## AUSTRIANS ON RUN BEFORE THE VICTORIOUS ITALIANS

Milan, Aug. 31—The Austrians are in full retreat at two points. One in the Val Sugano, where they are blowing up bridges and viaducts and destroying all roads and railways as they retire. The other is in the region of the upper Izona where the Italian Alpini is wresting an important mountain summit from the

Austrian grip.

The latest official reports show that the Italians are now well advanced beyond Plazzo and are attacking the summit of Monterombon 6,000 feet high, which overlooks the valley of the Coritenza, a tributary of the Izono, commands the highway that culminates in Predie Pass at a height of 3,500 feet, and then descends into the Zebach Valley, where the Italians captured positions
