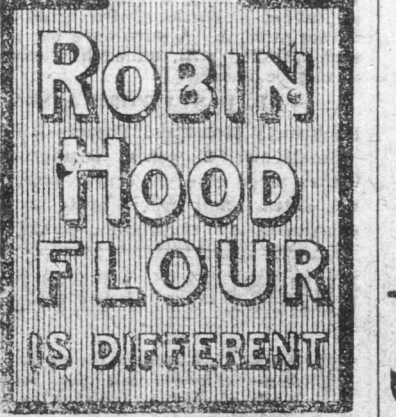

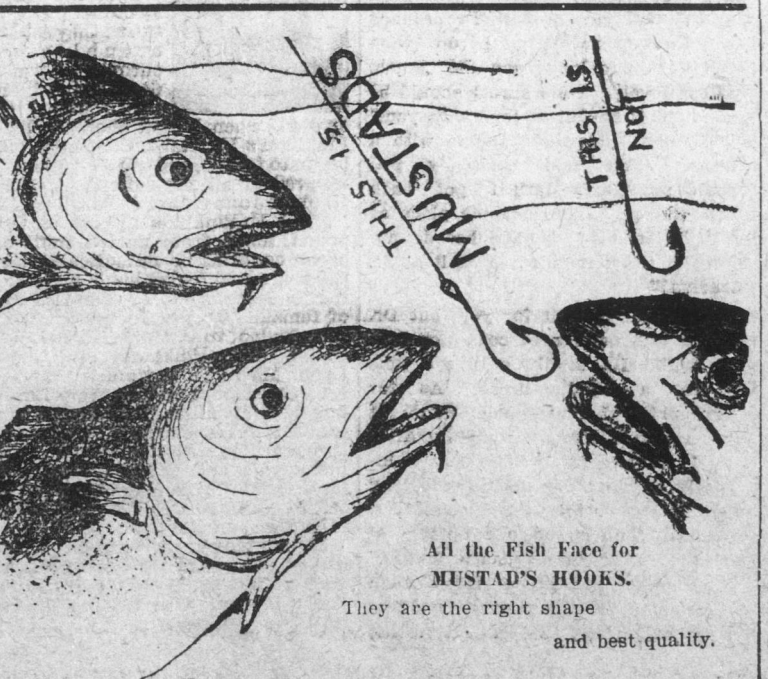

Important to Newfoundland.

We direct the attention of our readers to the cable report of the United States Customs decision as to the admission of fish into American ports. It is a decision fraught with possibilities for Newfoundland. It is a decision which apparently reverses the usage which was confirmed only so recently as December last. That usage was the admission of fish, herring, &c., purchased in Newfoundland duty free, if imported by Americans in American bottoms; whilst the same fish was dutiable if exported by Newfoundlanders. That usage has long been the subject of discussion.

In his speech on the Foreign Fishes Vessels Bill in 1908, Sir Robert Bond commented strongly on the practice, and American journals have freely discussed the practice as "The Smuggling of Herring."

Even so recently as November last the practice was confirmed in a decision of the Board of General Appraisers of New York.

An appeal was entered against this decision, and those interested in Newfoundland have during the past few days been awaiting the result of the appeal. By these gentlemen the cable report is taken to contain the gist of the decision on that appeal. That decision we have already observed reverses the decision in the Carter case and a long established usage. Under the Treasury Department ruling

(1) Fish (cod or herring, &c.) caught in Newfoundland waters by Newfoundland vessels and taken to America by American fishermen must pay duty.

(2) Cod, herring, &c., bought by American fishermen in Newfoundland waters, apparently treaty waters (not) and taken to America in American bottoms are dutiable.

In short, it seems to mean that Newfoundlanders who export herring, &c., to America are placed on the same footing as regards duty as the Gloucester fishermen who resort to Bay of Islands and purchase herring. We wish these statements to be taken with some reserve. They are based on a press message which is but a resume of probably a long judgment. Further, the Government, who we are told on enquiry, has no confirmation of it as yet.

On the face of it, the decision improves our position. It should afford some opening for the remunerative handling of herring, &c., by our people in the American market.

One merchant, with whom we discussed the matter, believes it will lead to the employment of Newfoundland schooners in this trade.

The tide seems to be with Newfoundland now. The Hague decision was favourable. Herring is beginning to resort to Fortune Bay and Placentia Bay again. Owing to an advertising campaign there is a great demand for fish in America. Gloucester is at her wit's end to cope with it. She is praying for the privilege of purchasing herring on the South Coast, and now the U. S. Treasury decision strengthens our position. Newfoundland should be able to make good out of all these favourable circumstances.

Twillingate Fire.

Dr. Ledrew's House Destroyed. The residence of Dr. Ledrew, at Twillingate, was destroyed by fire yesterday morning about 3 o'clock. The doctor with his wife, child, and servant girl had only time to escape in their night clothes. The house and contents are supposed to be worth about \$3,000, and there is no insurance. The surgery adjoining was also burnt down. The neighbours assisted and prevented the fire from spreading to the houses nearest. Mr. W. Ashbourne, of Twillingate, who is in town, and who received a telegram about the fire, says that it is believed the destruction was caused by fire left in the grate getting at the wood-work near it on account of the cementing work being imperfect.

Windows Broken By the Storm.

In the height of the storm yesterday, about 1.30 p.m., a heavy gust of wind lifted the cornice board completely off the "Freeman Building," corner of Water Street and Waldegrave Street. The wind carried it high in the air over the roofs of three houses near by, and on coming down it was driven against the window of Flynn's saloon breaking two large panes of glass. A man and a boy who were passing at the time had a very narrow escape. The board was carried about 100 feet.

(Before Chief Justice.)

A. T. Ritchie & Co. vs. Geo. M. Barr.

Franklin & Co., of St. John's, merchants, do appear and state the nature and particulars of their respective claims to the subject matter of this action, and maintain or relinquish such claims, and that it be referred to the Taxing Master to tax the defendant's costs in this action, and that such costs when taxed be paid out of the subject matter of this action; and that the said Franklin & Co. be restrained from commencing proceedings against the defendants in respect of the subject matter of this action and that further action be stayed. Sir J. S. Winter for defendant. Mr. Howley opposed for plaintiff and Mr. Fenelon for Franklin & Co. The application was dismissed without costs.

Impeding the Fire Workers.

From time to time the Telegram has called attention to the fact that our fire brigade is too often hampered in the discharge of their duties by the thoughtless conduct of young people, who place themselves in positions of danger whilst the various fires are in progress. Last night, for instance, when the Central men were approaching the scene of the conflagration on Spencer Street, a young boy ran right in front of the chemical engine, and only for the presence of mind of the driver, who reined in, a serious accident might have been the result. People not only endanger their own lives in this thoughtless way, but handicap the operations of the firemen, to whom time and speed means everything.

Dr. Pritchard and wife arrived in town from Bay Roberts to-day. The former is now entirely recovered from the effects of the Dunlop shooting.

More Damage Reported

The storm of last evening was exceptionally severe at Quidi Vidi, and a chimney surmounting the roof of the kitchen, about 3 feet high, fell at Pleasantville, the residence of Mr. J. Dooley, and the roof was badly damaged, the bricks being scattered about the place. Mr. Dooley went up on the roof of the structure, and narrowly escaped being blown off and killed. A gust of wind struck the coach house door at the rear and blew it down, ripped off the felt and part of the roof and generally created havoc. It will take a deal of money to effect repairs. Mr. Dooley wrote out in the yard was blown against the fence and had his right side severely injured. Some of his hotbed frames were torn up bodily by the force of the wind and smashed in atoms, and as a result he will lose a lot of winter plants.

The chimney surmounting the Battalion Store on Harvey Road came down with a crash last night, and the owner, Mrs. Dunlop, a widow, was put to much loss and great inconvenience. The fire had to be quenched in the place, and oil stoves used for the sake of warmth.

The big flagstaff opposite the residence of Mr. Fred Ayre on Circular Road came down with a crash yesterday afternoon, and two large chimneys surmounting the residence of Mr. Eric Ayre, next door, were also blown down. A horse and express passing that way were completely blown over and were only restored to their equilibrium after great difficulty.

Considerable damage was done at Torbay and other places. At Outer Cove a "cock" of hay in which there was two tons, owned by Mr. Pyno, was blown completely away, and fences and trees were demolished on all sides.

A Terrible Time. The pilots had a terrible experience boarding the S. S. Woburn in the height of the storm. If they had gone outside the heads the pilot boat would no doubt have been swamped, so they did wisely in boarding her under Port Amherst. Light keeper Cantwell says that ground "broke" yesterday that he never saw whitening before in all his experience.

Her Cabin Filled. When the wind veered to N.W. yesterday a confused sea was caused, and the S. S. Woburn coming down the shore had a hard time of it. One sea boarded her, smashed in the cabin doors and filled the saloon with water, doing much damage to the furniture. After leaving here the ship goes to Portland, Maine, from Sydney with coal.

Train Notes. The west bound express left Gaff Topsails at 12.45 a.m. to-day. The incoming express will not be here till 9 o'clock to-night having left Notre Dame Junction at 9.30 a.m. to-day. The Carbonear train arrived here at 12.15 bringing, Dr. Pritchard, J. B. Blackie, Geo. Craig and wife, 20 others.

BLACK LISTERS. — Another black-lister was added to the roll this morning. There are now 100 on the book.

WEATHER UP COUNTRY. — Along the line to-day the weather is N.W., light and fine; temperature 4 below to 10 above.

TWO MORE TRIPS. — The S. S. Florizel will make two more trips to New York before getting ready for the sealfishery. She will leave New York for here on the 25th inst., and will leave on her last trip on February 11th. The Rosalind will leave New York on the 18th February for this port.

TWENTY-TWO VESSELS LEAVING. — Mr. H. W. LeMessurier to-day had a message from Woods Island, Bay of Islands, saying that 22 vessels were now ready to leave there for home. Most of these are Gloucester men and very few are loaded, the majority having part cargoes, while possibly three or four may have secured full cargoes.

Municipal Council.

Mayor Ellis and the full Board, were present at the meeting held last evening.

Councillor Martin took occasion to deny a report that he had stayed away from the last meeting to avoid voting on the resolutions in reference to the doctors' fees. Private business called him away. He would have voted for the resolutions had he been present.

H. J. Stubb & Co. renewed their application to build a wooden shed on their wharf. They noticed that such permission had been given to Shea & Co. A discussion followed in which Councillor Ryan argued that there should be no discrimination in favor of Shea & Co. and that they should not be given permission to erect a wooden shed. The other Councillors expressed the opinion that a distinction existed inasmuch as that Shea & Co. were asking to replace a wooden shed that had been lately taken down in order to repair their wharf. The application of Stubb & Co. was not granted.

Residents of Pope's Street petitioned the Council to have the name of Pope's Street changed to Burke Square. Consideration deferred.

Councillor Channing protested strongly against the report that the disease of typhus on Pope Street had been caused by dirt and filth there in the peoples' houses. He would like to have the public to know that the residents of the houses referred to are clean and respectable people and did not deserve the allusions that had been made to them. The dirt was really to be found in Pope's Lane and these people should get the blame.

Councillor Martin reported that he had seen Mr. J. W. Morris, superintendent of the street car service, and he said that he would use only one track on Water Street when the heavy snow falls would come, in order to give more room for horses and slides. Mr. Morris would do everything possible, he said, to make conditions better for the truckmen.

The meeting closed at 6 p.m.

Port de Grave Notes.

Special to Evening Telegram.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.

Within two weeks from the date on which the Canadian Reciprocity Commissioners began their conference with those of the United States, an agreement has been reached, so far as the executive branches of the two governments are concerned that will result in substantial reductions in the Customs' dues on a number of products, national and manufactured, of both countries. In accordance with the announcement made when the Committee first met, no intimation of the products affected has yet been given out.

The Commissioners met the State Department to-day for the purpose of making a comparison of the various schedules involved in the arrangement. When the formal announcement of the result is made, the President will take the necessary steps to bring the matter to the attention of Congress. While the usual course in such cases is to submit a draft of the treaty to the Senate for approval, accompanying this by the project for legislation to make necessary changes in tariff schedules, it is possible there will be a departure from the established order in the case of the Canadian reciprocity project. This looks to be the abandonment of the treaty entirely in favor of purely legislative action. No good reason is seen why all purposes will not be served by the passage of a simple resolution by both Senate houses making tariff schedules to correspond with rates proposed by the Commissioners, in so far as they relate to Canadian products, only presumed the Canadian Parliament can deal with the subject in the same way, in which case there would be no occasion for the intervention of the Imperial authorities or for a treaty of any kind. The Commissioners expect that the conference to-morrow will conclude negotiations.

LONDON, Jan. 20.

According to the Cardiff Mail, the Welsh members of Parliament, including David Lloyd-George, Chancellor of the Exchequer, are mutually pledged that if the Government does not follow the Veto Bill immediately with a Bill for the Disestablishment of the Church in Wales, they will quit the Liberal Party, and form a Welsh Nationalist Party, hostile to the Government and operating independently like the Irish Party.

LONDON, Jan. 20.

The militant suffragettes thickly dotted Downing Street where the Cabinet meeting took place, determined to remind the ministers that their demands were as urgent as ever. One banner suggested that Home Secretary Churchill should be imprisoned. The bearer of this suggestion managed to elude the police, and rushed at the Home Secretary when he appeared on the street, using the banner as a lance in an attempt to knock off Churchill's hat. The police quickly cleared away the demonstration.

It provides that fish caught in foreign waters by foreign ships and brought to the ports of the United States by American fishermen can no longer be entered duty-free. Fish caught in foreign waters where fishing is permitted by international agreement will be duty free if taken by American master and crew. Any fish which such vessel may buy from foreign fishermen will be subject to duty.

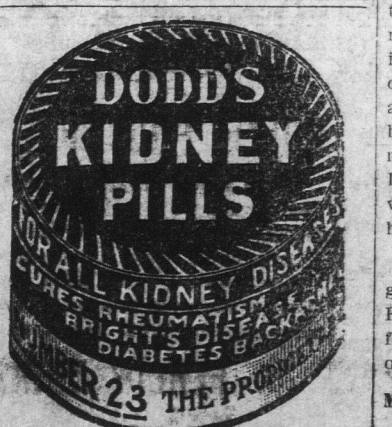

Last Night's Heavy Storm

The storm of yesterday afternoon and last night was one of the fiercest experienced in this city at this particular season of the year, for some time past. Shortly before 2 p.m. the wind which blew strongly from the S. W. veered suddenly to the N. W. and before 4 o'clock a hurricane was raging and continued until this morning. As a result few people ventured abroad last night, and but for the policemen who did their beats the streets were deserted.

On the higher levels the wind blew with particular violence and detached houses rocked and swayed in the blast to the consternation of the inmates. From the chimneys burning pieces of soot flew in all directions, and the dwellers of that section of the city were very nervous and fearful of an outbreak of fire. With the force of the gale flagpoles blew down in several places, telephone poles broke, the wires tangled and chimneys on several houses were partially demolished, the bricks in striking the roofs doing considerable damage. The fell and part of the woodwork covering the roof of Mr. Hoskins house, on Gilbert Street, was torn off by the wind during the afternoon, and the owner and neighbors were engaged for some time trying to make good the damage.

At Hayward Avenue an outbreak of fire was barely averted. The top having blown off the chimney in a residence, the woman of the house could not keep in a fire, and lit an oil stove which blazed up and had to be thrown out in the street to prevent danger to the house.

Eight panes of glass were blown out in the windows of the Eastern Fire Station, and two in those of the Central Department. Barns in some cases, in the suburbs, were unroofed and 27 feet of the roof of the Rennie Baking Co. building on Long Point Road was tipped off and blown a considerable distance away. Several carpenters were engaged all the afternoon in effecting repairs, and owing to the hurricane which raged they worked under the greatest difficulty. A plate glass window in the front of Mr. E. Berrigan's shop at the head of Theatre Hill worth about \$50, was blown in as well as glass in Dr. Macpherson's surgery, Mr. W. Martin's residence, Monkstown Road, and several other places. Glasses were hurled into the street last night from the roofs of several of the old style buildings on Water Street West, and several also were torn off the roof of the Congregational Church and blown to a distance of 50 feet. Intense frost prevailed and the people in the poorer quarters of the city suffered much from the cold.

Died at Montreal.

James E. Rendell, son of the late Hon. Stephen Rendell, died suddenly at Montreal yesterday morning. A message to this effect was received by his relatives yesterday evening. Deceased conducted a prosperous business as a commission merchant and had been in Montreal about 30 years. His brothers are A. S. Rendell, R. G. Rendell and Dr. Rendell of this city. He married a Miss Cliff, sister of J. A. Cliff, of this city, late Minister of Agriculture and Mines.

Lying on the Street.

At 9 o'clock last night a lady passing up Victoria Street found a man lying in the drain there, and despite the storm, fearing he would perish from cold and exposure, she turned back and went to Water Street where she apprised Const. Power of what she had seen. He accompanied the lady and found the man overcome with liquor lying in the drain. The officer procured a sleigh and drove him to the station. He was almost frozen with the cold, was looked after in the station and came to when he spent a while in the heat of the cells.

Fear Aylesworth's Statements.

Special Evening Telegram. OTTAWA, This Morning. Apparently a number of members of Parliament fear Aylesworth's intemperate statements and concessions granted to the United States in settlement of differences between that country and Canada over the regulations of the North Atlantic fisheries. One of the staunchest supporters of the Government appeared to believe that United States fishermen have been enabled to catch salmon throughout the year and to take mackerel in their traps. Neither of these privileges were enjoyed by Canadian citizens. Vylogie asked the Minister of Fisheries whether there would be any season during which fishing with cod or herring traps would be forbidden; whether any precise length for leaders or nets to force fish into traps had been fixed. He pointed out that under the law there was a close season for salmon fishing and that mackerel traps were practically prohibited. If United States fishermen were allowed to set cod or herring traps one thousand yards from the shore without license, and close to the shore after procuring licenses, they would be able to take salmon all the year round; moreover, they would be able to secure fishing berths and catch mackerel in traps, a privilege denied Canadians.

The States fishermen would in future enjoy the privilege of landing for purposes of fixing their leaders, although they had never done so in the past. Brodeur replied there would be no change in the regulations governing salmon fishing and it would still be unlawful to take these fish during the close season. He said that the States had claimed their citizens had the right of fishing in the Gulf of St. Lawrence waters absolutely without licenses.

Supply, to Give Cheap Power and Heat.**

22 per cent. imported. Last year we
devoted 7 1/2 million acres to the cul-
tivation of these crops.
"Much is being done to improve the
yield of corn crops, and it is probable
that with scientific treatment in the
production of the seed, in the sterilisa-
tion of the ground, and in the appli-
cation of fertilizer, we may look at no
distant date to an increased yield of
50 per cent. in these crops upon what
is now being produced per acre. The
most vital feature, however, in bring-
ing this about, once we have acquired
sufficient knowledge, is an ample
supply of fixed nitrogen to use as fer-
tilizer, and it is when considered from
this point of view that a scheme
which supplies this from our coal as
the result of saving present waste is
most important.
"With the increased yields which
we have mentioned, we could produce
corn crops sufficient to supply the
whole of our requirements upon
11 million acres. This would
represent 23 1/2 per cent. of our present
cultivated area, and would only be an
addition of 3 1/2 million acres to the
land now used for the purpose of
growing these same crops. The value
of these additional crops would be
about 55 millions sterling, based upon
the prices which we paid last year,
and to this would have to be added the
value of the straw and the other
what by-products, which would go
a long way towards providing the food
for growing the additional meat which
we require to supply our demand at
home.
"In order to fertilize the land we
should have available, under the all-
electric scheme, 3 million tons, or its
nitrogen equivalent, of sulphate of
ammonia. This, if used over the
whole of the 46 1/2 million acres now
under cultivation, would give 142 lb.
per acre.
To Save Coal and Labour.
"Considering the general effect of
the all-electric scheme, in which, with
but small exception, the whole of the
coal used is turned into electricity, the
first important effect would be the
saving of some 80 to 90 million tons
of coal a year. As we should pro-
duce the whole of our food require-
ments, we should not have to export
our capital in the form of coal to help
pay our food bill. In this way, by
making these two savings, we could
prolong the useful life of our coal
measures two and a half times, and
still have 20 million tons of coal a
year available for the use of our
steamships over and above the coal
required in the country.
"The saving of labour now employ-
ed in raising the vast amount of coal
which we now waste or send abroad,
and also the labour employed in
transporting this coal and using it for
all the various purposes for which it

is now required, together with the
labour employed in cleaning up and
getting rid of the effects of burning
coal according to our present methods,
would all be available for additional
manufacturing of the articles now im-
ported and for use on the land.

To Improve Social Conditions.

"Cheap electricity would greatly
stimulate all manufacturing opera-
tions, which would, in turn, enable
labour to be much better remunerated
than at present, and to enjoy a much
higher standard of comfort. The
higher value of labour would in its
turn stimulate inventiveness, and the
production of all sorts of labour-sav-
ing appliances, which, with cheap
electricity, would enable us to pro-
duce in the future under suitable
market conditions at cheaper rates
than are now possible, notwithstand-
ing the better return that labour
would obtain.

"Great hardships are always pro-
duced where any great industrial
change is made, but the more efficient-
ly we can carry on the work of the
country the more margin must there
be for the great majority of the peo-
ple, so that any change which de-
creases the amount of labour re-
quired must eventually give the peo-
ple greater comfort and less arduous
work. It is hardly necessary to point
out how much better the position of
the country would be if we were pro-
ducing the whole, or nearly the whole,
of our requirements, as in this case
we should be far less liable to be ad-
versely affected by any external
causes or by the occurrence of any
great war.

How Long Before It Comes?

"What interests us most, perhaps,
is the question of how long it is likely
to be before the all-electric idea be-
comes possible. At present there is
much required to be done to make it
workable in all its details that it
seems as though its realisation would
be long deferred. It must, however,
be remembered that knowledge is
continually being acquired which
brings us nearer to its realisation,
and that things engineering, especial-
ly in electrical engineering, now move
more rapidly. It may therefore come
to pass that the all-electric idea, with
its far-reaching changes and great
benefits, will become an accomplished
fact in the near future."

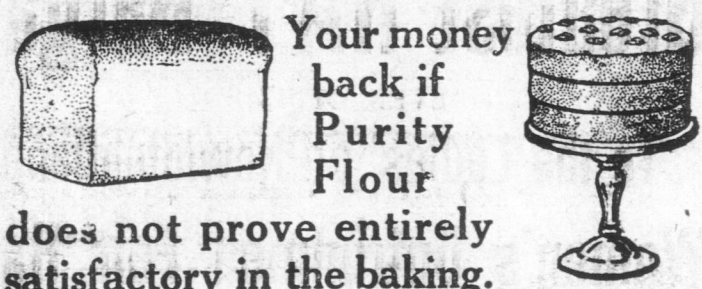

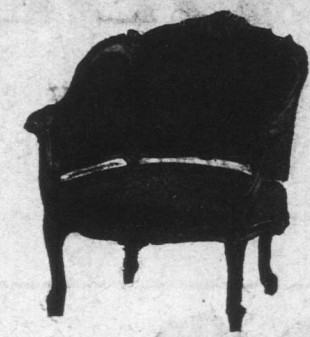

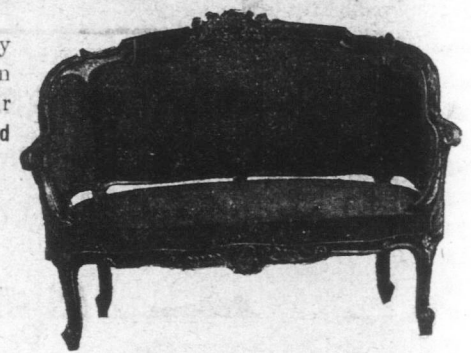
