OWN SOUND THE NEXT CITY

Many New Enterprises Being Established, and Business of All Kinds is Brisk.

BUTTER EXHIBIT WINS HIGH HONORS

Several Vessels Being Built, Including Yacht for Inspector of Fisheries.

Owen Sound, Aug. 11.—(Special)—If the present rate of progress continues, Owen Sound will be eligible for city rank within a year. Factories, new and old, are all working full time, shipping is lively, business is brisk, buildings are going up on almost every street, and people now crowded into various nooks and corners are waiting to fill them. Many new enterprises have been recently established and more are coming.

Big Commercial Mill. On Monday work will begin for the conversion of the largest of the C.P.R. elevators into a huge commercial mill, to be operated by Chandler & Co. of Richmond, Va. The mill will be brought from Chicago and other parts, ground here in bond and shipped to the Western States at the rate of \$200 barrels per day. Large cranes will be erected to supply the barges with fuel.

Mr. John McQuaker, proprietor of Pleasant view Creamery, has taken the highest award for his butter exhibited at the Pan-American. The butter was prepared under the supervision of Mr. James Strathairn, a Scotchman, who has been in charge of the creamery since its opening. The award is a gold medal and a certificate of merit.

Vessels Being Built. Mr. E. Trist on Thursday launched a tug, which he has named the "Fisher". It is a 100-horsepower tug, and will be used for the purpose of towing the fishing boats in the harbor. It is the first tug of its kind built in Owen Sound.

Highlanders' Band at Fair. The 4th Highlanders' Band and pipe band has been engaged for two days at North York Exhibition in October. The band is composed of 40 members, and is one of the best in the province. They will be playing at the fair every day.

Accidentally Shot. Buffalo, Aug. 11.—Fred White Gibson, 20 years old, son of William Gibson, prominent citizen of Williamsport, Pa., was shot and instantly killed at Derby-on-the-Lake this afternoon by one of two farm hands, who were practicing revolver shooting. Gibson was sitting on the lawn in front of the home of E. L. Anthony, a hardware dealer, and the men were shooting from the lake shore toward the bank. A bullet from one of the revolvers that was aimed too high struck Gibson in the heart.

over the difficulty of settling the Glen Avenue steel bridge trouble in Rosedale. It was thought that the district immediately north of the bridge would be annexed to the city, but it has been found difficult to get the City Council to consider the annexation of its present boundaries. The present intention is to divide the entire area into two wards, and the district is separated as anticipated, it will retain its connection with its parent corporation, but can be allowed to make independent rates for improvement inside its limits. Brilliant Graduate of Toronto University. Niagara Falls, Ont., Aug. 11.—(Special)—Pell Brown, only daughter of Mr. James Brown of H. M. Customs, Niagara Falls, Ont., one of Canada's brightest scholars, died at St. Catharines Hospital Saturday evening, after an illness of two weeks of duration with typhoid fever. She was born in Crowland Township, Ontario, in 1875. Her early education was obtained in the Welland and Niagara Falls Public Schools, and when but 10 years of age she passed the entrance examination for the well-known school in the Drummondville High School, going to that school in 1891. She was a member of the Niagara Falls Public Schools, and won the gold medal for general proficiency under Miss Fitzgerald, afterwards a distinguished professor of the Mary Mulock Scholarship in Latin at Toronto University. Graduating with honors in 1894, she received the degree of B.A., and qualifying as a teacher, she taught in the Hamilton Normal College, and in the University of Colorado. It was at the latter university that she obtained the degree of M.A., obtaining the highest honors given in this university for this degree. Her Latin scholarship was secured in all the examinations, and she was awarded a Ph.D. It was her intention to go to the University of Toronto to continue her studies, but she died before she could do so.

ST. PAUL'S GREAT FEIL. American Visitors Fleck to See Crack in Famous Church. London, Aug. 11.—American visitors, even more than Londoners and English tourists, seem to have been interested, quite naturally, about the reports regarding St. Paul's Cathedral's crumbling into ruins, about which I spoke in my letter last week. SCORCHING HEAT WAVE. London, Aug. 10.—Telegrams from Rome to-day say nothing like the heat wave which has been sweeping over Italy since the living memory. The thermometer in the city registered 43 degrees in the shade. The vineyards in the district have been shrivelled up by the sun, and the crops are being ruined. The water is so warm that bathing has been abandoned. The people have been forced to sleep in the open air.

Burial of Von Ketteler. Munster, Westphalia, Aug. 10.—The remains of Baron von Ketteler, the Minister of Germany who was murdered at Pöln in the outbreak of the Chinese troubles, were interred here to-day, after the celebration of a requiem mass. The deceased and other relatives of the hero were present. A grand of honor was held by the students of the cathedral.

Five Lives Lost. Victoria, B.C., Aug. 10.—Details have been received by the steamer Monna, of the destruction of five lives in the department of Anthony Hordern & Sons, in Australia. This monster department stores, which were the largest in the world, employing over 1500 hands, and serving an average of 30,000 customers daily, were wiped out by a fire on July 15, 1901. The fire was caused by a gas burner in the building which was burning brightly while the firemen were trying to raise a ladder to save him. The loss was over \$5,000,000 in all.

"Knockers" in the Church. An athletic association has been formed in the district of Long Sandwich, a suburb of the city. A committee composed of Rev. A. W. Briggs, James Simpson and H. B. Biecher, is drafting a constitution, which will be dealt with at an early date.
