WASHINGTON, To-Day.
The money cost to the U. S. is still running near a billion dollars a month, and despite official forecasts of steadily increasing expenditures from month to month, the Government's outlay in February, according to the Treasury statement issued to-day, was slightly less than in either January or December, and would have been approximately the same if the month had been so long, as other months expenditures amounted to, viz.: \$1,002,878,608, of which two-thirds, or \$665,400,000, was for ordinary war expenses and \$323,000,000 was in loans to Allied Governments; corresponding expenditures were \$1,090,000,000 in January, \$1,105,000,000 in December and \$982,000,000 in November.






