## LOUBET AT GALA OPERA ATTENDED BY THE KING

Beef Eaters Guarded Royal Box in the Centre of the House

London, July 7.—A gala operatic performance was given at Covent Garden to-night in honor of President Loubet. A salute and a roar of cheers announced the arrival of King Edward and President Loubet, who entered the royal box and stood bowing while the hands played the British and French national anthems.

All the members of the diplomatic corps in London were present, wearing their decorations. A detachment of Imperial Yeomanry formed a body-guard of honor, and the historical beef eaters in their quaint attire lined the approach to the royal box, which was in the centre of the house.

The performance consisted of selections from "Rigoletto," "Carmen" and "Roméo and Juliet," and was conducted by Nell Forsyth, who was afterwards decorated by President Loubet with the Legion of Honor.

## CANADA AND SOUTH AFRICA

Ottawa, July 7.—Sir Richard Cartwright, in the house took a copy of the contract between the Dominion government and the Allan, Elder-Dunsmuir and Partners Steamship Company for a monthly steamship service between Canada and South Africa.

The contract runs for five years from the 1st October, 1902, the annual salary being \$150,000.

### BUILDERS' LABORERS MAY RETURN TO WORK FRIDAY

Said That Long Struggle Has Weakened Resources and Forced a Capitulation to Old Terms.

It has been stated on good authority that the Builders' Laborers' Union, now on strike, are about to capitulate.

The last week or two rumors have been rife to the effect that the union's funds are in a depleted condition, and that as a result dissatisfaction with the end of the hard-fought struggle is creeping in. One rumor seen last night would say nothing as to the decision arrived at. It remarked, however, if such a course was to be taken, the union men deserved much praise for the manner in which they fought for their demands against such great odds.

Should the decision of the union be in the affirmative, it will be on Friday that the conditions under which the men will return, it is stated, will be the original conditions of an hour's day, and other conditions the same. They will, however, ask the Builders' Exchange that they recognize that union.

First the mass of the Holy Ghost in the chapel of St. Gregory. Then the cardinals go in procession, two and two, according to their rank, surrounded by the Swiss guard and singing "Veni Creator Spiritus," to take possession of the cells assigned to each by lot.

These cells are erected in a hall of the Vatican communicating with the Sistine Chapel. They are more frameworks of wood hung with fringed curtains. Five are green in hue, because the occupants were created by God. The drapery of 52 will be of violet, because their occupants are creatures of Leo XIII.

On one side of each cell is a curtained doorway, over which the cardinal's armorial is shown, and higher still is a little swinging window. Each cardinal has a bed, a table and a chair. His attendants, who have yet to be described, support life in discomfort as best they may.

Having viewed their quarters, the cardinals go to the Pauline Chapel, where bulls concerning the election of a Pope are read. The cardinal, who is elected, exhorts the conclave to conform.

Cardinals become prisoners. They may go and dine at home in comfort for the first time until a new Pope begins to reign, but their movements are bound to return to the Vatican before 9 a.m. on each day of the conclave.
