Reports from Petrograd (St. Petersburg), tell of the entry of The Seaport of Cattare

Russians into Lemberg, the capital of Galicia. These appear credible, as news of the defeat of the Austrians in that district has been Tecevived from several sources.

The battle of Lemberg probably was the greatest ever fought. Evidently it resulted in a decisive and perhaps overwhelming defeat of the Austrians. The battle line extended over 200 miles, and it is estimated that 1,500,000 men were engaged.



THE WAR SITUATION

British Strike Telling Blow In **Turning German Wedge 45** Miles From Paris

Invading Horde Exhausted by Long Continued Marching and Fighting Lose Striking Force — French Government Moves to Bordeaux — Russian Successes

The seat of French government is to be removed from Paris to Bordeaux, which lies 358 miles south-southwest of Paris. The proclamation announcing this action refers to it as a temoprary arrange-

The proclamation was issued by the minister of the interior, who said the decision had been taken solely upon the demand of the military authorities, because the fortified places of Paris, while not necessarily likely to be attacked, would become the pivot of the field operations of the two armies.

Regarding the progress of the battle which the Germans are waging on French and Belgian soil, both the French and British officials are practically keeping silence. Troops movements are meagrely reported, and it is impossible to determine how the tide of battle is flowing.

The French official statement given below announcing that there are no German troops at Amiens, Arras, Lille and that the French line is being pushed forward into Lorraine, together with the admission that the Kaiser's troops are in the vicinity of Scissons and with the brilliant British exploit in cutting up German cavalry in the forest of Compeigne, indicate that the German armies are pushing forward a wedge between the extreme French left and the strongly entrenched positions still held from Verdun eastward along the frontier.

The forest of Compeigne is only forty-five miles from Paris, practically the distance from Sussex to St. John, whereas on Thursday, Aug. 20, two weeks ago, when the German armies first entered Brussels, they were 190 miles from Paris, or farther than from Chatham

The price for this unprecedented march against a heroic defence by British and French troops is known to be terribly dear, not only in actual losses, but in the exhaustion and weakening of the men engaged and The Telegraph's correspondent in the field sends from Havre this morning a stirring cable telling of the weakening of the attacking forces, resulting in poor marksmanship and general deter-



Petrograd (St. Petersburg), Sept. 2—The following official communication was issued by the Russian war office tonight:

"After a battle lasting seven days the Russian army seized heavily fortified positions around Lemberg, about ten or tweive miles from the town. The Russian troops then advanced towards the principal forts.

"After a battle yesterday which was fiercely contested, the Austrians were obliged to retreat in disorder, abandoning heavy and light guns, parks of artillage and field highers.

obliged to retreat in disorder, abandoning heavy and light guns, parks of artillery, and field kitchens.

"Our advance guard and cavalry pursued the enemy, who suffered enormous losses in killed, wounded and prisoners.

"The Austrian army operating in the neighborhood of Lemberg was composed of the third, eleventh and twelfth corps and part of the, seventh and fourteenth corps. This army appears to have been completely defeated.

"During the pursuit by the Russian troops the Austrians, who beat a retreat from Guila Lipa, were forced to abandon an additional thirty-one guns.

"Our troops are moving over roads encumbered with parks of artillery and convoys loaded with provisions of various kinds.

"The total number of guns captured by the Russians around Lemberg amounts to 150."






