

The Core of the Earth

HIDDEN MYSTERIES OF THE DEPTHS.

(By PROF. ARTHUR THOMSON). Diverse pictures have been given of the interior of the arth: which of them has most basis of fact? The difficulty in in part the indirectness of the evidence, for the deepest borings are but as minute pinpricks on the skin of an orange, as 1 to 2,500! One of the very deepest mines at Johannesburg takes the visitor quickly down about 6,000 feet ,to near the level of Cape Town but what is that compared with the earth's radius of, say, 3,950 miles, Un til enoromusly deeper borings are made, our surest knowledge of the earth's interior must be indirect.

Science as science cannot even think of the Beginning, but it knows a little about some of the many beginnings. Thus as regards the earth, if we ask how it began, the accredited answer is that it consolidated from a nebular mass. And if we ask where the nebular mass came from, one of the ingenious answers is that it was drawn off from the once immensely larger sun by the attraction of a passing star! Be this as it may, we must see the young earth as a whirling ne bular mass, drawing into its gaseous substance a rich catch of meteor-like bodies and planetesimal fragments, and settling down into a molten sphere great heat being generated by the impact of the contributions that made the earth grow. There is much to suggest that when the earth finished growing it was molten.

Then followed ages of cooling and a gradual zoning into a metallic core rich in iron, like the crucible of a blast furnace, and outside that hundreds of miles of silicate rocks; and outside that again a more siliceous and lighter outer layer, frof fifty to seventy-five miles in thickness. As the cooling continued the outer layer divided into a universal granitic crush above, and a thicker basaltishell below. The viscous inner shell of lighter basic rock, akin to basal was called, by the great Viennese geo logist, Suess, the "sima," a word mad up of the first letters of silica an' magnesia, which form a great part c heavy basic rocks. On the surface c the sima, like a sugar crust on'treac le, floats a thinner skin of sial, prin, cipally composed of silica and alum ina, which predominate in acid crystailine rocks, like gneiss and granite. The sima forms the floor of the oceans which, on Wegener's ingeniuos theory re due to great rifts in the sial and subsequent drifting apart of immense continental masses.

As for our familiar sedimentary rocks, like sandstone and limestone, so interesting in many ways—as regards scenery, soil-making and fossils—they are the results of the endless scrapping and rebuilding of parts of the superficial sial, and form but an insignificant part of the earth's crust.

Thus we may think of the earth with (1) a dense metallic core, (2) hundreds of miles of heavy silicate rock, (3) the viscous sima, (4) the floating silica, and (5) the sedimentary rocks.

The scientific evidence points to the truth of Tennyson's words: "the solid earth on which we tread, in tracts of fluent heat began." It seems that the earth, like the other planets, passed from a gaseous state to a liquid state by the loss of heat radiated from the outside into space. From the liquid or molten state there was a gradu passage into solidity by continu cooling from the surface. But ev after solidification of the crust a le time would have to elapse before surface became cool enough to allow of the condensation of water-yap And only after the water-circulati got agoing, e.g. in the sequence cloud, rain, stream!et, river, and s would there begin the weathering the surface and the re-disposing materials which led to the earliest sedimentary rocks.

There has been considerable difference of opinion among authorities in regard to the present state of the earth's core. It is a fiery furnace full of molten iron and other metals, or is it a relatively quiescent, though very hot, solid mass?

The trend of the evidence is to wards the second conclusion. In the original cooling of the earth the first solidification would be a superficial unstable crust, contracting as it hard- may7,th ened and breaking into pieces which sank down again into the molten mass. of the internal mass had used up so much of their heat that they could not melt any more. As the cooledcrust thickened by contributions from below, as an ice-sheet on a pond from the water, there would be less and less out-passage of heat from the core, and the surface would come to denly on the sun for its warmth. But it is well known that the tem perature in deep mines is appreciably high, and at depths below fifty mile the temperature must be not far from that at which the rocks melt.

Still more must this be true of lepth of three hundred miles. But it has to be borne in mind that the compression of the internal regions by the load they bear raises the melting point. Moreover, the students of tides and earthquakes tell us that the earth as a whole behaves as if it were made of steel and cannot possibly have a

Tragedies of the Old Bailer

Few visitors to the Black Museum at Scotland Yard give more than a assing glance to a formidable-lookng set of iron chains which, though abelled "Flowery Land Pirates," usually fails to recall to their minds one of the most sensational dramas of the sea and the Old Bailey the world has

Whatever signs of error they had evinced on their arest the journey from South America removed them, and they seemed completely indifferent to their fate.

But any observant person in the crowded court must have read in this callous attitude their contempt for human life, and there were moments when, as the prisoners muttered to one another in undertones, one could almost fancy they had the weapons of nurder still in their hands.

After a very careful trial all seven vere found guilty and sentenced to death, and then the Home Secretary held another investigation with a view to ascertaining if any of the convicts were less culpable than the others. Eventually he reprieved two, and to the governor of Newgate, in whose custody the condemned were, was assigned the delicate task of acquainting the fortunate couple with the news which meant death to the remaining

The first of the reprieved yawned hen told that he was not to be exe-





Evolution or Revolution

Every day or so cable despatches appear which indicate a sharp cleavage of opinion in the British Labor Party with the so-called Communistic wing in direct opposition to the older Trade Unionist elements. The divergence was plain in the discussion over the proposed visit of the Prince of Wales to Argentina, in which Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, one of the ablest and most respected of Trades Union Leaders, took a stand diametrically opposed to that of the Communist leader, Kirkwood.

Criticism of Ramsay MacDonald a leader of the Labor Party was uttered by Mrs. Philip Snowden at Montreal some weeks ago, and was supposed to voice the views of her husband, so far as personal talents go, the ablest of all the Labor leaders. The opposition to MacDonald apparently arises from the fact that he is regarded by the Trade Unionists as too weak in his dealings with the Communist wing; while the latter holds him to be hopelessly opposed to the aggressive class-warfare which is their aim. It should be said that in the opinion of many sympathetic with the Labor cause the word Communist is grossly abused by the British group. Bernard Shaw calls them "a left wing of young Anarchists who absurdly call

emselves Communists." Light on the internecine warfare hat is going on in Labor circles is provided by an article in a recent is-sue of the "Fortnightly Review" from he pen of G. M. Godden entitled "The nternational Attack on British Trade nionism." Of course the shadow of

Russia lies over it all. Labor in Great Britain and Europe is divided into two, great organizations. One is the International Federation of Trades Unions which has its headquarters at Amsterdam, but in which the British trade unionists are the strongest factor. The other is the Red International of Moscow, dominated by Russians and led by sanguinary advocates of class workers like Zinovieff, Losovsky, a still more violent agitator, and Loumatchavsky, the Soviet Minister of Education. Mr. Godden especially arraigns A. A. Purcell, nominally a British Trade Unionist leader who is an officer in both international organizations. He is a "pink" in Engand and Amsterdam, but a violent "Red" in Moscow. The Amsterdam Federation advocates the improvement of the condition of the working classes by evolution, not revolution, and by collaboration among all classes in the community. It also provides for the recognition of strong nationalities; and does not concern itself with forms of Government. Briefly, its creed is "Progressive Reform."





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
