John McConn, gloves, of Orono, Ont., has assigned, after an ineffectual attempt to compromise at 30 cents in the dollar. The liabilities are placed at \$2,500.

A STEAMER with 4,000,000 pounds of ten has sailed from Yokohama for Tacoma, Washington Territory, being the first of a steam fleet that will ply between these ports.

R. W. Keeler, general storekeeper, of Mitchell, Ont., has effected a settlement with his creditors at 50 cents in the dollar, secured. He has been in ill health for some time past.

The C. P. R. have already contracts for the transport of 6,000 head of cattle from British Columbia to Calgary. The cattle cars have been sent over, and shipping will begin at once.

7 The offices of the Commercial Union Assurance Company, of which Mr. Fred. Cole is the general manager, have been removed to the commodious premises 1731 Notre Dame street.

The manufacture of castor oil is one of the new industries of the South. A Florida firm is preparing 320 acres to be planted in easter beans, and next fall they propose to build an oil mill.

The total shipment of wheat from India, from Jan. 1 to June 26, 1886, was 20,324,000 bushels, including 8,712,000 bushels to Great Britain, and 11,612,000 bushels to the Continent of Europe.

It is reported that an issue of debentures to the extent of \$100,000 will shortly be placed on the market by the city of Ottawa. The last issue were readily taken up at three per cent, premium.

Thos. J. McMackin, who has been running the Park Hotel in St. John, N.B., for several months past, has wended his way to the land of the free. He leaves but few creditors to mourn his departure.

Mr. James Crossen, of the Cobourg Car Works, obtains the contract for rolling stock of the Northern & Pacific Junction Railway. The specifications confirm to those of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

WM. Powerl, a shoe dealer of Essex Centre, Ont., commenced business about eighteen months ago with \$200 capital. He has run behind for some time past, allowing notes to go to protest, etc., and is now compelled to assign.

The value of shares in the Hudson Bay Co. is now quoted at .£22 8s. 6d. This is a material advance on last year's rate when the value was .£16 10s., but below that of 1884 when the price was .£23 10s. Three years ago they brought £36.

The regular steamship lines continue to carry cattle from this port to Europe at a low rate of mortality, but some ocean tramps did not make a very good record during the recent hot weather, and the general percentage of loss is higher than it was.

ISBAEL MERRITT, general storekeeper and lumber dealer, of Shiktehawk, N. B., has assigned with liabilities amounting to \$30,000 He did a good store trade, but speculated largely in lumber. The recent depression in prices has compelled him to assign.

T. H. Mallette, a grocer, of this city, has assigned, with liabilities of about \$4,000. He commenced business in 1879 with about \$450

capital, and failed in October, 1885, when he compromised at 40 cents in the dollar on liabilities of about the same figure as in this instance.

The increasing demand for felt socks has caused the trade to advance prices about 30 per cent. over those current last year. Six of the leading manufacturers have formed a combination to make a uniform price list, and the indications are that the present prices will be maintained.

THE C. P. R. commercial telegraph system, now being completed, will probably connect with the Baltimore & Ohio Company for American business, and with the Mackay-Bennet cable for European service. The Great Northwestern Telegraph Company has found a formidable competitor.

Compared with last year, the shipping business at Hillsboro, N., S., shows greater activity. Nincteen vessels arrived from foreign ports during the month of June, and there were twenty-one clearances for foreign ports during the same period. Value of goods exported about \$19,000.

Geo. II. Gray, grocer, of Portland, N.B., commenced about 15 months ago. He had only a few hundred dollars to start with, and as he did a very small business he has run behind ever since. A short time ago he gave a bill of sale for \$400 to his principal creditor and then disappeared from the town.

A STEAMSHIP has just arrived in London with the first shipment of mutton from the Falkland islands. She brought 31,000 carcases in her refrigerator. They averaged about 65 lbs. each, bred from selected Scotch

C. L. Parst, jeweller, of Scaforth, Ont., has assigned, with liabilities of between \$3,000 and \$4,000. Early last year he settled with his principal creditors at 60 cents on the dollar and was then supposed to have a surplus of \$2,500. But the composition appears to have been too much for his resources.

THE Midland Railway Co., of England, are making a series of experiments with steel sleepers. An experimental length of some miles of track has been laid with these sleepers between Derby and Duffield. The results will be watched with much interest by Canadian railway men.

Twenty-rive thousand dollars in premiums is offered by the management of the Dominion and Provincial exhibition to be held at Sherbrooke during the last week of September The prize list has just been issued. Entries or live stock close on September 4th, and for agricultural and industrial products a week later.

THE business of the Montreal Penny Savings Bank has doubled itself during the past year. The bank has now 604 accounts open, representing total deposits of \$1,630.47 -an average of \$2.69 for each depositorand it is fully expected that the deposits will amount up to \$2,000 before the end of the present year.

ABOUT 300 pedigreed Clydesdales have been exported from Scotland since the beginning of the year. Canadian buyers have been very numerous, and buyers from the United States, although not so plentiful as they were three years ago, have still been numerous enough to make a brisk demand for the better class of horses.

SEVEN-EIGHTHS of the whole crop of peppermint raised for oil manufacturing is said to be grown in Wayne County, N. Y., where Mr. Hotchkiss, "the peppermint king," has his establishments. The average crop yields between 80,000 and 100,000 pounds of the oil, which (crude) has ruled for some months past at from \$3.75 to \$4 a pound.

THE ticket offices of the G. T. R. and Delaware & Hudson railways, under the respective management of Messrs. Wm. D. O'Brien and C. C. McFall, have been extended and improved. These offices, besides occupying a convenient and central position near the leading down-town hotel, are now as handsomely appointed as any in the city.

It is stated that the Dominion government will send one of their steamers from Quebec to the coast of Newfoundland and Labrador, to carry such donations as charitably disposed persons may desire to send to the starving people there. Already Toronto has sent a generous response to the appeal of Labrador's starving fishermen.

THE failure of T. G. Vivian, general storekeeper of Sault St. Marie, Ont., appears to be a case of dry rot. He has been in business 12 or 14 years and seems to have gradually and insensibly run behind until he is forced to assign.-Donald McMillan, a small storekeeper, of Whycocomah, N. B., has been compelled to make an assignment.

A SYNDICATE of well-known Montreal citizens have bought the mills and limits of L'Assomption Lumber Co. from the Exchange Bank liquidators for \$30,000, and propose running the mills again. The area over which the purchasers have a right to cut timber embraces three hundred miles, part of which is situated at Stc. Julienne.

THE Water Department have received their first shipments of the twenty-four inch pipes, which were ordered for the extension of the water system in the suburban districts, and for the improvement of the system in the business part of the city. The work of laying the pipes will be begun at once and will be prosecuted with the utmost despatch.

Shermooke this year has received \$3,862,75 from business and professional licenses and taxes. The commercial travellers contributed \$1,760; the lawyers, \$200; auctioneers, \$125; doctors, \$86; dentists, \$20; surgeons, \$10; butchers, \$160; restaurants, \$40; billiard tables, \$100; cab driver, \$106; carters, \$228; carriage horses, \$578; and dogs, \$349.75.

Shipments of cattle were 30,533 head-a decrease of 840 head from last year, an increase of 5,454 over 1884, of 6,988 over 1883, and of 17,745 over 1882, in which year a large number of cattle were shipped via the States. The sensible course will be taken of shipping none but fish of superior quality, the faulty cure of cod in the Newfoundland fishery for some years past having done great injury to the trade. Cargoes have been landed in Spain and all Mediterrangan ports in wretched condition, good fish being spoilt for want of attention to the cure. The French have been supplying the foreign demand with a better article. thereby increasing their trade. Newfoundlanders are not waking up a moment too soon. as reputation once lost is hard to regain.

The shipments of wheat, corn and oats from this port are far ahead of last year, being 2.059 .-934, 2,240,022 and 1,383,605 jbushels respectively. Flour has also been sent to the time of 126,133 barrels, against 83,951 to date last year. Phosphates, deals and lumber have been exported in less quantity. The comparative figures are: Phosphates, 4,145 and 8,048 tons: Deals, St. Petersburg standard, 12,567 and 12,908; sawn lumber, 5,122,162 and 10,-242,279 feet. The total number of arrivals of ocean-going vessels from the opening of navigation to the 26th of June, has been 172, representing a tonnage of 269,779, as against. 153 during the same period of last year, representing a tonnage of 233,627.

THE EXPORT DUTY ON SAW LOGS.

It is now a long time since the JOURNAL, OF COMMERCE first recommended an increased duty on saw logs and timber exported in the rough, partly for the protection of our timber wealth and of our home manufactures, partly to force if possible the United States into "fair trade" in lumber and all its direct products.

The proposal was met with vehement arguments on the other side, often contradictory, but it became to a certain extent a fait accompti, and we are beginning to see a little how it will work.

The old arguments, that it is bad for Canada, that it will keep wealthy Americans from stepping in to relieve impecunious holders of limits, that it will destroy the value of our limits, and so on, are still brought out with the best courage that can be mustered; but it is dry work; and before the plaintiffs (or are they defendants?) have finished their case they drift into contradictions.

Take for instance our Bay City friend, the *Jamberman's Gazette*. In a recent number they print a letter from their Canadian correspondent, or to be strictly fair, let us

say from a Canadian correspondent, whose heart is wrung by the injury the policy is going to inflict on workingmen. He is not a conservative, evidently, for he reports that many consider that the duty was put on by the Dominion Government through jealousy, with a view to injure the Ontario Government, who own the chief timber territory in Canada. And he solemnly declared that the working classes regard it as "suicidal policy." Whether he means that the policy kills itself, or will kill Sir John, or the timber trade, is not clear; but it is evident from the context that the "working classes" fear amongst other things that it will drive away American capital and brains. This, however, would not be "suicide" on the part of the policy, but a species of manslaughter.

Such a communication should certainly have a depressing effect on us poor short-sighted mortals. But as in nature the poison and the antidote frequently grow side by side, so our kindly contemporary provides relief for our chastened spirits. On another page of the same issue he gives us an interview with F. E. Buswell, a prominent lumberman of Grand Rapids.

"We own," says this practical man, who does not worry himself about the policy, "100,000,000 feet of pine, standing on Spanish River, on the north shore of Georgian Bay, and we will work it right up on the spot. We thought at one time we could ship the logs to our Grand Haven mills as raw material, but we have since come to the conclusion that we can better afford to manufacture on the Canadian shore, and ship the lumber and pay duty. " " Cutler & Savage, of Grand Haven, own 100,000,000 feet on the Spanish River, and Saginaw and Bay City men own a lot more. We will probably buy another tot this winter."

We have taken the liberty of garnishing his remarks with italics, but we are sure he will forgive us for taking all the comfort we can after the first dose we had to swallow.

We seriously recommend to the correspondent who is afraid of the policy "suiciding" the trade, or Sir John, or the working classes, to consider what this building of mills to manufacture the logs on the spot means. The cutting, bauling, driving and rafting of timber necessitates a good deal of expenditure, partly for wages paid to men living in camp, but largely for such supplies as pork, beef and oats, which in this case come from Chicago. To cut these same logs into lumber, and pile and ship it, will give work to thousands, and support thousands of families in villages built up within our own country. Which policy then is best for workingmen. Canadian workingmen bien entendu? The question is too simple to be asked.

But since we are again on this subject, we may refer to another aspect of the ques-

tion. We have before now called attention to the loss suffered by the country in that its lumber product is shipped in its lowest form, practically as raw material. There is no reason, save the ad valorem duty on dressed lumber shipped to the United States, why every mill in Ottawa should not have its great planing mill, door and sash factory and similar subsidiary establishments, giving work to as many more men as are now employed in converting the logs into lumber, and bringing back greatly increased returns from the market. Our aim should be to bring about full reciprocity in this matter, and to this end the export duty should be increased still further if found necessary. Reciprocity in lumber would no doubt reverse the position on the Georgian Bay again, and to some extent stop the building of mills there; but we believe the country, nay, both countries, would gain on the whole. Lumber is a heavy commodity to handle, freight charges soon count up, and we think the best policy would be one which would permit lumber to be got from the nearest point of production regardless of the boundary lines.

The Michigan mills, drawing on our Georgian Bay territory for additional stock, if needs be, might supply the West, while the Ottawa district, within easy distance by water of the Lake Champlain ports, and of Albany and New York, would control the Eastern markets; and each would reach the consumer in the most direct and natural channel. Our Northwest, too, in the great future we hope for it, would draw its supplies of this vital commodity from the cheapest and nearest market.

#### THE UNION BANK OF CANADA.

The meeting of this institution on the 19th inst. called together a large number of shareholders for a somewhat unpleasant object, namely to confirm the act reducing the capital stock of the bank 40 per cent., and to discuss its situation and prospects.

The meeting, however, passed off with the usual harmony and quietude, those present having apparently made up their minds to accept the inevitable, with the best grace they could muster. Nothing was brought to light beyond what was already pretty well known to the shareholders and the public, but a statement showing the position of the various accounts after the entries reducing the capital had been made, was laid before them. From this it appears that with the exception of providing a fund to cover the unearned discount on the various bills held and current (a luxury not enjoyed by every bank), the reduction of the capital sufficed only to provide for the bad and doubtful debts, and leave a balance at credit of profit and loss account of \$13,284.

Now while the reasoning of the Banking Committe, at Ottawa, who declined to allow any further reduction because it was not their province to provide a surplus fund or rest for the bank, may be sound enough up to a certain point, it is very clear that if these entries have been made with strict regard to the value of each asset in the light of the information attainable at present, it would have been much better for the bank to have been allowed a reduction of 50 instead of 40 per cent. No board or manager, however sound, or prudent, or painstaking, can hope to foretell precisely how a mass of assets will turn out in the course of the years that may pass before they are would up; and it is morally certain that some expectations will not be fulfilled.

Unless there are sufficient undervaluations in some cases to compensate for the certain overvaluation in others, the management will for some time be harrassed and perplexed in keeping their position clear, and in satisfying themselves that their reduced capital is still intact. We suspect that all the doubtful assets have been valued so low that they will in themselves form a reserve fund for future contingencies, but this is not very good banking practice. If it be so, it would have been better to value them as closely as the facts permit, and let the provision for any further depreciation stand as a Reserve or Contingent fund. If not, if the reduction merely provides for the bare losses now inevitable and apparent, the Banking Committee has done the bank an injury, and hampered the executive, to carry out a theory which amounts to little more than a fad.

But however this may be, the thing that mostly concerns the public is that the Bank has satisfied Parliament that 60 per cent of its capital is still intact, and that it starts on its new career with a prospect of being prudently managed for the future. Mr. Andrew Thomson, who still remains in office as President, will, it is generally supposed, practically fill the office of manager, and the confirmation of this rumour will do much to rehabilitate the bank in public estimation. The report is given elsewhere.

#### BRITISH TRADE.

Of the English Board of Trade returns for June the *Economist* remarks: "If the returns for the month of May were not of so hopeful a character as those that had preceded them, the June figures will more than make up for the disappointment." The chief improvement is in the export of goods of home production. The figures are as follows:

 The increase in the latter is only 1.1 per cent, but in the export of goods of home production (which, as we remarked last week in discussing British trade with the colonics, is the vital point), the increase is 4.6 per cent.

Taking the first six months of the year the figures still show a considerable falling off from last year:

The falling off in imports is much greater than in exports, which is a satisfactory feature; but in the exports the figures for the half-year for "goods of home production" are better than the average, the decline in them being 1.0 per cent., while reshipments of goods imported have declined 6.9 per cent.

June being the first full month for Canadian trade with Great Britain, the comparative figures for 1885 and 1886 will be interesting. Our shipments of cattle show a falling off both in number and value, notwithstanding that the earlier opening of navigation would enable eargees to reach the other side earlier in June than usual. The figures are:

It is comforting to note that the market has not been wrested from us by other competitors. The United States sent only 9,178 animals against 15,644 the previous year, and the figures for the entire trade from all points are as follows:

It appears therefore that while the entire imports of live cattle fell off 30 per cent., our shipments fell off only 20 per cent., so that we have appropriated rather more than our share of the market.

The imports of butter and cheese, in which we also have a large interest, show a considerable decrease. Of butter 125,000 packages valued at £609,000 were imported in June, 1886, against 137,000 packages, value £695, the year before

In choose the figures are: June, '86. 142,000 packages, value #229,000 June, '85. 158,000, " 363,000

Of general trade, the exports of the great lines of textiles and metals compare satisfactorily with last year, notwithstanding the fact that prices are somewhat lower than they then were. Iron and steel industries are however still weighted with unsold stocks, which it will take some time to alsorb

The returns give also the emigration figures for the six months ending 30th June. The total number of emigrants of British origin was 112,227 against 106,354 for the same period last year. Of these 75,224 went to the United States, 12,224

to British North America, 19,890 to the Australian Colonies, and 4,889 to other places.

While we have attracted more than our last year's proportion of this tide, the number who go to the United States are still in an overwhelming preponderance. It is much to be regretted that so many are lost to the Empire, but we must hope and work in the direction in which we have started, to attract gradually more and more to Canadian soil.

#### THE FISHERY OUESTION.

The counsel for the defense in the case of the seized schooner "Doughty," have fyled in the Admiralty Court, at Halifax, their answer to the allegations of the Dominion Government.

As is usual with our enterprising consins across the border, this document is more remarkable for the boldness and novelty of its assertions than for the accuracy of its premises, or the logical sequence of the arguments deduced therefrom. Throughout the whole answer the counsel appear endeavor, so far as is possible, to ignore Canada in the entire matter and to treat the seizure as the result of a difference between the United States and Great Britain. They affect to treat Canada as a colony, entirely subservient to the mother country and as not having any independent legislative powers or standing of her own, and, as a logical sequence, assert that any legislation concerning the fishery question, initiated by the Dominion Parliament, or any regulations ordained by Canadian officials, not expressly provided for in the treaty of 1818, are therefore null and void. They deny the right of Canada to enact such legislation as may be required to amplify and enunciate the provisions of the treaty, and go on to declare that any legis lation by the Canadian authorities for the protection and improvement of Canadian fisheries is wholly unauthorized and therefore ultra vires.

This is a very serious and important statement, and involves the constitutional right of colonies to enact legislation for the furtherance and benefit of their own interests, when such enactments are not in direct opposition to treaties already in force between the mother country and foreign nations. This matter has long since been practically set at rest by both our own Dominion and the Government of Australia, and therefore, although from a legal point of view the exceptions are well taken, the "Doughty's" counsel will derive but little benefit from their contentions.

The pretention that, since neither the purchase of bait or ice is expressly prohibited in the treaty of 1818, which provides that American fishermen shall not enter Canadian ports except for the pur-

pose of obtaining wood and water, or for shelter, is merely an example of legal hair splitting, which is probably made more for effect than in any hope of biassing the judgment of the court, and we fail to see in what manner any clause of the treaty of 1837 can be held to conflict with those of the previous treaty except by a severe straining of the meaning of the words.

They also claim that under the British order-in-council of 1830, by which vessels of the United States were allowed to export goods from Canada to foreign ports, the Doughty was entitled to purchase bait for export, of course omitting to state that this proclamation included legitimate trading vessels only, and is not in any way intended to embrace fishing vessels purchasing Canadian bait for the purpose of fishing in Canadian waters.

The remainder of the reply is devoted to denials of the various allegations in the petition; some of them are really curious examples of word twisting, such as the denial of any intention of purchasing bait or ice, while at the same time admitting that both bait and ice were purchased, and the denial that the Doughty ever was seized, while at the same time they protest against its seizure.

A careful perusal of the whole defence shows that the principal grounds taken by the American owners are that the treaty of 1818 does not expressly prohibit the purchase of bait, and that no legislation on the subject of its own fisheries is within the powers of a colony. The first objection is palpably absurd, but the second is a nice point of law, and whether Canada will be sustained in her action in this matter by the British government is as yet an open question.

On the subject of customs revision full authority has been assumed by Canada to impose and enforce a tariff of duties on goods coming even from the Mother Country, and if, in so important a matter as this, the jurisdiction of Canada has never even been called in question, we fail to see why she should not have as much right to protect her fisheries as she has to protect her mills. Although, in the present turmoil of British politics, colonial questions are apt to be neglected, we feel sure that the incoming government of Great Britain will uphold us firmly in our present position, and now that the peace at any price policy has received its death blow, we may expect cordial and hearty support from the British cabinet.

#### TRADE WITH AUSTRALASIA.

A trade letter has been issued by the "Agent General from Canada to Australasia," appointed by the Dominion Government for the purpose of developing closer commercial relations with that continent as an outlet for our raw and manufactured

goods, and for the trans-continental transportation of which the now-completed Canadian Pacific Railway will serve as a channel. Our trade with Australia, so far, has been insignificant, being \$433,717 in exports and \$3,825 in imports, for the year ending June 30th, 1885, out of a total export of \$89,238,361, and of the exports to Australia only \$165,393 were manufactured goods; and indeed our total exports of manufactured goods to all countries only amounted to \$3,181,501, while the exports of domestic merchandise from the United States to Australasia for the same period amounted to \$10,534,138, and the imports from that country to \$2,823,393. As our total exports of manufactured goods to all countries-\$3,181,501-were not equal to the exports from our mines, and not half the value of the exports of fish, it is advisable to look abroad for other markets and facilities for opening communications with them. The following are some lines of merchandize available for export to Australasia :--

Oats, butter and eggs are also mentioned by Mr. Woods as being available for export to the Antipodes.

#### THE BANK STATEMENTS.

The returns to the end of June are somewhat affected by the entries made by the Canadian Bank of Commerce in reduction of its rest; they should have been still more affected by the reduction of the capital of the Union Bank, but, for some reason at present unexplained, the return of this bank to the Finance Department differs from that of same date submitted to the shareholders, it having been compiled before the entries in reduction of the capital were made. This return also covers the reduction in the capital of the Bank of New Brunswick.

Taken in gross, it will be seen from our tabular statement that there is a reduction of \$1,000,000 each in the items "capital authorized" and "capital subscribed," of \$518,739 in "capital paid up," and of \$435,000 in reserve fund or rest.

The changes in the general accounts have to a large extent been occasioned by these, which are of course merely book entries. The increase in circulation for the month of \$300,000, and in the deposits (both government and ordinary) of \$1,105,000, would probably have been accompanied by an increase in Loans; but the latter are reduced to the extent of \$50,000, taking current and overdue items together. The only interest-bearing assets increased are the holdings of government and other securities, and mortgages on real estate sold by the banks.

As far as the changes are of a normal kind there is nothing in them of special note. The slight upward movement in circulation marks the beginning of the harvest, which is now well under way all over the country. The increase of deposits, which amounts to nearly half a million dollars in those of the ordinary kind, is only a continuation of that accumulation of money heretofore noted, Usually with increased indebtedness to the public, and lessened loans, the available funds increase, but this month the net foreign balances are reduced \$750,000, mostly by increased drawings on English correspondents, a line of business which is always stimulated by the near approach of lower sterling rates, in order that cover may be bought in at a profit.

The returns under consideration complete nineteen years under Confederation, and it is interesting to compare the figures from the statement made on the last day of the old regime with those of June, 1886. The returns then embraced only the old Province of Canada, and we therefore make

the comparision with Ontario and Quebec, adding a column to cover the whole Confederation, for completeness sake. We comit the thousands (000):—

The development, as may be seen at a glance, is in the right direction. The paidup capital of the banks was increased considerably, but much less in proportion than their other available means. While the increase in capital was about 85 per cent., circulation was almost trebled, showing an increase of 198 per cent., and deposits increased 257 per cent. These changes are all in the direction we have frequently discussed, namely, the extension of banking business on the basis of the deposits and circulation, with very moderate increases in their paid-up capital. A banker is not simply a capitalist lending his own money. No element of banking is involved in such an operation as that. It is only when he becomes the medium through which the means of those who have wealth to snare are made available for the needs of those who wish to borrow that he becomes a banker; and the profit he makes, computed on his own capital, depends mostly on the extent to which he receives and lends other peoples' money. On the other hand the assets of all kinds show an almost uniform increase to three times the amount they represented in 1867.

In addition to the figures we have quoted here, if we are to take a comprehensive view of the financial position of the country now as compared to then, we must take into consideration the deposits of the savings and doan companies and of the Government and other savings banks. This, however, is a comparison which we must reserve for a future number.

The annual statement of the Post Office Savings Banks, to 30th June last, has been already issued; a commendable promptness which we wish might be imitated by other governmental departments. It shows an increase in the business for the year, but we must postpone comment until we can give the statement in full. Owing to the pressure on our space we cannot do so this week:—;

#### SUMMER TOILETS.

The most recently imported model costumes show a continued diminution of the tournure, in fact this is the most salient point of difference in this season's styles, and in addition to this, the bouffant appearance so much sought after in last season's toilets appears to be entirely absent from all the new tashionable dresses. Another feature is the growing tendency towards wider shapes in sleeves. This, as yet, has been principally confined to new summer wraps, but the fashion has already spread to French tea gowns which are now frequently made with loose pagoda | into as a narrow a space as the breadth of

sleeves hanging from the arm, and it is therefore probable that wider sleeves will soon become a feature of new dress toilets

In recent model dresses the draperies are, as a general rule, arranged very long, both front and back, leaving both sides of the skirt visible from the hips down. The front drapery is very wide and caught up by a number of extra deep plaits, some of which are raised high enough to be fastened to the belt. The back drapery is either shirred or plaited to the belt and then carried well to the back and drawn

the goods will allow. Three styles of arrangement are shown in back draperies, in the first the draperies are allowed to fall straight, in the second they are looped in puffs and so adjusted as to entirely cover the back of the underskirt to the foot plaiting, and in the third, they are slashed up the centre of the back and looped in shawl points so as to give full prominence to the underskirt.

In bodices no general rule can be laid down and styles continue to be as varied as ever, every different wearer being fitted with the especial shape most calculated to be becoming, or else most fitted for the purpose for which the dress is designed. Thus for working dresses the trim jacket bodice is the favorite, while in full dress styles a pointed corsage, very high on the hips, very long and pointed both back and front and cut square or half-low in the neck, is the prevailing fashion; and in demi-toilets, cut-away bodices, having a Fedora or Continental vest, and made round waisted, with belt and ribbon attachments, or else habit bodices opening over guimpes and chemisettes, are both fashionable styles. A pretty method of fastening a basque is to have wide revers of the dress fabric under a narrower one of velvet and then to button it diagonally down the front with short pointed straps of velvet about an inch apart.

Jerseys are still enjoying the same favor as heretofore, the beaded lines appearing to have given place to the braided jersey so familiar to every one, the only rival now being the jersey appliqué with white or colored silks and wools in conventionalized flower patterns. A new line of very becoming jerseys, of a pale cream light weight stockinette, trimmed with revers of golden brown velvet and fastened with bronze buttons, has taken well for use in combination with golden brown and tan dress fabrics. They are cut short on the hips, with a coat back, and have the revers on the postillion faced with velvet so as to give the idea of a bodice. Another pretty jersey is made of silk tricotrin, having a row of beads between each rid of the tricotrin. They are shown in black, garnet, bronze and navy blue, with beads to match, but are too expensive for ordinary wear.

THE BANK OF LONDON .- The third annual report of the Bank of London in Canada, given elsewhere, with the proceedings of the meeting, cannot fail to be highly gratifying to the shareholders. Beginning business at a time when one or two of the larger banks in the Province were deeply exercised over the condition of their accounts, it was not singular that hesitation should be shown in making investments in the new bank's stock. Those who proved their entire confidence in the acknowledged ability of the now President of the Bank of London to make a success of the proposed enterprise, have not been obliged to wait long to find that their investments have not been misplaced. The earnings of the bank for the past twelve months are nearly ten per cent. on the present paid-up capital, out of which were paid to the shareholders two half-yearly dividends at the rate of seven per cent, and the sum of \$6,093.03 carried to credit of Profit and Loss. The large amount of deposits in the bank is an evidence of increasing public confidence and the proportion of Specie to Dominion notes is worthy of imitation.

ANOTHER counterfeit bill, and this time a very dangerous one, has been detected in this city. This counterfeit is an excellent imitation of the S5 of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, and appeared first ten years ago but was withdrawn by its makers after detection by the public. The paper is of inferior quality and it will be noticed, on close examination that the portrait of the Queen in the centre has a ring on the finger in the genuine bill, but not in the bogus one. The shading of the counterfeit on the back is also very irregular and is lighter than that of the genuine. The counterfeit bears the name of E. J. Smith as eashier, which is not on the real bill.

The new parcel post system, according to latest advices, goes into effect between Britain and Canada on Monday next. From Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Quebec the rate will be 30c. per lb. or fraction of a pound; from Ontario 35c.; from Manitoba and Northwest 40c, and from British Columbia 45c. No parcel may be over three pounds, and must be prepaid in ordinary postage. In Canada every package must be opened by a Customs officer in presence of the receiver, and only 125 post offices out of 7,000 in the Dominion have Customs officers and can transact the business.

The traffic returns of the G. T. R., for week ending July 24th, 1886, show an increase of \$59,535, as compared with those of the same week of 1885.

# Meetings, &c.

UNION BANK OF LOWER CANADA.

The special general meeting of the share-holders of this institution was held in Quebec the 19th July, 1886. The president Mr.

Andrew Thomson took the chair. Mr. A. Mercer was appointed Secretary and Messrs. J. S. Budden and P. A. Shaw, scrutineers.

The chairman then read the notice calling the meeting, Mr. E. E. Webb, the acting cush ier, read the general statements of the assets and liabilities of the bank, explaining the the various items.

The chairman addressed the meeting at length on the general operations of the bank during the past ten years, giving an account of the losses sustained, the annual earnings, and the prospects of the future business of the bank. After which the following resolution was put by the chairman, seconded by the Hon. Geo. Irvine, and carried unanimously:—

"That this meeting doth hereby confirm and accept a certain act passed at the last session of the Parliament of Canada, intituled: 'An act to reduce the capital stock of the Union Bank of Lower Canada, and to change the corporate name thereof to the Union Bank of Canada.'"

The meeting then adjourned, and the 21st annual meeting which was adjourned from the 12th instant, was continued, with Mr. Andrew Thomson in the chair.

The following report of the directors was submitted.

#### REPORT.

The Directors beg to submit the following statement of the result of the past year's business of the bank:

The Directors have made provision for a dividend to be declared of 3 per cent. on the reduced capital of the bank, which will amount to \$36,000, and be payable on the 19th inst., provided the shareholders, at the special general meeting, called for that purpose, on the 19th inst., do adopt the Act passed at the last session of Parliament to reduce the capital of the bank. After payment of the dividend there will remain \$120,781.48, from which there will be appropriated for bad and doubtful debts, \$107,497.51, leaving a balance at credit of Profit and Loss account of \$13,283.97 to be carried forward to new account. Your Directors petitioned Parliament for a reduction of the capital, in accordance with the terms of the resolution adopted by the shareholders at the last annual meeting. The statement of bad and doubtful debts and other depreciated assets of the bank was submitted to the Banking Committee of the House of Commons, and after careful consideration the Committee recommended a reduction of capital by 40 per cent. and on this report a Bill was passed by Parliament for a reduction to that extent; but the Act does not take effect until the shareholders adopt it at a special meeting called for that purpose. The branch of the bank at Three Rivers was closed in January last. A branch was opened at Leth-bridge, N. W. T., in May last, and some pro-gress has been made in developing a business. Lethbridge is the centre of large coal-mining and ranching districts, and it is hoped that this agency will become an important auxiliary to the Winnipeg branch of the bank. The business is confined almost entirely to deposits and circulation. The cashiership of the bank became vacant by the resignation of

Mr. MacEwen, who had been in the service of the bank for many years. Mr. Webb has acted as cashier to the entire satisfaction of the Directors from the time of Mr. MacEwen's resignation. It is intended that the office will be permanently filled soon after the annual meeting. The branches of the bank have been duly inspected.



MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

Thursday Evg., July 29, 1886.

Broken weather and the religious festivities caused an unsettled state of things in wholesale trade circles during the week, but it is said that retailers were benefited to some extent by the influx of country visitors. Many business men are now out of the city, or about to leave, and the holiday feeling is gaining ground. Remittances continue to be favorably spoken of in most departments of trade.

COAL AND WOOD .- There is a good enquiry for anthracite coal for domestic purposes at steady prices. Soft coal is quiet and steady. There is not much offering and current supplies are going into consumption. For round lots quotations are shaded 10c @ 20c per ton. Cape Breton \$3 @ \$3.10, Nova Scotia \$3.50 and Scotch steam to arrive \$3.75. Stove \$5.50; chestnut, \$5.25; egg and furnace, \$5. Scotch grate \$5.50; Newcastle smiths, S6. Cordwood—Yard prices per long cord (cartage 50c extra) are as follows:—Maple, \$6; birch, \$5.50; beech, \$5; tamarac, \$4.50; hemlock, \$4. Coke, \$2.50 tamarac, \$4.50; hemlock, \$4. Coke, \$2.50 per chaldren of 36 bush.; crushed coke (stove or egg size) \$3.30 delivered.

DRY Goods. The recent fetes in honor of the first Canadian Cardinal have proved a considerable stimulus to the city retail trade as a large influx of visitors has been experienced. The wholesale trade report a fair volume of business doing. Owing to the large advance in all fine imported woollens, buyers are clamoring for early delivery and there is an entire absence of that annoying cancellation of orders which was complained of so much last year. In fact, this year the boot is on the other leg, and it is a question if some of those houses who were unfortunate ... enough to lose goods in the wreck of the Lake Champlain, can fill their orders without considerable loss as Continental makers will

not guarantee quotations for a single day, and attempts to secure repeats by cable are useless except at a very considerable advance. Canadian woollens show no corresponding rise and owing to the severity of competition are hardly likely to. Remittances are very fair and in comparison with the increased volume of trade may be fairly considered satisfactory. The general outlook is more cheering and if cutting prices and dating ahead were climinated a prosperous season could be fairly looked for,

DRUGS AND CHEMICALS. - The volume of business has been moderate. Balsam capaiva has continued in demand at New York and 6,000 lbs Central American sold from second hand at 28c@28je. Alexandria senna is very scurce and the supply abroad is said to be about exhausted; the tendency of the market is upward. Russian cantharides are attracting more attention. For quinine there has been an increased jobbing demand and during the past few days it is estimated that some 15,000 ozs. German in large bulk have been taken for the consuming trade in New York. Included in this quantity was one lot of 1,000 of gold and silver, which was obtained at 49e, but the remainder realized full 50c. London bark sales were cabled #3,000 bales offered, 2,300 sold, prices unchanged." This information imparted a somewhat steadier tone to the market, made holders less anxious to realize. Towards the close 491c was bid for good brands, but nothing was obtainable under 50c. Opium shows no improvement, buyers desiring to cover only current wants. Balsam fir, \$2.25 & \$2.30 for Canadian and \$1.75 for Oregon in New York. For most descriptions of chemicals there has been a quiet market. Borax yet shows an easy tendency. Quicksilver is cabled £6 16s in London. Heavy English chemicals show no improvement. Arsenie is dull, both for prompt and forward delivery. For crude brimstone there is little or no inquiry. In citric acid there is less doing.

DARRY PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS .- Only an ordinary jobbing trade is reported in butter but creamery is firm and holders want 21c for choice. Buyers consider this too high and there is something of a stand-off. In cheese there is a quiet feeling and the tone is in-clined to ease. It is said that Se has been paid in one or two instances to complete balance of orders and that figure is still the top of the market. A steady accumulation is

going on in the country and as July cheese is not a favorite there seems but little likelihood of better prices in the near future. The question of ocean freight on cheese, says a contemporary, is one to which attention should be directed. At the present juncture when our shippers are paying 30s, with New Yorkers paying 10s @ 12s 6d, the 20s rate from New York being by the fast steamers, the rate paid from Montreal naturally places us at some disadvantage in competing for business, and shippers should suggest to steamship agents the advisability of granting lower rates, especially as grain freights have declined recently. The exports last week reached 114,000 boxes, or 56,000 from the States and 58,000 from Canada. This is 44,-000 boxes less than at same period last year. The ruling price at Utica, N. Y., was 7%c, against 7c last year. Considerable cheese shipped from Canada is American make and ranks as Canadian on the other side, cheese made here enjoying a better reputation than States cheese. In this connection the followfigures of the New York Produce Exchange, showing shipments of cheese from the United States to the Dominion for the fiscal years ending June 30, is interesting.

four American custom districts of Champlain, N. Y.; Cape Vincent, N. Y.; Oswegatchie, N. Y., and Luron, Mich.—Local provisions are quiet at quotations.

Fish, On and Salt.-Recent letters state that there has been a short catch of Cape Breton herring, and in some parts the fishery has been a failure. First arrivals are expected here about the middle of August and Labrador herrings nearly a month later. If the Labrador catch is short, the proportion of Cape Breton forwarded is likely to be small, at least so says a correspondent. Here there has only been a light jobbing trade in either fish or oils and we quote nominally as before. Dry cod ranges all the way from \$2.75@\$3.50 as to size of lot, etc. Some little business is reported in boneless cod at 4c@5c. There is

no recent business reported in canned mackerel but \$3 is quoted. Canned salmon is scarce and \$1.70 is asked for new. Two hundred cases of old stock was sent here from Ottawa and realized \$1.40. New lobsters may be quoted at \$5.20 @ \$5.35 by the case for the ordinary jobbing trade We learn of a lot of one hundred cases placed at \$5.15. Salt is easier and quoted at 43c 66 45c for elevens, and 41c & 43c for twelves. Old British Col-umbia salmon is quoted at \$12. Fresh arrivals at lower ports sell at \$11 @ \$13 as to quantity.

FLOUR AND GRAIN .- Fresh ground flour is in light offer and firm. There is a fair demand for extra, fancy and spring extra, while inferior does not receive much attention, Choice extra has sold at \$3.75, and \$3.471 was paid for a lot of fancy. Fresh-groung spring extra is held firmly at \$3.40. Manitoba strong bakers has ruled quiet, with sales of four cars at \$4.60. There was some enquiry for export but no business resulted. Oatmeal is quiet at \$4.10 @ \$4.25 for standard, and \$4.40 @ \$4.60 for granulated. In grain there is only a local business on spot, and the trade in through Western grain is slackening. Ocean steamers have been contracted for ahead and so have been able to maintain former freights. A vessel to Glasgow took 54,000 bushels and another to Bristol 21,900. In the West, wheat has been excited. An upward turn caused free selling and the market broke 24c @ 24c. Corn and oats were also stronger but followed wheat in the decline. Engagements at Chicago vesterday were only 125,000 bushels wheat and 138,000 corn. Lake freights were 3c on wheat and 23c on corn per bushel to Buffalo. The total quantity of wheat in sight on this continent and affoat to Europe, calculating according to the Chicago visible supply, is 53,707,-000 bushels—an increase of 2,900,000 bushels compared with a week ago, an increase of 2,900,000 compared with two weeks ago, an increase of 279,000 compared with three weeks ago, an increase of 1,204,000 compared with four weeks ago, and a decrease of 4,882,000 with a year ago. In England a large acreage of the best cereal crops has been damaged by rains. The supplies of native wheat are much restricted, causing values to improve 6d @ 1s. The sales of English wheat during the past week were 27,294 quarters at 31s 3d, against 32,254 quarters at 33s 11d during the correponding week last year. Late cables note an improved tone in the British markets, al-though no change in the value of wheat was


cabled. The market for cargoes in all positions ruled firmer, while corn on passage was strong. At Mark Lane wheat and corn were firm. The country wheat markets in England were strong and in France firm. In Liverpool the wheat market was firmer and corn advanced another 1d to 4s 21d. Canadian peas were unchanged at 5s 4d. The Parisian markets were the turn dearer. The amount of wheat and flour reduced to wheat affoat in Europe shows a decrease of 235,000 quarters, or 1,880,000 bushels compared with a week ago, and an increase of 320,000 quarters, or 2,560,000 bushels compared with a year ago. Corn shows an increase of 65,000 quarters, compared with a week ago, and an increase of 190,000 quarters with a year ago.

GROCERIES. - The distribution, generally speaking, is quite an average one for the season. Sugar has continued active, large quantities being forwarded to all points, as is usual during the fruit season. Low prices have been current but the trade is getting tired at making large turn-overs at such poor profit and the Dominion Association will attempt a change as explained elsewhere. Teas are also suffering from depression and a cup of tea ought not to be a dear luxury just now. Recent letters state that the leading European importers are looking for low prices and have cancelled credits in Japan in some instances. The first of the four or five tea ships destined for the Pacific terminus, the "Flint," is bringing a large quantity of tea to Montreal, in fact most of the cargo is for city wholesale houses. There is little business doing as consumers show a disposition to purchase for immediate requirements only. Dried fruits are steady but the demand is not brisk. Spices continue to maintain a firm position. Molasses unchanged. A despatch from South Carolina states that the rice fields for many miles along the Santce River have been ruined by an overflow, and in face of the thoods of the past two years many planters will be driven from the business. The country for a long distance inland is covered with

GREEN FRUITS, ETC.—The city demand is quiet and will be until the holidays are over, many being out of town. Country trade is good. The hot weather has caused a brisker call for lemons. Only California peaches are in the market, but supplies will be plentiful from about the middle of next month. Here it is difficult to quote, but holders are asking high prices.

IRON AND HARDWARE.-Trade has ruled quiet, and so far as the local trade is concerned there is nothing of value to report. Representative men are more disposed to talk of hot weather and the pleasures of the surf than anything else. However, there has been a continued good demand for some lines of hardware, and also for horse shoes, nails, builders' requisites, etc. It may be stated in passing, so as to correct misleading statepassing, so as to correct instanting statements in the daily press, that the duty on pig-iron is equal to 20 per cent. and on stoves it is 25 per cent. A leading British firm writes: Large lines of tin plates have been forwarded to San Francisco; our sales alone being 10,000 boxes in a few days. Stocks are light. Shipments of Scotch pig are still unsatisfactory. From Glasgow for week ended 10th July, 5,311 tons, against 7,044 last year." In the States it is stated that about 1,000,000 lbs. Arizona pig copper was sold very recently at 8 c to home buyers. Cables from London report a reaction there to £38 17s 6d for Chilian bars. Circulars just at hand note a decrease during the first half of July of 50 tons in the stock of fine copper in London, but an increase at Liverpool and Swansea in out an increase at Liverpool and Swansea in the stock of Chilian and Bolivian product equal to 461 tons. Purchases of lead pipe have been very moderate, and confined to a few single car lots. The demand has run very slow as well. Holders generally quote 4.90c for common, but 4.85c would seem the best price obtained. best price obtainable. London cables note a weaker market there, with a decline in soft Spanish. Warrants in Glasgow are cabled higher at 39s. No. 3 foundry, G. M. B., 29s 11d. London, July 26.—Tin, spot, £98, three months' futures, £99. Market quiet; G. O. B. Chili bars, £39 5s; soft Spanish lead, £12 15s; best selected copper, £43; soft English lead, £13 10s; Silesian spelter, £14 2s 6ā; HalletUs antimony, £31 10s; tinplates, 13s 3d.

LEATHER AND BOOTS AND SHOES .- Trade still continues quiet, but a steady business is doing. Some large sales of Quebec splits have taken place at prices varying from 21½ to 23 cents. Upper is hardly so lively, but some good sized lots have moved off at 35 to 38 cents, the latter for fine light, 371c being the ruling report plenty of orders, and there is no doubt of a good fall trade, but they are letting their spring purchases of leather run out before repeating their orders. American made sole still continues to come in. The price for "good damaged," such as is usually shipped to Europe, and about equal to our No. 2 sole, is stated to be 18 cents, or about 21 cents laid down here. The demand for sole con-

tinues fair, and some large sales of No. 2 have been effected at 21 cents, principally for Quebec, but American oak is rapidly taking the place of Canadian slaughter sole, and at the rate now ruling in New York and Baltimore, whence it principally comes, can compete successfully with the Canadian slaughter. It costs 33 to 35c, against 25 to 27 cents for slaughter sole, but then it comes cropped so that there is no wasteage or offal, and it can be used on the Goodycar Welt Sewing machine which is a great recommendation to the boot and shoe trade. It is of a milder tannage than the Canadian leather, and in appearance closely approximates to English oak, and thus makes a nicer bottom than slaughter sole. Buff is moving steadily, and altogether, though there is no hum, a steady trade is doing and the prospects ahead are reassuring.

LIVE STOCK .- The offerings of cattle were large, but the business was quiet and few sales were made, prices for export stock being easier at 43e @ 5c per 1b. live weight. For butcher's stock there was a fair demand and prices were steady at 3c @ 4c per lb. live weight. There was an active demand for sheep, of which the offerings were large and prices firmer at 4c per 1b Good enquiry for hogs, but the supply was light, and prices have advanced  $\frac{1}{2}e$  per lb A firm bought a carload of hogs which had just arrived from Manitoba, being on the road nine days were in excellent condition and realized 54c per lb. The demand for calves was slow at from \$2 @ \$10 cach as to quality.



Daugs.—There is a moderate demand, with a few changes in prices. Howard's quinine easier at 79c to 83c, and German at 65c to 70c. Morphia steady at \$1.80 to \$\frac{1}{2}\$. Turpentine steady at 58c to 63c. Linseed oil, 62c for raw and 66c for boiled. Opium weaker at \$3.15 to \$3.40. Oil of lemon \$3.50 to \$3.75.

Flour and Grain.—Flour has been steady this week, with a limited number of transactions. Superior extras sold outside at equal to \$3.50, and extras are quoted at \$3.50. Spring extras are nominal at \$3.25 to \$3.50, and patents at \$3.85 to \$4.50, according to quality. Wheat remains unsettled, but prices are comparatively steady. There have been sales of No. 2 fall this week at 77c and 78c; uninspected at 75c, and goose at 72c on track. No. 2 red winter and No. 2 spring are quoted at 78c. Barley purely nominal. Oats are firm with offerings limited; car lots rule at 35c to 36c on track. Peas are worth about 57c, but there is very little doing. Rye purely nominal. Oatmeat dull and unchanged at \$3.75 for car lots, and \$3.85 to \$4 for small lots. Bran is firm, car lots for shipment being worth about \$9.50.

Guocenies.—The wholesale trade is quiet, with prices generally steady.

HIDES AND SKINS.—Green hides are slightly casier this week, the best prices being 8½c for No. 1 steers, and 8c for No. 1 cows. Oured are quoted at 9c to 9½c for steers, and 8½c for cows. Lambskins are in good demand, and firm at 40c, and pelts at 35c. There will likely be an advance on the 1st prox. Tallow remains dull and prices weak at 4½c for rendered and at 2c for rough.

Hors.—There is a moderate demand, and prices are higher at 20c to 25c. Brewers generally are well supplied.

Live Stock.—The cattle trade is very dull at present. Unsatisfactory accounts still continue to arrive from Britain, and the warm weather is affecting the local demand. There are no buyers here for export, and several cars were shipped through to Montreal. The nominal prices are 4½c to 4½c per lb. Butchers' cattle weak at 2½c to 4c per ll., the latter for choice.
