AN UPRISING IN PORTUGAL FEARED

Monarchists Plotting In The Discontented North

MUTINY IN ARSENAL

Turbulent Scene in Spanish Parliament and Open Threat of Appeal to Arms Against Government—Chinese Who Sold Maps to Japan is to be Beheaded

(Canadian Press)

Lisbon, April 8.—It is feared that the monarchists are plotting at Vigo and may take advantage of the discontent in the north of Portugal to endeavor to incite the inhabitants to revolt. The provisional government last night sent to Oporto a cruiser fully manned and with extra guns for landing purposes. All regiments stationed in the north are held ready to quell a rising. The Spanish frontier is closely guarded.

A number of men employed at the Lisbon arsenal, objecting to the new rules of the minister of marine, refused to resume work. This afternoon some of them endeavored to penetrate to the minister's office, crying, "Down with the minister of marine." Sailors and the municipal guard quelled the revolt. A body of mutineers then seized a steam launch and went on board the gunboat San Rafael, asking protection from the commander, who refused, and forced them to return. The government is making arrests.

Troubles, Too, in Spain

Madrid, April 8.—The continuation of the debate on the Ferrer case in the chamber of deputies yesterday was responsible for an exceptionally turbulent session. The socialist leader, Pablo Iglesias, raised a storm by declaring that, although he could not renounce Ferrer, he could respect the justice of the trial. If he did not succeed he would try to overthrow the administration which refused repatriation to the murdered man. The affair, he said, would not end there. Then he shouted, "Do not be surprised, deputies, if justice is denied, to hear the death of arms."

After the president had tried in vain to make Iglesias withdraw his words of menace Premier Canalejas sprang to his feet and declared that the government would provide with all its energy and force of law, opposed any attempt at revolutionary violence occurred.

To Lose His Head

Madrid, April 9.—An army officer named Cho, attached to the topographical department of the Chinese legation, was discovered headquarters at Changung, was despatched to have a number of important maps of the Japanese, including 15,000 maps. Cho was exiled in Japan and married a Japanese.

The victory reported the case to the general staff at Pekin and recommended twenty years imprisonment. The general staff issued instructions to immediately behead the man.

FOUNDLING BABES ACROSS THE CONTINENT



BABIES WITH THEIR MOTHERS WAITING FOR THE STREET CAR.

New York, April 8.—In a special car all of the foundling babies from the New York Foundling Hospital, ranging in ages from one and a half to four years, left New York this week to travel, some of them, entirely across the continent, to Texas, a few to Oklahoma and more to Washington State.

Following the usual custom of the hospital, every Christian list of those asking for babies is made out and their reputation investigated. Pictures of the babies are sent to the families applying, and usually each family returns a picture of its members.

If there are not enough applications for the unfortunate foster parents are advertised for or found in some other manner. This year there were more applicants than could be accommodated.

San Antonio and Dallas each acquired three new inhabitants, and five of the children were left at points near Oklahoma City. Fifteen more were distributed through that state. The car in which the babies travelled was switched from one train to another in order to touch all the points desired, and all entire trip to Spokane, where the last of the six babies who go to Washington will be left, will take almost three weeks.

DEATH LIST IN TWO MINING HORRORS MAY REACH AWFUL TOTAL OF 250

Seventy Bodies Taken From Pits in Pennsylvania and More, it is Believed are Yet to be Brought Out—Explosion in Another Mine Locks up Many and it is Feared That Upwards of 170 May be Dead

Seranton, Pa., April 8.—Up to 846 bodies of men and boys who had been taken from the Painesville mine in Pennsylvania, were taken out yesterday. The disaster is the worst in the history of the hard coal fields in this section, exceeding the number of deaths in the terrible Twin Shaft disaster near here some years ago, when fifty-one men and boys lost their lives by entombment.

The fire, which started in one of the heating engine rooms in the "China" vein, 220 feet below the surface, the lowest working in the mine, did not do as much damage as had been believed. The fire did not reach the entombed men and the condition of their bodies shows that death was due to suffocation from smoke or asphyxiation from the gas. None of the bodies, which were found in a heap in the blind gangway, was in the least mutilated.

Porters of the mine have been identified. Many of the victims were foreigners and known only by a number or nickname. Heading the list of victims is Joseph E. Evans, of West Scranton, who was spokesman of the United States rescue party which was hurried to the mine from its station at Wilkesbarre. Evans was leading a rescue gang into the smoke-laden mine when it was filled with deadly black damp, when he was overcome.

It was the first time that the federal rescue system was brought into action in the anthracite coal region and Evans is regarded as the real hero of the day.

Another Awful Disaster

Birmingham, Ala., April 8.—Two hundred state convicts are reported killed in an explosion in Banner mine at Littleton, thirty miles from here. The runner is an unexploded dynamite.

The bodies of the dead showed that all had made a hard struggle for life, burying their faces deep in the coal and wrapping their coats about their heads in an effort to ward off the poisonous gas.

Mayor and Mr. McNicoll in Conference Today

PROGRESS IS MADE

Indication of Arrangement of Point of Difference—Visit of Inspection to Mill and Main Street Property and Announcement of Early Start at Work

(Canadian Press)

There is a strong possibility that the agreement with respect to the transfer of the west side lots to the C. P. R. may yet be satisfactorily arranged. David McNicoll, vice president of the C. P. R., who arrived in the city yesterday, called upon Mayor Frank this morning and had a long talk with him about the matter.

After the meeting his words said that, though the question had been hung up for some time owing to the deadlock over one section of the agreement, it was now possible that the negotiations would be re-opened. Mr. McNicoll had practically agreed to have the section amended in such a way that it would probably be acceptable to both the city and the railway. He also said to the mayor that in his opinion it was not so much a question of whether the C. P. R. would do within a specified time as it was what time the government would have their portion of the work far enough advanced for the railway to lay in the property and convert it into a yard room.

Mr. McNicoll will write to the mayor from Montreal on Monday, giving an outline of the changes the company would suggest. The mayor will then consult with the aldermen regarding the matter and a meeting of the council will probably be called to deal with the matter.

The New Property

This morning Mr. McNicoll, in company with Wm. Downie, general superintendent of the Atlantic division, visited the site of the company's newly acquired property in Mill and Main streets and went over the ground thoroughly.

To a Times reporter Mr. McNicoll said that work would be commenced there as soon as the frost was out of the ground. At first there would be considerable filling in to be done and then the work of erecting warehouses and laying out track and yardroom, would be taken up.

With respect to his conference with the mayor, Mr. McNicoll said that they had discussed the matter at some length and while he was not prepared to say what was the result, he said that the matter was not closed yet and there appeared a possibility of a satisfactory arrangement being made.

Mr. McNicoll will return to Montreal this evening.

BRING OUT THE VOTE

It is gratifying to note that the Citizens' Committee are taking practical steps to bring out the largest possible vote in favor of commission. It would be most unwise to assume that there will be little opposition. It is true that there is no organized and open opposition, but a number of aldermen candidates will use their influence and their organization on election day for two purposes. One of these will be to get themselves re-elected, and the other will be to roll up as large a vote as possible against the commission plan. In a quiet way influence will be exerted to get as many voters as possible to mark their ballots against commission.

While there can be no doubt about the success of the campaign in favor of commission, it is in every way desirable to make the victory overwhelming. The citizens who have devoted so much time and thought to the campaign for better city government have been subjected to sneers, and have had their motives questioned, or have been charged with purely selfish or political motives; and it has been insinuated that the noise made by the advocates of commission was entirely out of proportion to their actual numbers. The most effective answer to all this foolish and unfair criticism would be a majority in favor of commission, so large as to put the critics to shame. The Standard, which is utterly useless, has made a last feeble attempt to arouse prejudice by charging that the friends of commission have thrown over British institutions and are hugging Yankee opinions to their bosoms. This is the limit of absurdity. Every friend of commission should feel it a personal duty to take a hand in the fray a week from next Tuesday, and work to make the vote in favor of reform the most decisive in the whole history of civic politics in St. John. The ward committees now know who the qualified voters are, and should take care that every one of them has been canvassed before the day of election.

MR. BORDEN'S TROUBLES

The Canadian Courier this week devotes half a page to a discussion of the Conservative revolt against Mr. Borden. The Courier is entirely in sympathy with the conservative leader and sharply criticizes those Conservatives who for one reason or another, have been creating dissension in the party for more than a year past. Morgan's Daughter
Practically Gives
Up Society

NEW YORK GOSSIP

Harry Lehr, Author of the "Monkey Dinner" in the Smart Set a Few Years Ago, is Taken to a Sanatorium

(Times Special Correspondence.)
New York, April 7.—Miss Anne Morgan, daughter of J. Pierpont Morgan, shocked by the revelation of legislative neglect to provide adequate safeguards for human life, revealed in a recent fire in which 145 shop girls lost their lives, says New York is indifferent to the needs of its workers. In its devotion to business and the conquest of commerce, it is asleep on matters that should command immediate attention.

"The big thing to be done now," she says, "is to awaken the community to the necessity of a personal interest in the government; of its failure to provide adequately either by laws or the lack of proper laws and ordinances to protect the citizens."

"If New Yorkers do not rise to a proper realization of our personal responsibility as citizens, then we must indeed be without public and personal conscience. There is an August task ahead of us. We must not shrink it. A big comprehensive plan must be promulgated to arouse us to our duty."

The daughter of America's foremost financier is one of the committee engaged in providing relief for the families of the stricken girls. Like Helen Gould, eldest daughter of the late Jay Gould, Miss Morgan has of late years practically withdrawn from society and is giving her time, her money and her attention to ameliorating the condition of the poor and deserving of the city. Pursued for years by noblemen and fortune hunters, she has been a victim of their intrigues and has been obliged to remain spinster that they may devote their lives to the uplift of their less fortunate fellow creatures and avoid jolish something really worth their while.

Other city administrations are at fault in the same way. Not many years ago 22 girls met death in a fire in Newark, N. J. Similar calamities are liable to occur in nearly every city from lack of sufficient fire escapes and other useful protection. The conservation of life in the industries and the provision of adequate protection for fire escapes are matters in which women would do well to lead a crusade.

Women Food Inspector
Miss Esther Allstrom, city food inspector of Tacoma, Wash., is making a good record in her position. She has several prominent women representatives of various clubs, to accompany her on a tour of inspection. These women are influential, and they have votes. The delegation is received with respect, and the inspectors' recommendations are heeded. Restaurants, bakeries, markets, hotel, candy shops have taken on new cleanliness. Let the committee of inspection be invited to lunch by the proprietor of one of the principal hotels, and every crook and corner of the hotel was thrown open for their examination. All was in condition to invite approval. Women of civic mind, in womanly ways, with women voters back of them, can aid mightily in municipal housekeeping.

From New Zealand
Lady Stout, wife of the Chief Justice of New Zealand, says that since women were given the ballot, a society with branches in every district has been organized to teach women and girls intelligent motherhood and home-making, and to save the babies. Each branch employs a trained nurse, who gives advice and assistance to women of all classes in the feeding, clothing and management of their babies. Lady Stout adds that this is "the outcome of the new feeling of responsibility in women, awakened by their rights of citizenship."

Women and Work
Sir Frank Newnes, millionaire magazine and newspaper publisher of London, who is visiting New York for several weeks on business and pleasure, thinks every woman should work to keep her body and her mind in a healthy condition. His opinions on this subject proved highly influential in the week of the Princess Stia Devi, daughter of an Indian rajah, who she saved the 6,000,000 American women who earn their own living, employed in the various industries of the country.

On the other side of the Atlantic, the princess said, it was considered a humiliation for a woman of any refinement to work. Sir Frank Newnes, commenting on this, said that all women should have a definite occupation. "Not necessarily a money-making occupation," said Sir Frank firmly. "It would be rather foolish for a girl of good family with plenty of money, to go out in the world as a stenographer. The same purpose is served for such a girl, if she interests herself in athletics of some sort. But it is not good for women to remain idle."

Harry Lehr
Physically run down until his best friend would hardly recognize him, Harry Lehr, society's pet and purveyor of novelties to the "40's," has been taken to a sanatorium suffering from what is described as "nervous prostration." The fact that Dr. Austin Flint, the distinguished alienist, has been called in to examine him, gives ground for the suspicion that something more serious is the matter with him than his relatives are willing to admit.

Interesting Facts Concerning Women

Dr. David Starr Jordan, president of Stanford University, recently said:—"Unfavorable and influential suffrage club has been looked upon as decidedly backward-looking. In Indiana, North Dakota, Montana and Nevada have one after another given these pleasant surprises. Now comes Arkansas, which has long been regarded as a stronghold of conservatism on this question. A large and influential suffrage club has lately been organized at Little Rock. The committee on constitutional amendments gave its representatives a hearing and afterwards reported in favor of woman suffrage, by a unanimous vote."

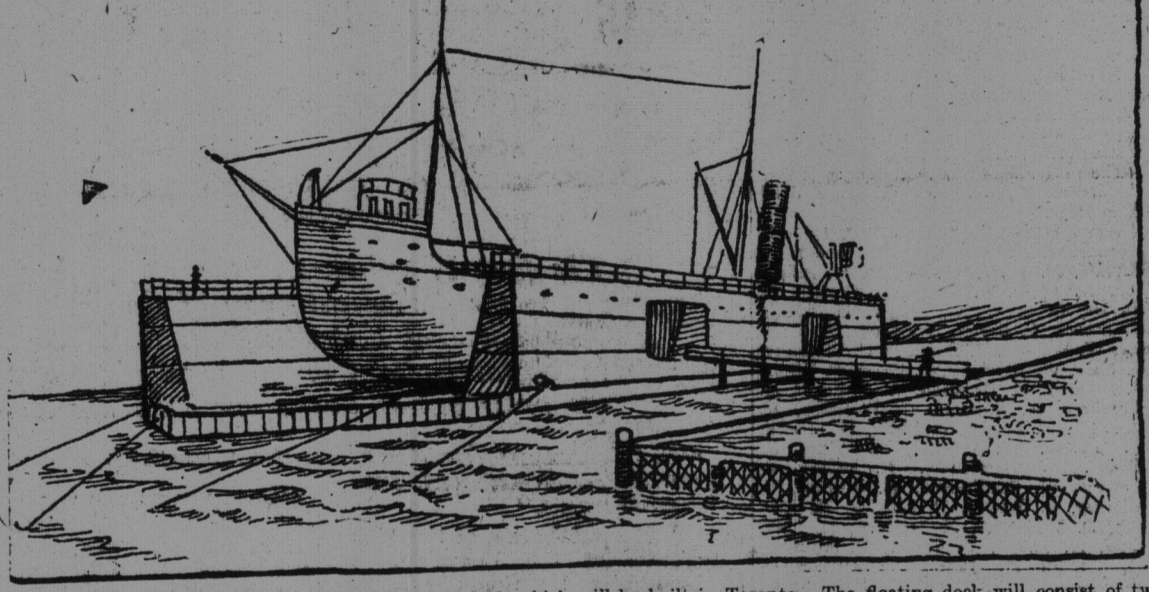
In Maine, the legislative committee made a divided report on the petition for an amendment to the constitution granting full suffrage to women. The House of Representatives adopted the favorable report, by a vote of 70 to 92, rejecting the unfavorable report, which was adverse, six to four.

This action is the more gratifying to those favoring the plan, since for many years past the suffrage bill has always been introduced in committee, and not even allowed to come before the legislature for a vote.

The New York Fire
One hundred and fifty burned, mangled and crushed bodies, nine-tenths of them girls, attest to the criminal indifference of employers and to the gross negligence in municipal management in New York city. The ghastly details of the shirtwaiste factory fire have been published broadcast, and people are sickened with the horror of it. But the most horrible thing of all is that this great sacrifice of life might have been prevented. This was the sixth or seventh fire in the building within two months, yet there were no fire escapes on the outside of the building and no fire escape on the inside.

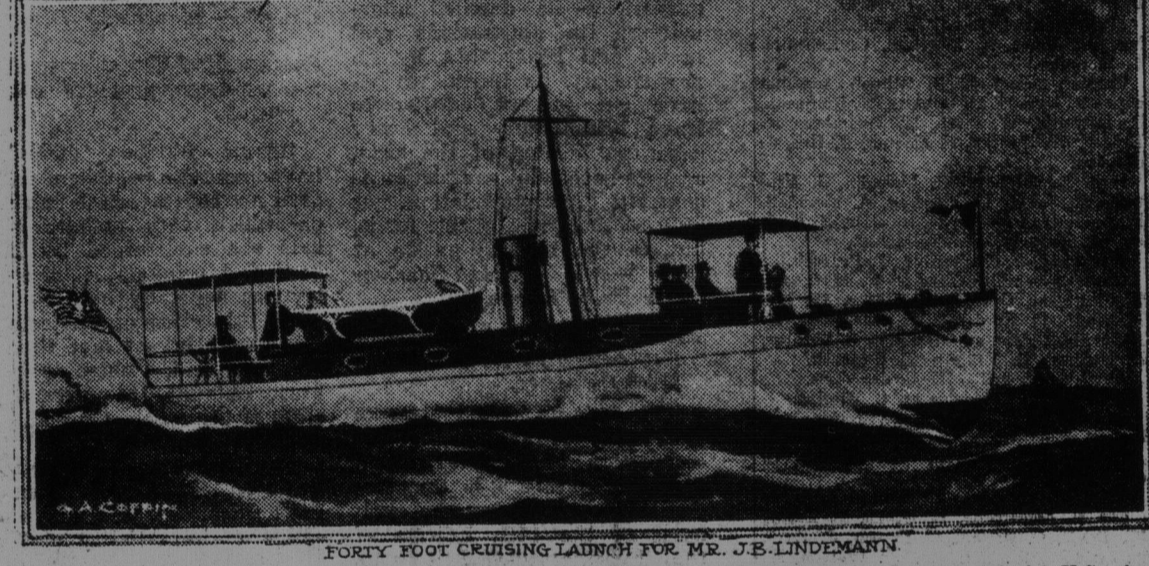

FLOATING DRY DOCK TO BE BUILT IN TORONTO



This is a sketch of the proposed floating dry dock which will be built in Toronto. The floating dock will consist of two sections or pontoons, with high sides and open ends, and will accommodate the largest vessels plying on Lake Ontario, giving permanent employment to 900 men. It will be built entirely of steel, with electrically-driven centrifugal pumps, and an enormous lifting capacity. The dock will be built in compliance with government requirements recently passed by the dominion parliament. The plans have already been favorably reported on by department engineers.

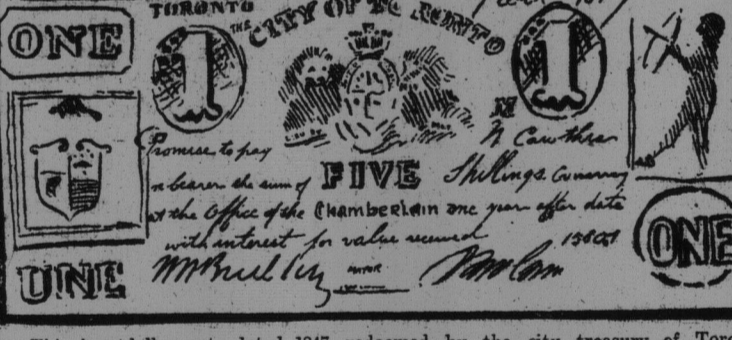
A Raw Subaltern

A SHADOW AS EVIDENCE IN COURT

Not long ago a man was on trial at Omaha, charged with having dynamited another man's house. One witness testified that she had seen the accused at the place in question a little before three o'clock on the Sunday afternoon on which the crime was committed. It appeared that the accused had attended church, a mile away, and the minister testified that the service had lasted until about three and a half, and that the picture had been taken for some time, as they will, and had their pictures taken in a group. It then became a question whether this was such a good "alibi" as to release the culprit. Close examination of one of the photographs taken showed a shadow on the house at the right-hand edge. Any ordinary person would never have thought that in that little shadow there was unquestionable proof that the prisoner had remained at church later than the time that the eyewitness testified she had seen him near the place of the crime.

But the shadow suggested to a scientist that a few simple calculations would prove beyond a doubt just what time the picture had been taken, with the prisoner in it. The Scientific American tells how this was done. It is a principle of astronomy that by measuring the distance that a shadow is cast down north or south, east or west, and knowing the latitude of the place, the time of day and day of the year can be found the same as with a regular sundial. Measurements on the spot showed that the shadow had fallen 14.2 feet down, 13.1 feet east and 2.4 feet north. Calculations made from this data and compared with the nautical almanac, which gives the exact position of the sun for all times in the year, showed that the picture had been taken at 21 minutes after three o'clock on the Sunday afternoon in question. On the strength of this expert scientific evidence the jury refused to convict the man. It was found that the shadow changed by the width of a clipboard in four minutes 27 seconds.

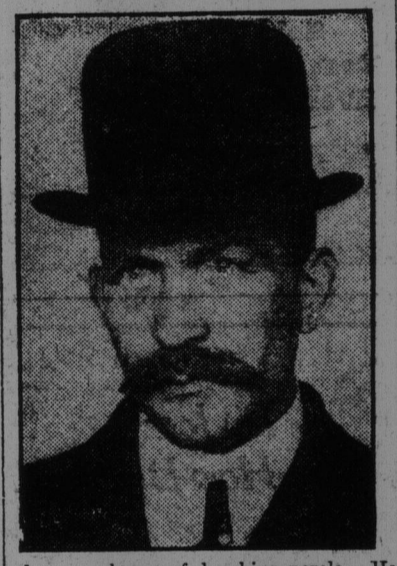

Toronto, April 6.—To the Bertillon system William Watts, who just lately got out of jail, after serving part of a term for vagrancy, can attribute his enforced trip back to the old country, where he is wanted on a charge of breaking parole. He was arrested here by Detectives Wallace and Newton at the instance of the officers at Scotland Yard.



Before he was sent to jail the local police took the precaution of taking his fingerprints and his finger prints. Both were sent to England, but before Scotland Yard answered, Watts' friends had paid his fine (\$50) and he was at liberty. The return card arrived from England containing a photo of the man who resembled Watts only he had a beard—but the finger prints were perfect, the police say.

According to Scotland Yard Watts has a bad record, having served thirteen years in various prisons in England. He will be deported. Our detectives suspected that Watts, alias William Garnham, alias William Adams, was the man who was picking pockets on the street cars during the rush hours, said Inspector Duncan, "so they arrested him on March 3 on a charge of vagrancy. Our suspicions that he was a pickpocket are borne out by the record sent us by the chief inspector of Scotland Yard."

London, March 26.—The state of business in the House of Commons pending the passing of the veto bill is slow and comparatively uninteresting and the opposition, whose wish is father to the thought, have encouraged the notion that the government intend to change the programme already laid down. It is the most lovely pleasure house in all London, and, no doubt, the proudest club house in the world. As automobilists include the wealthiest class, it is to be expected they should come to the front with the most palatial of club houses. An indication of its extent and magnificence may be realized when it is understood that in one of its apartments the Pompeian bath is as big as London's most popular concert hall. Motor lovers from all parts of the world will find this latest addition to the glories of Pall Mall the chief attraction to the sight-seers during the coronation season.

It perhaps may be expected from democracy that it should take a grim satisfaction in seeing that Lord Lansdowne's Rembrandt picture "The Mill" seems bound to go to America. It seems too bad that a private magnate should so deal with what might be a national treasure. But the occasion of the House of Lords gets his £100,000 for the picture and the democratic State may take it as a souvenir of the fall of the British House of Lords.

The most romantic idea in connection with the coronation is the arrangement which has just been completed for the lighting of national bonfires on coronation night, June 22, on every hilltop in the country. A representative committee is being formed in every district and the principal hills are to be illuminated in the red, white and blue, and at 10 o'clock south of the border and 10.30 in the north there will be constructed bonfires which will last till midnight, and which will be

There McAdam Will Find His Wife Serving Sentence for Like Offence—Visit of Oddy Morrison Led to Trouble
