsmith's authority for a character, "even whose failings leaned to virtue's side."

And we all know an unselfishness that is so extreme as to be selfish in its appropriation of all the self-abnegation in sight.

And there is also a less popularly recognized example, in the sympathy that is so exaggerated that it is decidedly more a vice than a virtue.

Which is what I started to talk about.

It is this "sympathy" that starts and circulates and signs petitions to commute the life sentence of the convicted murderer.

There is in a Massachusetts prison a man named Jesse Pomeroy who is undoubtedly the worst type of a degenerate. While hardly more than a child himself, he enticed two children away from their homes and cruelly tortured and mutilated them.

He was put in prison, but before long was released through the efforts of a "sympathetic" woman—I am sorry to admit is more apt to be a

woman who runs the virtue of sympathy into a vice. This time, besides mutilating and torturing several more children, he killed three.

He has been put back into prison, sentenced for life. That his abnormal instincts still exist was pleasantly shown recently when his request for a cat as a comrade and pet in his solitude was granted, and he tortured the animal to death at the first opportunity. And yet every now and then some sympathetic person starts a movement to get his sentence commuted.

It is this "sympathy" that calls justice cruel when the good of all demands that some man should be made an example of.

It is this sympathy that completely spares the modern substitutes for the rod—and thereby completely spoils the child.

It is this "sympathy" that refuses to step on the worm that destroys the beautiful trees and vegetation.

Real genuine sympathy is about the most beautiful quality a man or woman can have, but this sloppy, mushy, short sighted, indiscriminate emotion that dares to call itself by that name isn't sympathy.

How can it be anything good when it places a little present suffering above much future happiness?

How can it be anything good when it places the welfare of a single individual above the welfare of the community?

It's just plain hysterical sentimentality.

And if, whenever you meet with it, you will characterize it by that name, and treat it as such, and avoid it as a contagious disease, you may put yourself on the back for having helped to discredit a very discreditable impostor.

HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

- Clam bouillon, served cold, is delicious on a warm night.
- To prevent needles from rusting, keep them in waxed paper.
- When making salmon salad, add a hard-boiled egg or two, carefully diced.
- Never stir a sponge cake batter. If that is done the air is allowed to escape.
- To overcome the habit of biting the finger nails, soak them in liquid quinine.
- Underwear should be ironed on the right side; colored clothes on the wrong side.
- Apples and onions shredded together make a sandwich filling that many people like.
- Green peppers, stuffed with fresh green corn and baked, make a dainty luncheon dish.
- Cold slaw, served in green pepper shells, is a suggestion for a dainty luncheon addition.
- To keep a veil crisp, dip it several times in alcohol and hang it up indoors to dry.
- A fine grater is better than a knife for removing the surface of anything that is burned.
- To quickly prepare horseradish or
- coconut, pare it and put it through the chopping machine.
- In sleeping keep the head as low as possible, so that the blood may have unimpeded circulation.
- A mixture of cream cheese and dates makes a delicious filling for a brown bread sandwich.
- It is much easier to climb stairs if the head is held erect and deep, regular breaths are taken.
- Pecans and almonds may be chopped coarsely and sprinkled over dressed lettuce for a dinner salad.
- In ironing fine silks and muslins, place a piece of fine cambric between the iron and the material.
- Powdered yellow ochre mixed with rice flour and rubbed on lace will give it the creamy tint so much desired.
- Olives and English walnuts, ground together and moistened with mayonnaise, make a tasty luncheon sandwich.
- Handles of table knives should never be immersed in water, or they will inevitably discolor and become loose.
- To freshen stale cake, dip it for a moment in cold milk and then rebake it in an oven at low temperature.
- When a receipt calls for a cupful of anything, it means a half-pint—an ordinary cup filled level.



Improving the Occasion

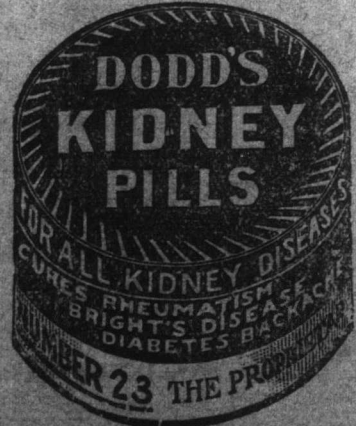
We notice that the Harbor Grace Standard is trying to improve the occasion of the dispute as to the Municipal taxation between the Municipal Council and the Commercial Cable Company by pointing out the advantages that would have accrued to the Company by locating their offices at Harbor Grace. Our contemporary is pursuing a perfectly legitimate course in directing attention to the advantages of Harbor Grace. But the course of our friends in Conception Bay should afford a lesson to those of our Municipality who believe that the proper course to pursue with a company who wish to settle in the city is to put exorbitant and special taxes on them. For special privileges the beneficiaries should pay, but attempt to exact \$2,000 a year as a Municipal tax from cable companies is sufficient to keep them out and to drive them to the outports.

College Cricket.

The St. Bonaventure and Methodist College teams played a league match Saturday afternoon on St. George's Field under favourable conditions.

The St. Bon's went to the wicket first and scored up 40 runs of which Emerson made 12 for his own bat. The Methodist were all put out for 27 runs, Fenwick having 10 to his credit. The bowling of the St. Bon's was very good and secured the applause of their supporters. The keenest part of the contest was now to come when the St. Bon's team had to make 13 to win. The Methodist bats played a fine game and kept the St. Bon's down to a score of 17 for the second innings. The victory now looked easy for the Methodist. They soon made up that 24 but Fox of the St. Bon's was getting in his work in a determined manner and saved the situation by a narrow margin of three runs, when the last man was "stumped." The umpires were, F. Miller, J. B. Rawlins. The closeness of the scores all through made the game exciting.

LATEST FROM INGRAHAM.
Letters received to-day from Capt. Rose of the Ingraham, say that the weather is very rough at Battle Hr., with stormy east winds. The ship visited all the harbors from Blanc Sablon to Battle Hr., and reports just a sign of fish.



Portia's Fishery News.

From Capt. Fitzpatrick of the s.s. Portia we learn that there is no damage to traps or gear west of Cape Race as a result of the storm. On the Southern Shore about half the traps were out in the stormy weather and about 50 per cent. of these had been damaged or lost. All along the shore fish are very plentiful, and Saturday the boats were in at 7 o'clock in the morning, a very early hour, with full loads, jigged or taken with trawls. Capt. Fitzpatrick, himself an experienced banking master and all round fisherman, still holds that his prophecy published in the Telegram will be fulfilled, viz., that it will be an extra good fishery from Cape St. Francis to St. Pierre.

Fell Into Cellar.

A cow, the property of John Walsh, fell into his cellar this morning, at the Goulds. It is an outdoor vegetable cellar and the hatch being off the cow walked in and went down head foremost. After an hour's hard work with the help of ten men with ropes and block and tackle the cow was got up and was found to be uninjured.

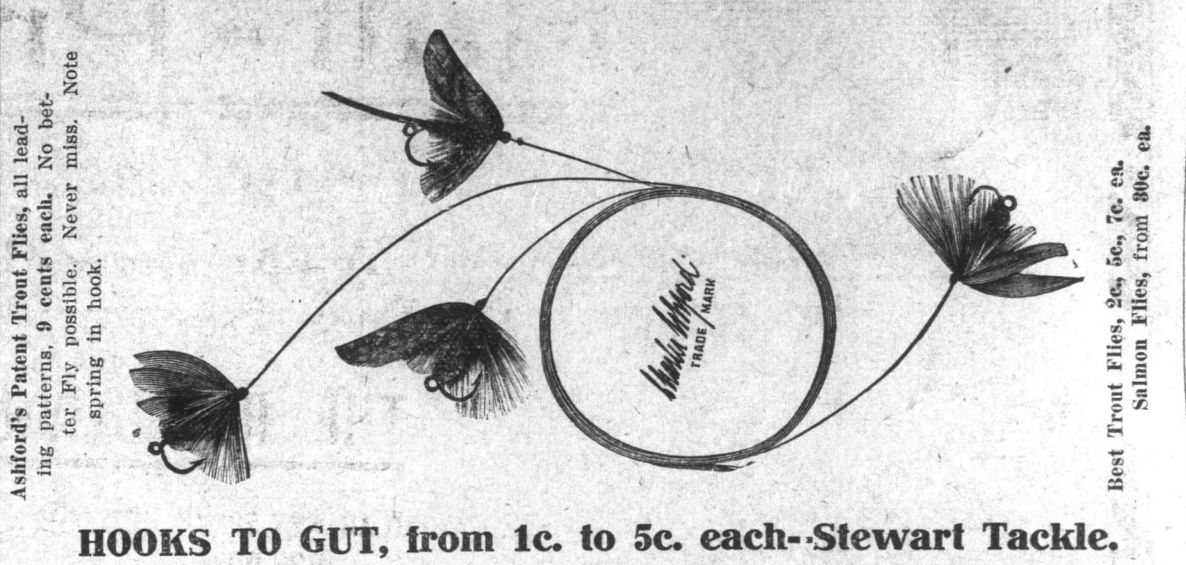

Good Fishery Reports. The little schooner Annie B. A. Miller, master, which arrived from Placentia yesterday reports that at island Head and Northern Head, Cape Shore, the traps were hauled on Thursday last for the first time and had from 40 to 50 quintals each. The traps at Paradise and neighbourhood had from 50 to 60 quintals, and dories on Monday and Tuesday did well, but owing to bad weather could not resume fishing till Friday. Coming down the Southern Shore, Saturday, the fishermen reported plenty of fish and all the boats were loaded, especially at Renewes and Fermeuse. Several of the Placentia skills were dismantled on the grounds in the stormy weather of last week, and the dories which were driven off in the gale would have been lost but that their crews boarded the schooners fishing on the outer grounds. She reports whales plentiful in Placentia Bay, and saw two killed by the whalers moored 6 miles off Ship Cove, on Saturday. At Rose au Rue one fish was on the slip and two others moored nearby. The factory there is short handed and men will not work for the wages offered, preferring to go to the codfishery. The schooner reports the big fish to be very plentiful also along the Southern Shore.

As you sail up the Arm, that beautiful little town, Britannia Cove, with its nice houses, churches, schools and hall and mercantile premises of J. T. Currie, Esq., tells its own story of improvement. But, Mr. Editor, the greatest changes that I see all around is Broad Cove shore, from Foster's Point up as far as Snook's Brook. Thirty years ago there was only four or five families on Broad Cove shore. It was then a wilderness, now it has about sixty families, with two schools, a beautiful church and Orange hall, and thanks to the Liberal Government and energy of the late Noah Baird in carefully handling every dollar at their disposal, they have beautiful roads; and as far as I can see everything is on the upward grade. There is another industry here, conducted by Pitman Bros. Here also is a marked change for the better. With their steam and machinery everything is in order for making brick. They have on hand now about one hundred thousand splendid brick, and I would advise contractors and others wanting brick to place their orders with Pitman Bros. if they want good, reliable brick. There is one grievance the people have to put up with and that is their mail service. Until this winter the mailman lived at Shoal Harbor, and as soon as the mail came he brought it down, and if a man wanted to send a return letter he could send it on the same day. But the Tories got it changed to suit their heels. A person has got to wait a week now to get a letter back if ever so urgent.

Now, Mr. Editor, I must close for I am afraid of the "basket"; but I must say I enjoyed my visit in that locality, and if there are any who need a rest from business they won't find a more pleasant spot to spend a week or two.

The Shipwrights Refuse Wages.

The Telegram noted recently that the shipwrights of the city had made a demand for \$2.50 per day for work done on local shipping. The mercantile body was notified of this and the men who immediately employ the union workers, but the mechanics say that nothing was said, and the belief entertained by them was that silence meant consent. Saturday evening the 40 odd men who are working on the various jobs in the city were offered \$2 per day for their week's work but refused and left, leaving the money in the hands of their employers. Their union is incorporated, and the men say they will not accept anything less than \$2.50 for the last week, and will not work for anything less in future. Some few who worked at odd jobs on schooners in their own behalf last week received \$2.50 per day from the owners. The men assembled on Dunder's premises to-day to take steps to protect themselves and form plans for their future guidance.

A Sudden Death.

About 9.30 Saturday night as Mr. James Hudson, of Henry Street, accompanied by his wife, was returning from a visit to his son's residence in Georgetown, when passing out near Rawlins' Cross was seized with a sudden illness and fell to the street, dying in a few moments. People passing ran to the stricken man's aid and he was conveyed to the surgery of Dr. Macpherson near but was beyond help, death having overtaken him very quickly. Rev. Fr. O'Callaghan was promptly summoned from the Cathedral but when he arrived life was extinct. Dr. Macpherson pronounced death to be due to heart disease. Mr. Hudson, who was over 70 years old, was for the past 13 years night watchman at Bennett's Brewery and was well known and respected in the community. To his widow and family the Telegram extends its condolence.

The Invermore Back.

The S. S. Invermore, Capt. Parsons arrived here at 12.40 p.m. yesterday from Labrador. The ship went as far north as Macovic, a distance of 859 miles, and about 80 miles this side of Nain. There was no ice on the coast. Nearly all the schooners were down and had their trap berths secured. There was a good sign of fish from Domino to Battle Harbor, and several traps had from five to ten quintals the early part of last week. The weather was very stormy on the return trip and the ship had to put up for two days at Hawke's Harbor. The storm that prevailed last week threw a heavy sea in all along the coast and prevented fishing.

Portia From the West.

The S. S. Portia, Capt. Fitzpatrick, arrived here at 6 a.m. yesterday from the westward. She left here on the 10th inst., and except for a couple of days, last week when a gale of N. E. wind was experienced with heavy sea, she had the weather. The ship brought a small freight and these passengers:—Messrs. P. F. Power, McDonald, J. J. Curtis, J. Fowler, Mrs. Edstrom; Misses Quinland (2), and Edstrom and 5 second class.

SCHOONER IN TOW.

Coming this way the s.s. Susu called at Catalina and took in tow for this port the schr. Gertrude L. When the ship had come about 15 miles on her way the hawser parted owing to a heavy sea running. Later the hawser was spliced, but fearing it was not strong enough to again stand the strain the schooner was towed back to Catalina and will be brought up next trip.

To Hold Investigation

Into Cause of Fire in Montreal, in Which Many Lives Were Lost.

Montreal, June 14.—At a meeting of the Board of Control to-day Mr. Chausse, the building inspector, was unable to give any definite views as to the cause of disaster, and the controllers instructed him to make a complete report of the matter. When the Herald company purchased the building the architect had gone over the whole structure and he found that it was satisfactory in every respect.

Controller Wanklyn, an engineer, was assured that the collapse of the tank was not the first cause. The water tank had been in position for three years, and it had been carefully put up with due consideration to the weight-bearing capacity of the building, so that there must have been some exterior cause which caused a collapse in one portion of the structure, and thus brought down the huge tank about the heads of the employees.

The Mayor says there is no regulations regarding water tanks, but there will be shortly. Many stories of heretism are told. Laura Amesse, the forswoman of the blindery, after helping many girls to climb out of the windows, went back to see if she could be of any assistance to others, and she lost her life. Throughout her work she kept her presence of mind. When her companions asked her to escape with them, she called out, "No, girls, there are more at the back of the room, and I can't leave

them," and she dashed into the flames and oblivion, for the flooring onto which she ran had given way, and undoubtedly the brave young woman pitched to her death six stories below among the ruined mass of debris and seething fire.

Pathetic Cases.

One of the most pathetic of the many pathetic scenes was the terrible sorrow of Jeanette Simpson, who was to be a bride in three weeks, and now she will wear crepe instead of a white veil. Her fiancé, R. Morrison, wished to change his position and went to the Herald Office Monday to apply for work there. When the crash came he was caught in the swirl of debris and has not been seen since. Miss Simpson stayed all night long, refusing to go away, and refusing coffee and sandwiches.

Another case was Jennie White, who was to be married in two months to another employee of the Herald, Mr. Pfecher. He escaped, but when he searched for his wife-to-be he found that both she and his sister had been buried tons deep in the ruins.

The s.s. Siberian left Liverpool Saturday last for St. John's.

Trouble at Flatrock.

Some time ago a quantity of iron was sent to Flatrock to be used at the erection of a Government wharf there, but was not availed of for some reason and was stored away in the store of a resident. Recently it was found that most of it had vanished. The matter was reported to the police, and Sgt. Byrne was down investigating Saturday. It is believed that certain parties, thinking that the man on whose premises the material was kept was authorized to keep it, became jealous of him and took the iron, and sooner than he should enjoy its use flung it into the harbor.

Regatta Meeting.

A meeting of the citizens interested in the Regatta will take place to-night. The fact that a new boat is being built by the Methodist Guards to compete in the races will give an additional interest to these popular annual sports. It is desirable that the meeting to-night be largely attended.

A Schooner Lost.

By the s.s. Susu we learn that the schr. Beothic, Capt. Jas. Barbour, was lost at Newtown, B.B., in the storm of Thursday last. With all her gear on board, including cod traps, seines and other fishing gear and provisions for the Labrador voyage, and when the storm began increasing in violence she was hauled from the wharf at which she lay into the harbor and was moored with two anchors. These held for a while, but as the seas rose the strain became intense, the anchors dragged and she was driven out the port, going ashore on Green Island, where she was quickly dashed in pieces by the action of the waves. Two of her crew, natives of Salvage, were on board and had to escape in their dory when the vessel began to drift. They had a close call for their lives and landed in an exhausted condition. The loss to Mr. Barbour is a heavy one as the vessel was worth fully \$1,800, while the fishing gear and supplies are worth approximately \$3,000, so that nearly \$5,000 in property went to bottom, on which there is not a cent of insurance.

Fishermen Lose Heavily in Storm.

In the stormy weather of last week Willis Reid of the Battery had his two traps swept away with the sea and only secured three grampels with some rope attached. This is a monetary loss of over \$600 and a prospective voyage of fish. T. Snelgrove lost his trap also, and Geo. Lowe's trap is pretty well torn up, the remains of it being landed at the King's Wharf Saturday. The schr. Norah picked up a trap buoy and 7 fathoms of rope attached out around the Cape Saturday. All the people of the Battery, except one or two, have either lost their traps or they are badly torn up by the sea. At Quiddi Vidi a similar tale is told, and in the eastern settlements in addition to traps, boats and stages lost or partially destroyed, many herring and salmon nets are gone. This is a great blow to our fishermen, especially at this season when the trap fishery had just begun, and it behoves the Government if they have the interests of these devoted people at heart to render immediate and liberal aid.

St. Patrick's Parish.

After last Mass at St. Patrick's Church yesterday forenoon about 400 men of the parish met in the convent schoolroom to concert measures for the repairing of the church. Rev. Dean Born called the meeting to order and in a short address showed the necessity for some steps to be taken to put the edifice in proper repair. He expressed the hope that a good working committee would be formed to undertake the task. On motion of Mr. T. J. Wall, Mr. W. J. Ellis was moved to the chair, and in a very lucid and practical address not alone appealed to his hearers to sustain the traditions of their religious forefathers, but also showed what measures should be taken to attain the desired result, and as a mechanic gave practical advice as to what particular repairs were required. He estimated that to complete the tower and cap it with a steeple would cost about \$10,000. Both the north wall and facade wanted the best attention, all the walls required pointing, and he suggested that the church be enlarged by the addition of a transept as the structure is now not large enough for the congregations who attend. Speeches were also made by Messrs. F. J. Morris, E. M. Jackman, Jno. Barron, Jas. J. Power (cooper), M. McCarthy and others. A subscription list was then opened and the enthusiasm of all present was such that several came forward with sums of \$100 each, others put their names down for similar amounts, and when all present came forward over \$2,000 had been subscribed and a considerable amount of this already handed in in cash, and those who subscribed their names intend to send in their contributions shortly. It was determined to begin the work of repairs immediately. A financial committee was then formed with Rev. Dean Born as chairman, and associated with him are Messrs: John Barron, W. J. Ellis, F. J. Morris, E. M. Jackman, Garrett Byrne, Jas. O'Brien, Jas. McLoughlan and a number of others. The Roman Catholics of the West End have determined once and for all to put this church in the best possible order, and when the tower and spire are finished and the whole completed, the sacred edifice will be a monument to their generosity.

CELLS FILLED UP. — Saturday night the police placed 13 prisoners in the cells at the lockup. Nine of these were drunks and the rest disorderlies. Six were released yesterday on the usual sums being deposited for the privilege.

MUNICIPAL METHODS.

PROTECTION AGAINST FIRE.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I am in search of a little information concerning a matter of grave interest to the city, but I am afraid that I shall have to wait for a time before I obtain it. You are aware how utterly impossible it is to provoke the present Municipal Council to give an answer to the pertinent enquiries which I have addressed to it. I shall therefore respectfully submit the question I have now entered upon its duties. I wonder whether IT will answer. My question concerns the ordinances which the Legislature has made to protect us against such a devastating fire as swept the town in 1892, and the manner in which those ordinances are obeyed or disobeyed by the Municipal Council. If you will turn to the Municipal Act you will observe that the statute forbids anybody to "build, erect, or put up any building or erection other than such as shall be built of brick, stone or other unflammable material" on the south side of Duckworth Street, and to the southward of Duckworth Street. Now this is peremptory law, and the Council has no discretion to appeal or over-ride such a peremptory enactment. It is worth while, then, to enquire the extent to which the present Council has obeyed this law and the extent to which it has disobeyed it. I do not propose to go into the matter exhaustively—I shall content myself with citing an instance where the observance of the law comes in question. On the south side of Duckworth Street there is a building now occupied by the business of W. A. Slattery, which is understood to be managed by Mr. John L. Slattery, the Secretary-Treasurer of the Municipal Council. This building was originally wholly of fire proof material, but when it fell into the occupancy of Slattery it became necessary to enlarge it, and it was in fact, some months ago, enlarged until it now extends from Duckworth Street to the narrow lane in the rear. But is this extension built of brick, stone, or other unflammable material? That is the question. In point of fact it is built to a large degree at least of wood covered with iron. Now iron is unflammable material, of course, but wood is not, and I am anxious

to know whether the present Council regards a building of wood with an iron cover upon it as being an iron building. If it is not, then this extension of the Slattery building is not built of unflammable material as the act ordains. I think the man in the street will be inclined to think that a building of wood simply covered with iron can hardly be described as an iron building or as a building erected of unflammable material. And the Municipal Act seems to take the same view of the matter, for when it permits a building in this locality to be roofed with iron it uses words which imply that the iron used in roofing is merely a "covering." If the iron on the roof, then, is only a "covering," the iron on the sides is only a "covering" also, and this building cannot be described as an iron-built building, or as unflammable. I therefore propound to the incoming Council the question whether IT regards this building as being erected in conformity with the terms of the Municipal Act. If it does not, I would respectfully ask it to enquire whether the present Council so regarded it, and under what circumstances it gave the permission to build this extension in such a manner. In particular I would ask whether the Engineer was asked to report upon the question whether this building of wood, covered with iron, was such a one as the Municipal Council contemplated to be erected on this site, and whether he approved of it as being an unflammable building satisfying the requirements of the Act. I would also respectfully ask whether any plans for this building were submitted to the Council before it was erected, and whether those plans were submitted to and approved of by the Engineer, and whether the plans provided for an extension made of wood covered with iron. If the plans submitted described the extension as being intended to be built of wood covered with iron, I should like to know upon what principle the Council adopted them as being a satisfactory compliance with the Municipal Act. This matter is not a trivial one, but one of vital interest to the town. It is highly important that we should know whether the commonly accepted views of what is a fire-proof building are acquiesced in by the Council or not. If the Council takes a different view of this matter from what

the town believes and from what the Legislature apparently intended, it is important that the Legislature should be asked at the next session to enforce its ordinances by amendment to the Municipal Act. The surrounding circumstances of this case make it an especially grave one, for the buildings which adjoin this section seem to be constructed in the same way as this, namely, of wood covered with iron. We thus have in a closely-built-over part of the town a row of buildings which are brick or stone in front, but are merely wood and iron in the rear, and there is no break of connection, so far as can be seen, between the front and the rear. I think, whatever may be the facts attending this matter, that they should be fully and frankly laid before us, so that we may know just where we stand and take such precautionary methods in the future as shall, so far as is humanly possible, save us from a repetition of the disaster of 1892.

Noted Dramatist Dead

Carbonear Indignant About Labrador Mail.

CARBONEAR, To-Day.

The Invermore arrived yesterday morning. Nearly every man, woman and child interested was anxious to hear of the safe arrival of their loved ones on the bleak coast of the Labrador, and yet they were made to wait 24 hours before the mail was delivered. The public are indignant. Who is to blame? The merchants have pocket Marconi systems. Poor people have to rely on the mail, and want justice from public servants. Speak up Mr. Goodison, Mr. Woods, or whoever is to blame for this new but callous arrangement.

Flood Horrors.

VIENNA, June 18.

The destruction of life and property by floods throughout Hungary exceeds all records. The number of deaths has not yet been ascertained, but it is believed they will aggregate close to a thousand. The damage to crops and property will amount to several million dollars. The harvest is seriously threatened with destruction. In one district 300 bodies have been recovered. In another 100 persons perished, and in the Temesvar District 180 persons are reported drowned.

The Vatican and Spain

MADRID, June 19.

A semi-official note intimates that if the Vatican insists upon coupling its protest against the Royal Decree, issued on June 11th, with the negotiations to revise the Concordat, the Government will break off all negotiations. The Royal Decree authorizes the edifices of non-Catholic religious societies to display the insignia for Public Worship and other ceremonies. Don Vico, the Papal Nuncio, made a formal protest against the decree on the ground that the Government should maintain the status quo, pending the result of the negotiations, relating to the revision of the Concordat.

Sectarian Rioting.

VALENCIA, Spain, June 19.

Anti-Clerical rioters to-day broke into the Catholic Club and demolished the furniture. Demonstrations also have occurred in other quarters. Since last Sunday, when a crowd of Republicans were attacked by groups of Catholics, while leaving an anti-clerical meeting, and were fired upon from the Carlist Club, there have been many clashes between the two factions.

A Railway Fatality.

PROUX, France, June 19.

The casualty list of a collision which occurred here yesterday between two trains, numbers 19 dead and 30 injured. The wreckage caught fire after the accident and one of the trains was entirely consumed.

P. S. A.

At the Pleasant Sunday Afternoon Class, held in the Congregational Church, yesterday, a large audience listened attentively to a thoroughly practical address delivered by Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell on the nature of his work in connection with the Deep Sea Mission. The doctor's preliminary remarks were an interpretation of Christian service, he said, would doubtless be considered heterodox by some people; but it was the result of a close study of the mind of Christ, and the voice of God speaking to him through his intuitions. The Christian churches to-day were composed of members who thought that church-going, and the living of an upright life, constituted the essence of Christianity. It was infinitely easier to talk of bearing the cross, and wearing the crown, than to do work of a practical nature. The speaker also dissented from the distinction so frequently drawn between secular and spiritual labours. If he correctly interpreted the life of Christ, ministrations to broken bodies were as spiritual in their nature as ministrations to wounded spirits. The setting of a limb was appreciated by the Master equally as much as showing a man the way to Heaven. He firmly believed that the citizens of St. John's who were devoting their money and their energies to an attempted eradication of tuberculosis in the colony, were apostles of the Lord Christ, and would ultimately accomplish a task that was none other than the work of God.

Dr. Grenfell briefly outlined the progress of his work in Labrador during the last eighteen years, and enumerated a series of incidents in connection with the labours he had to perform. In concluding, he appealed for the sympathy, and, more particularly, the practical assistance of his audience in the great work of alleviating the lot of his fishermen in Labrador and Newfoundland.

The Susu Arrives.

The s.s. Susu, Capt. B. Barbour, arrived here yesterday from the Northward at 4 p.m. She had fine weather after leaving here on the 14th inst., but on the evening of Monday a N. E. gale began with a tremendous sea. This continued almost without abatement until Friday morning. The ship owing to adverse weather could not call at the Outer Wadhams, Musgrave Harbor, Tilton Harbor, Little Fogo Island, Peckford's Island and Ladle Cove when going North. As the ship returned the storm had abated sufficiently to enable her to land her mails and freight at Musgrave Harbor. The storm, so Capt. Barbour reports, was severely felt north, and though it is not definitely known owing to the ship's hurried departure from Musgrave what the losses are, but it is believed that many traps have been destroyed. At several places including Joe Batt's Arm and Fogo there was good fishing for a while last week and traps secured from 4 to 12 quintals. The ship met dense fog off Catalina Saturday. The ship had almost a full freight and her passengers were—Mr. Cartwright, Capt. John Bartlett, T. Lockyer, S. Parsons, Dr. Robertson, son and maid and a few steerage.

C. E. M. S. Initiation Service.

The first public service for the admission of C. E. M. S. members ever held in the city took place at the Cathedral yesterday afternoon, under the auspices of the Men's Society. His Lordship the Bishop presided, and was assisted by Rev. J. Bell. The following clergymen were received and initiated:—Revs. Canons Noel, Smith, R.D. and White; Rev. A. Pittman, R.D., Rev. A. G. Bayley, R.D., and Rev. J. Brinton; also the following laymen:—H. W. LeMessurier, J. A. Clift, W. W. Blackall, R. B. Wood, A. Stafford, W. H. Goodland, R. Gear McDonald and C. Hunt. Rev. J. Britton, President of the C. E. M. S., at Bay de Verde, occupied a place in the choir. The address was delivered by Rev. A. G. Bayley, R.D., of Bonavista, who expatiated on the reasons that led to the inauguration of the C. E. M. S. There are now 3,000 branches and 90,000 active workers. He hoped to see the C. E. M. S. still further extended all over the country.

Vey, our well known artist, who has delighted our people so often with his beautiful lime light views, has promised to take part with Mr. Shortis and illustrate his lecture with over a hundred views of Conception Bay. He also states that he has twenty new views taken at the seal fishery last winter, the finest that has ever been seen in the country and he promises to bring these forward for the first time at this lecture. When we remember the racy anecdotes that Mr. Shortis has given it makes us all wish to be present at this lecture and see him in his native health delighting the audience with stories that will stir them to the heart core.

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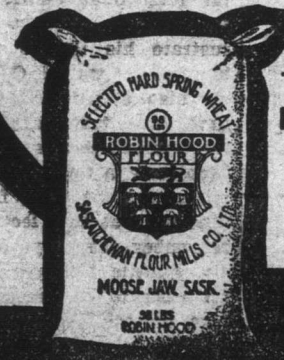
