MRS. PITZEL'S STORY. The Woman Shows Marks of Her Terrible Sufferings. FULLY IDENTIFIES THE PRISONER. Holmes Gazed Fixedly at Her For at Least a Minute.

Detailed Statement of the Way in Which the Prisoner Found the Woman From Place to Place Under the Pines of the Detroit and Then to Toronto—The Story Told Her About the Children and How the Woman Overcame During the Trying Ordeal.

Philadelphia, Oct. 30.—The third day of the Holmes trial opened promptly at 10 o'clock this morning. Holmes came in with the usual half smile upon his face that he has worn since morning, and saluted the court officers cheerfully.

More people were in the court room this morning than on any day yet. The morning session was a very interesting one, and has been followed by a number of people who have been in the court room since the trial began.

An important witness called this morning was C. L. Perry, assistant to the president of the Fidelity Mutual Life Association, the company which Holmes swindled out of \$10,000. Perry was the man who first worked against the insurance swindler.

Mr. Perry identified the insurance policy for \$10,000 taken out in November, 1888, by Elizabeth, the wife of Jephtha D. Howe, the St. Louis attorney, acknowledging the payment of the money. The policy was taken out on September 24, 1884, 22 days after Pitzel's death.

On the occasion Howe and Holmes acted towards each other as ordinary strangers do who have just been introduced to each other. Mr. Perry detailed the conversation held in the office of the company concerning the identification of the body and the marks upon it by which it was known.

Mr. Perry went on to tell how the strange tales of Holmes' crimes became known. He told of the letter of Jephtha D. Howe to the Boston police revealing the swindle upon the company and of the tracing and arrest of Holmes and Pitzel in Boston for swindling the company.

At the time of his arrest, Holmes was a verbal liar, and the next day made the confession in writing. While Perry was testifying, Holmes was talking eagerly to his attorney, and was evidently much interested in the aspect of the case.

When Mr. Shoemaker, Holmes' senior counsel, began the cross-examination he and Mr. Perry at first mentioned a number of words over which Pitzel's body was identified.

Cobourg, Ont., Oct. 31.—A probably fatal shooting affair took place here last evening about 8 o'clock. Mr. H. F. Holland, a prominent lawyer of Cobourg had occasion to call at Lawyer J. Y. Cruickshank's office about 8 o'clock.

Upon entering, Mr. Holland was startled at finding Mr. Cruickshank in a leaning position in a chair and apparently stunned. When asked what was the matter, Mr. Cruickshank managed to make it understood to Mr. Holland that Mr. John Phillips, an old resident of the town, had walked into his office about ten minutes to 8 and deliberately fired two shots at him in quick succession.

The first bullet struck Mr. Cruickshank in the chest, fracturing his windpipe, the second one fractured his right cheek bone, while the third one fractured the right hand between the thumb and first finger.
