The meeting was convened under the auspices of the Saint John Presbytery, was presided over by Hon. J. G. Forbes and addressed by Rev. Hugh Miller, moderator of the Saint John Presbytery; Rev. J. S. Bonnell, of St. Andrew's church; Rev. W. J. Bevis, pastor of the United Church in East Saint John; Rev. Dr. J. M. (Shaw Bevis, pastor of the United Church in East Saint John; Rev. Dr. J. M. Shaw and Right Rev. Clarence MacKinnon, moderator of the General Assembly.

James Porteous interrupted the speakers on more than one occasion but was hushed into silence when Judge Forbes shaking his finger at his, declared: "Sit still and take your medicine or you go out the door." Cries of "Shame, Shame" were heard from two Methodist ministers. Mr. Bonnell paid a glowing tribute to the stand which the Methodist Church had taken on the question of Union had taken on the question of Union.

Mr. Bevis testified to the splendic spirit of harmony in the East Saint John United church, explained that in accordance with the basis of Union the church had a session, in spite of the fact that anti-unionists said sessions were done away with in the United
