GREECE AND SERVA NOT YET READY TO PERMIT PEACE

London, July 11.—Having failed in her hazardous coup, Bulgaria is now showing herself anxious for peace. No formal armistice has yet been arranged, but it is believed that hostilities are virtually ended. It is feared, however, that the settlement of the peace conditions will prove a long task, many new elements having entered to complicate matters. Bulgaria's decision not to oppose Romania's occupation of Silistria and the strip of territory she desires, removes one difficulty. But other developments, such as the Greek occupation of Kavala, to which Bulgaria is expected to offer bitter resistance, are calculated to lead to troublesome negotiations, especially as both Serbia and Greece, on the outcome of their campaigns, will be certain to demand possession of the territory they occupied previous to the war.

Daily Hints For the Cook

OATMEAL MACAROONS. Two tablespoons of butter, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon of baking powder, 1 cup of sugar, 1/2 teaspoon of salt, 3 cups of rolled oats. Cream the butter and sugar, add eggs well beaten, but not separated, salt, rolled oats and baking powder. Bake in a hot oven until brown and crisp.

BREAD GRIDDLECAKES. Scramble an egg and a half of stale bread in a pint of milk 10 or 12 hours. Keep the mixture in a warm place where it will sour slightly, then rub through a sieve, and add one teaspoon salt, two tablespoons sugar, half a pint of flour and a slight grating of nutmeg. Dissolve a teaspoon of soda in one-half a gill of milk add this liquid and two well-beaten eggs, and fry.

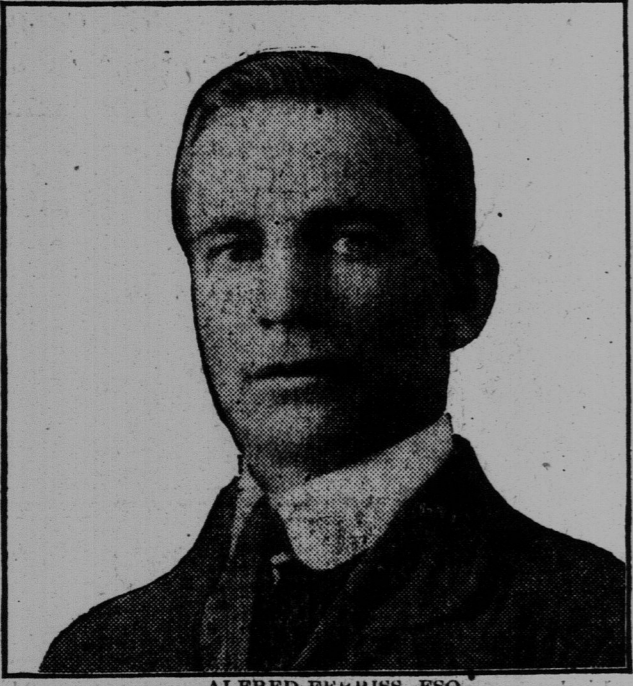

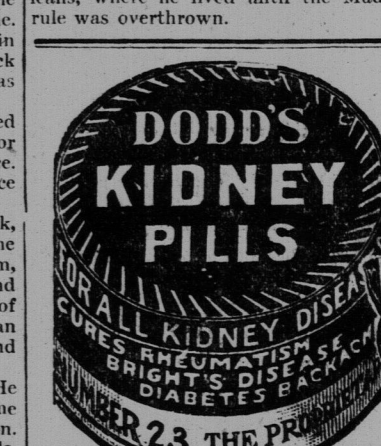

### THE PUBLIC HOSPITAL

Dr. W. W. White, in an interview in this issue of the Times, sets out very clearly the need of prompt action to provide this city with better hospital accommodation. The thing cannot be done by merely patching or adding a wing to the present antiquated building. The right plan to adopt would be one providing for a group of buildings with an administrative centre, and whatever expenditure is hereafter made should be made to serve that purpose. There will be complaint about the hospital until a right plan has been adopted and new buildings provided. As St. John is growing in population, the plans for the hospital should be made with due recognition of future needs. The matter is of so much importance to the city's welfare that it should be dealt with in the most generous spirit, and such action as would speedily ensure for St. John as good hospital accommodation as may be found in any city of equal or even considerably greater population in the whole country.

### CONCRETE FOR ROADS

Last week's issue of the Contract Record contains a contributed article on the efficiency of concrete in road work. The writer of this article is a very strong advocate of the use of concrete in country roads, claiming that it gives greater efficiency and in the end is less expensive than macadam or gravel roads. Reference is made in the article to what is being done in the state of Michigan. In Wayne County in that state the road commissioners adopted concrete and invested \$85,000 in the purchase of a road-building equipment, so that the work could be carried on advantageously and economically and on a large scale. After the first mile had been built the farmers saw the benefits and the county bought itself for \$2,000,000 for the continuance of the work. Now there are eighty miles of concrete roadway in Wayne County, which have attracted the attention of road builders in the United States and Canada, and have also been inspected by European engineers visiting the country. Money over the United States office of public roads, after careful investigation of the Wayne County work, is now experimenting with concrete. The initial cost in Wayne County is \$10,000 a mile for a sixteen foot roadway, seven inches in thickness, but it would be cheaper in localities where sand and gravel were more easily obtained. The writer in the Contract Record says that the cost of maintenance of these roads is merely nominal, averaging less than \$10 per mile per year. The same writer estimates that the cost of properly built macadam or gravel road would range from \$5,000 to \$8,000 per mile, but the cost of maintenance would range from \$800 to \$2,000 per mile per year, while the life of this roadway would be much shorter than that of concrete construction. The writer therefore contends that the adoption of concrete for road and government purposes will eventually become universal in the United States.

### NO PROTECTION NEEDED

Canadian protectionists continue to assert that the movement in the mother country in the direction of a protective tariff is gaining ground. There is no basis for such an assertion. Ten years ago it was asserted by the protectionists in the mother country that British trade would be ruined unless a protective policy were adopted. What is the fact? The foreign trade of the country has increased \$2,700,000,000 in ten years, and the country was never more prosperous than at the present time. The London Statist points out that British has annually a billion dollars for loan or investment abroad. That journal also says: "It is true that at the present time the rate of wages is high and expenditure upon necessities and luxuries is large; but it must be remembered that the productive power of the country is unusually great, that all our works and all our workmen are in full employment; that we are working with machinery of high efficiency; that the turnout of our mills and factories has never been equalled; that our ships are earning money faster than ever before; and that our bankers, financiers, and investors are enjoying unusually great incomes. Nor are there any serious strikes to fetter away the great income of the nation. At the present moment, fortunately, there are very few labor troubles. Thus the output of wealth in this country is much greater than it has ever been, and the accumulation of capital for the current year in one way or another will greatly exceed all previous totals." It must be clear, even to the dullest of minds, that the mother country can stand a good deal of this kind of rain, and she will undoubtedly do it instead of adopting a protective policy.

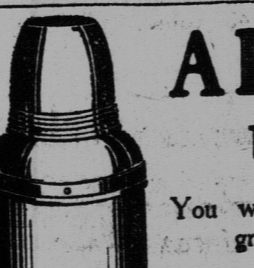

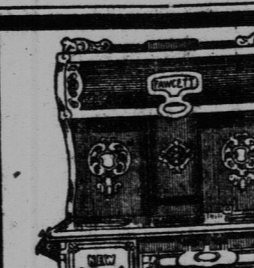

### ANOTHER RELIC OF OLD DAYS HAS GONE

(Continued from page 1).

"We used to have a fire station on the site of the present one, next the Court House, and many were the wild times of the city had their quarters not far away, and there was no love lost between the two factions; encounters were frequent and hard knocks enjoyed more apparently than is now the case. I belonged to the fire corps several years before I left for Australia, and played my part in several big fires. One of the first I attended was in 1849, when a fire swept King street from Charlotte to Germain; it was a difficult task in those days to fight a big fire like this for the wooden houses burned like tinder and our apparatus was none of the best. However, we got that fire under control at last, although the damage was very great.

Streets With Two Names

"Union street," Mr. Everett went on to say, "then marked the northern boundary of the city; perhaps you have wondered why different parts of the same street are called Dock and Mill, Charlotte and Coburg, Sidney and Waterloo. Well it is simply because Union at one time marked the city limits and when the city was built farther out it was considered as outside the real bounds and the extension of the streets were differently named. My brother had many of the streets which had various names at different parts inside uniform, but some yet remain as for instance those which I just mentioned.

Old Theatre Times

"Yes, that is a very fine theatre," the old gentleman who has his lister made some remark about the new imperial theatre which is being built on the south side of the square.

"It was on that very spot that the first theatre in St. John stood; some of the very best English actors of the past and middle of the last century played there and, living, as I did, not far away, I often had the chance of seeing them; the privilege was certainly a great one. After that theatre became antiquated, one was built in Germain street and lasted until the great fire of '77. The present Opera House was built to supply the need caused by the loss of the Germain street building, and now comes this new structure."

"Yes, the changes in the city have been very great indeed," said Mr. Everett in conclusion, "and I have witnessed most of them. The next few years should bring many more, which will no doubt be quite as widespread and beneficial as those I have been telling you about." With this Mr. Everett waved his hand in a friendly good afternoon and picked up his paper again to resume following the events of 1913, after his reminiscent journey to 1848.

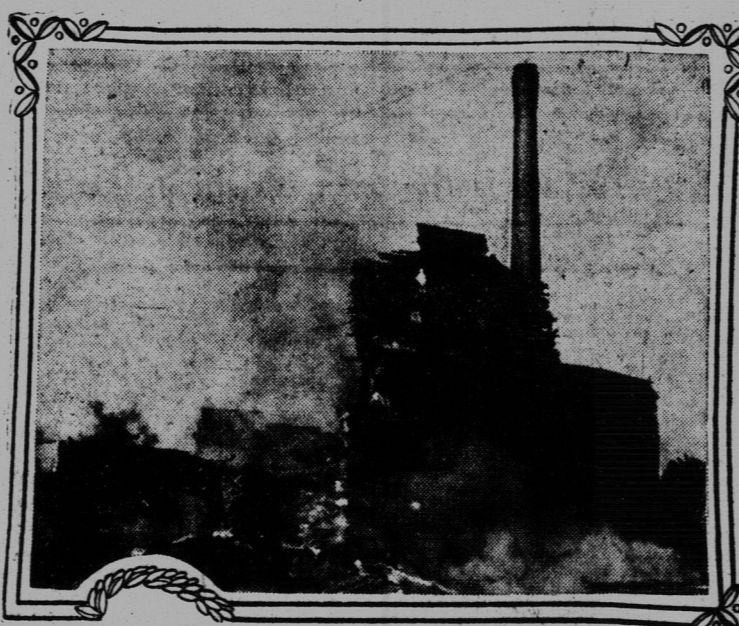

**NEW DRINKING WATER SYSTEM**

The Link-Belt Co., Philadelphia, Penn. has inaugurated a good system of supplying workmen with drinking water. The water after being received from the city supply is filtered and sterilized to further purify it. It is then conducted by block-tin piping to various points in the factory. At the places where it is drawn off through the faucet the water passes through a coil of pipe upon which rests a cake of ice. This method thoroughly cools the drinking water without contact with the ice. 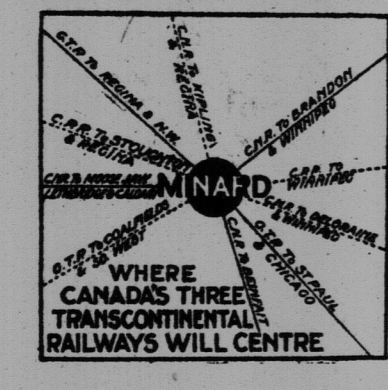

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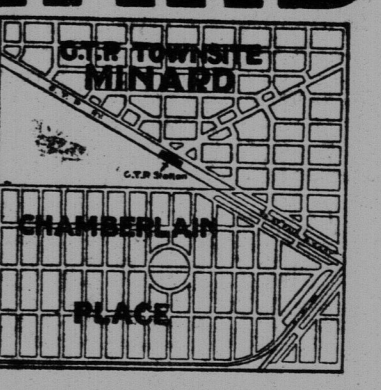

**Still Waiting for Fire Alarm for Indiantown**

**May Be Another Petition — Rev. Mr. Steel Welcomed to City — The Playgrounds**

It has come to be regarded as peculiar that there is still no fire alarm provided for the citizens of North End living below Adelaide street. It is almost impossible, except on rare occasions, to hear the regular fire bell in that district, and in this troublous age in the neighborhood it is felt that the people should have a chance to be warned. Early in the year provision was made and a sum of money placed in the estimate for an alarm such as was desired by the citizens of North End, but it has thus far failed to make its presence known.

It is not so noticeable at a day-fire but people do want to know if there is a blaze in the street in which they live if it occurs after bed-time. In the case of the Hamm fire this week, there were people in the lower end of Main street and in Bridge street, who did not know of it, and those who lived just a few houses distant from the fire scene were not apprised of the fire, until they heard the teams and the shouting of the men. Some time ago a petition which had been quite largely signed was to have been presented asking for an alarm, but it died in the hands of the same person, although the demand for the same was none the less keen. The petition may be started again.

The newly established playgrounds about the Alexandra and Bentley street schools are centres of interest and amusement these days to a great many little ones who through there from early in the morning until well into twilight, and take great enjoyment from the pervious play. All the apparatus for the entertainment of the youngsters is in popular use throughout the day and there is little need for anxious mothers to worry over the possibility of their pets being in danger from horses, cars, or other such "menaces" on the street. On Monday next both these playgrounds will contain about all their equipment for the season, and if possible they should be even more popular than heretofore.



**NEW HOSPITAL**

**WHAT IS NEEDED**

**Dr. W. W. White Against Adding to Present One**

**HAS OUTLIVED ITS DAY**

Entirely New and Modern Building Favored by Prominent Physician in Talk Over Recent Deaths From Diphtheria

The fact that there has been more than one death due to diphtheria or other illness in the children's ward in the General Public Hospital recently, such complications arising after admission, has caused the city, and there has been speculation as to cause. Speaking yesterday afternoon to a Times reporter, Dr. W. W. White expressed keen regret at the sad happenings, saying that the deaths in such cases were most uncommon, but very little improvement could be hoped for until a new hospital was provided.

There was an urgent need for a new building, he said, as there could be little hope for relief from an institution overcrowded and having inadequate accommodation such as is the case with the present establishment, where in the same building are grouped cases of measles, scarlet fever, and other illnesses with patients under surgical care. There was a great danger from this fact, and although an attempt had been made at isolation of contagious disease, it could not be very successfully executed owing to present conditions.

There was no truth, so far as Dr. White could see, in any suggestion of negligence, as he believed all connected with the staff performed their duties faithfully and well. The facts narrated at different times, showing the absolute necessity of having an enlarged and more up-to-date building with better accommodation. The scheme of trying to build additions to the present building was impracticable, and was just making patchwork of it. There must be a new hospital, and the sooner the present one was gotten rid of, the better, and the stronger were the chances that the over-crowding would be prevented.

The present building was not suitable for the purpose for which it was created, and had outlived its usefulness, said Doctor White, so a move for an entirely new hospital would be going in the right direction.

**FINE WEATHER FOR TWELFTH**
