REPORT OF ST. JAMES' CATHEDRAL MORNING SUNDAY SCHOOL, FOR YEAR ENDING EASTER, 1890.

The past year of the morning Sunday School's existence has been one in which not much has occurred that calls for special remark. With such an efficient staff of teachers as the school fortunately possesses, there can be no doubt that very much good work has been accomplished. Perhaps a difference in the statistics between those of the previous year and the one just completed should be noticed. Although the total attendance at the school shews a decrease, as a matter of fact, the school proper can boast of an INCREASE in numbers. The decrease referred to has been occasioned by a diminution of the numbers attending the Infant Class (which will be found accounted for in the report of the Superintendent of that branch of the School). It is expected that the Young Men's Bible Class, only recently commenced by the Rev. Mr. Winterbourne, and held on Sunday mornings, will speedily become augmented.

Every year brings its losses and gains to the school, but, since the last annual report, a loss has been suffered which demands more than a passing notice. Mr. George Harcourt, who, for more than twenty-five years, had devoted his best energies to instructing the Infant branch of the school, was forced to relinquish his charge on account of failing health. This loss to the school was followed by one much more general in character, as, during the summer of last year, and shortly after his resignation from Sunday School labours, Mr. Harcourt was called to his well-earned rest whilst on a visit to a member of his family in Chicago. Too much cannot be said in praise of one who, for so many years performed the work which he undertook with such beneficial results.

The Summer Pic-nic was held on Thursday, 4th July, 1889; and the Christmas Festival on Friday evening, 27th December, 1889, both passing off most successfully.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF ST. JAMES' CATHEDRAL SUNDAY SCHOOL INFANT CLASS.

The resignation of my father as teacher, followed so soon after by his death, has been a great blow to our class, for, though he would not have been teacher, we depended greatly on having him with us to help by his counsel and influence.

At his death the class seemed to drop away unaccountably, and it was with difficulty that the names of 150 scholars were placed on our roll, and it was not until September last that the class was put into good working order. The report below is therefore made up from September the 1st.

The average attendance has not been as large this winter as could be desired, but this can be accounted for by the fact that an unusual number of our little ones have been sick, and for over one month none of the boys of the Boys' Home attended class for the same reason. The attendance has increased greatly during the past two months, and we think it will continue to do so, as new scholars are being added to our roll every Sunday.

### LIBRARIANS' REPORT.

The Librarians in making their report have reason for congratulation at the success attending their first year in the new Library.

With a larger Library Room, new and a greater variety of books, and improved system of distribution, it is not to be wondered at that the circulation of books exceeded the number at first thought, but that so few volumes of the many sent out should be lost the first year is a reason for congratulation.

The system of distribution is materially the same as was formerly used, but improved. Before deciding upon a system, an inspection of the principal Sunday School Libraries of the city was made by committees appointed, and it was found that that in use in the former Library, with suggested improvements, would be just as efficient and less expensive than any in use at the Libraries visited.

Scholars and others taking books realize now that they have to conform to the rules, and the work of the Librarians has considerably lessened.

When making the selection of Books it was quite impossible to examine each and every one, and some were put in that have since been condemned and thrown out. In place of those thrown out such books as have in a year's experience suggested themselves as necessary, have been put in.

The Librarians have reason to believe the Library has caused many scholars to continue in attendance at the Sunday Schools who could

Monthly meetings have been held in the School-house on the second Friday in every month, at 3 o'clock, except during the three summer months, and the attendance has been most encouraging. Last autumn the President Mrs. Brock, and the Vice-President, Mrs. Gzowski resigned their positions. The resignations were accepted with much regret.

In accordance with an appeal made by the Bishop of Algoma, to the Board of the Woman's Auxiliary for \$200 annually to extend the Church in the Township of Temiscamingue, it was resolved that St. James' Cathedral Branch should contribute \$25 annually towards the amount.

An appeal was made by the Rev. A. E. Whatham—with the Bishop's consent—to the Board of the W. A. for \$150 to purchase the outfit (horse etc.) for a lay reader to assist the Rev. A. E. Whatham in the Haliburton and Cheddar Missions. It was resolved that St. James' Cathedral Branch should contribute \$10 towards the amount.

In answer to an appeal made by the President of the W. A. for contributions to pay the rent \$10 a month of the Central Rooms on Murray St., for the use of the Dorcas Department of the W. A., a member of St. James' Cathedral Branch undertook to pay \$1 a month for this year.

The Board of the W. A. having been authorized by the Mission Board to contribute \$350 annually to maintain a Home or School for Indian girls under the management of Miss Brown, the lady missionary at Gleichen, N. W. T., the Branches were requested to give their assistance. St. James' Cathedral Branch undertook to pay annually the sum of \$10 towards the amount.

This Society continues to pay annually \$400 towards the stipend of the Rev. H. T. Bourne, of the Piegan Mission, Fort Macleod, Alberta, and \$30 annually towards Miss Brown's salary, Lady Missionary on the Blackfeet Reserve, Gleichen N. W. T. Also \$100.00 annually to the Nepigon Mission, Algoma, in charge of the Rev. R. Renison.

A lady member of St. James' Cathedral (Mrs. Alex. Cameron) has kindly undertaken to pay between \$300 and \$400 annually to educate a young man for the ministry.

During the year we have had the pleasure of hearing addresses from Mrs. Williamson, President of the Diocesan Board of the W. A.; Mrs. Cummings, Secretary of the same Society, Rev. H. T. Bourne

BROTHERHOOD OF ST. ANDREW.

Noticing the large number of young men present at the services of St. James' Cathedral, especially on Sunday evenings, it was thought advisable to organize a branch or Chapter of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, a society which had its origin in St. James' Church, Chicago, whose sole object is the spread of Christ's kingdom among young men. For this purpose, a meeting was held on February 4th, 1890, at which a Chapter was formally organized, and those present admitted as members. To further the object of the Brotherhood, a number of cards have been printed, stating the hours of the services and Bible classes of the Church, and extending a cordial welcome to be present at these, while notices to the same effect have been placed in the larger hotels of the city. Meetings are held in the Library every second Tuesday, at which the work is discussed, reports received, and new work assigned, including the appointment of a committee to take charge of young men at the Sunday evening services. Although it is only two months since the Chapter was organized, still the work done is very encouraging, and the Clergy and Churchwardens have expressed themselves as greatly pleased with the assistance that is being rendered them. A great deal of interest is being taken in the organization by its members, and it is safe to predict that it will duplicate the good work that is being done by the several Chapters in the States. Our Chapter has presented the Cathedral with collection bags for the choir, and has also been instrumental in placing the hymn numbers in a conspicuous part of the Church, and it is the intention of its members to resuscitate the Parish Magazine.

The amount paid in by the children is \$3.59, and the sum paid for clothing is \$59.74. There is a considerable bill still to be paid, but it is expected there will be sufficient to meet it when the School closes and all the children have paid up. The School always closes near to the 15th of May, with a tea-party and distribution of prizes. The attendance this year has not exceeded 84, but has been very regular and steady, the very lowest being 52, and that only once when there was so much illness prevalent in January. The conduct of the children has been remarkably good. This year a darning and patching class has been established, to which those who can do plain sewing well are admitted, but many of the older girls have to leave early to go to work in shops or as domestic servants.
