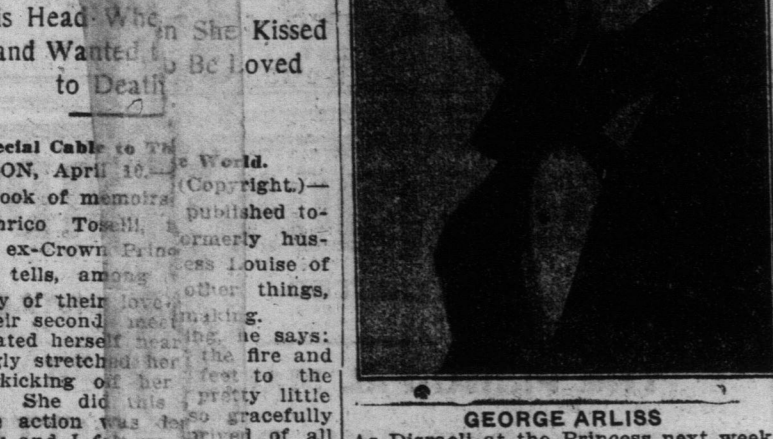

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REAL ESTATE AND CONSTRUCTION NEWS

FOUR DOLLARS A DAY TAXES ON A COLLEGE STREET RESIDENCE

University Demands For Release of Business Restriction Termed a Holdup by Property Owners—Willing to Pay a Fair Price—Hon. J. J. Foy's Act Will Probably Have to be Amended.

Owing to protests that were made by property owners on College street, near the corner of Yonge street, it is conceded that Hon. J. J. Foy's act, relating to the avenues and approaches to Queen's Park, will have to be amended before the bill is passed by the house.

The government held a conference with the city council and the property owners at noon yesterday, and the attendance at the meeting was sufficient to show that the feelings of the property owners run very high. One man is paying \$4 a day for the use of "residence" land. The majority of the property owners who attended the meeting are physicians, and without exception they all declared that the action on the part of the university was the rankest kind of hold-up.

After listening to the complaints of the residents, Hon. Thomas Crawford suggested that the city council should hold a conference with the board of governors of the university before the bill was presented to the house for its second reading. This policy seemed pleasing to the residents, and was accordingly organized and arranged for a conference with City Solicitor Johnston at 5 o'clock, to arrange for the meeting with the university authorities.

The following members of the committee: Dr. McKeown, Dr. McLaughlin, Dr. G. S. Ryerson, Dr. W. J. Wilson, Dr. W. H. B. Aikins. From the noon meeting it appears that the agreement and dealings between the university and the College street residents are tangled up in an almost insoluble muddle. Dr. Ryerson, who presented the case of the ratepayers, said that the common opinion that the university owned a strip of the street was wrong, and that in reality it owned only an imaginary line, the arrangement made in 1889, the street would be preserved as residential street. As time went on, however, the university approached individual property owners and offered to waive its claim on the building restrictions for certain considerations.

The university, he said, "uses its own choice in selecting with whom it will deal, and the agreement with the interests of the property owners would be preserved has not been kept." He then pointed out that the Y. M. C. A. building had been put up, and also

referred to the Foresters' Hall, the Upper Canada Bible Society building, and the two hospitals on the south side of the street.

OBJECTS TO ARMORIES BY WILLOWVALE PARK

Editor World: I understand, thru the daily papers, that Sir Henry Pellatt has purchased the strip of land west of Willowvale Park to east side of Crawford street, with a frontage of about 200 feet on Bloor street, for the purpose of erecting an armory for the use of the Queen's Own Rifles. This plot of land, I understand, was to have been purchased by the city for the extension of the park, and a plan has already been submitted to the parks committee by the present park commissioner, and if the plan submitted by Mr. Chambers could be adopted it would, without doubt, make this one of the finest parks and playgrounds in Toronto, which is so badly needed in this thickly populated section of the city.

If the scheme as proposed by Sir Henry Pellatt is carried out it will not only spoil the park but the property building erected in the park. Such a building erected in the park would be the level of the road would only leave a mass of roof to be seen to the public eye.

To the north of this splendid site stands Essex Street Public School, where there are at present about 1200 children in attendance needing such a playground. On the east is Palmerston Avenue School in the same position. These children are compelled to play on the streets, where often, to the inconvenience of their parents, they impose for smashing electric light lamps, windows etc.

The people living in this district are by no means wealthy, but have in most cases succeeded in erecting houses and their families. Surely this class of citizen is entitled at least to some consideration and fair play.

I am not questioning the generosity of Sir Henry Pellatt in presenting a site to the Queen's Own Rifles for an armory and drill shed, but I do protest against such building being erected on this splendid park site.

If it is necessary to have such an armory near a park that could be used as a parade ground, why does not the city erect in Exhibition Park good advantage during the Exhibition. Robert Martin, 756 Crawford street, Toronto.

MAY LIMIT AGE OF CITY "NEWSIES"

Bill Requiring Newsboys to Be Twelve Years Old is Opposed.

Mr. Elliott was in protest against it, stating that he was in the opinion that there would be hundreds of boys in Toronto who would be deprived of the means of getting a living if the clause were passed.
