U. N. B. MEMORIAL HALL CONTRACT

The contract for the erection of the Memorial building at the University of New Brunswick was awarded yesterday to B. Mooney and Sons at a price in the vicinity of \$92,000. Work will be commenced on the structure at once and is to be completed on May 1, 1924. The building is of two-storeys and basement, of brick with stone trimming and pitched roof. It has a depth of 114 feet, including the Memorial Hall, and a frontage of 112 feet. In addition to the Memorial Hall there will be chemistry and electrical class rooms and a complete kitchen and dining room equipment.

Chancellor C. C. Jones said yesterday that about \$140,000 would be required for the building and the equipment and the amount that had been pledged to date was scarcely \$120,000. Of this amount \$50,000 had been secured from the public appeal, a response which had been encouraging in view of business conditions. The matter of securing the additional funds for the equipment was one that must receive serious consideration.
