23. That a circular be published and distributed relative to the necessity of our membership contributing more liberally to all the funds of the Church.

That in consideration of the pressing claims upon the Missionary Fund, and the need for enlarged means in our work, we recommend the following for the adoption of the Conference:—

Resolved—"That on all our Mission Stations, the Minister, at the time of the quarterly renewal of Tickets, shall make it known in each Society that we think it desirable that those members who are unable to pay their Quarterages in money, do as much as possible towards supporting the Mission by contributions of produce; and that all such contributions shall be placed to the account of such members as Quarterage. And that the Steward of each Society shall be expected to collect the said contributions as soon as possible."

Resolved—"That in consideration of the need for enlarged means on our Missionary work—and hence the importance of attending to all matters of income—we recommend the following for the adoption of Conference:—

"That, on each Mission Station, our Missionaries, at the quarterly renewal of tickets, shall take the class-book of the Society, and calling the name of each Member, shall kindly ask—what amount shall be put down by him on the class-book as his quarterly thank-offering to the Lord? And that the said quarterage shall be collected by the Leader of the Class."

Also that the above resolutions be printed not only in the Conference Minutes, but in Circular form, from the Conference to each Society.

24. That early in next Conference the "Committee on Grants" prepare their schedule: that it be read a first time: and in the interim all who propose amendments go before the Committee; and the schedule be finally submitted to Conference for confirmation on the last day of its sittings.

25. That we record our thanks to God for an increase of membership and finances.

26. That each Station observe the third Sunday in September and subsequent Friday as days of thanksgiving, fasting, and prayer.

27. That the thanks of the Conference be given to the friends in Hamilton, for their remarkable hospitality to the Delegates assembled in that City.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

We feel the greatest interest in addressing you officially once more; and whilst this duty is one of annual occurrence, yet we now proceed to discharge it with all the earnestness of sincere attachment and veneration.

We are grateful for the wise and affectionate reply to our last annual address, published in your minutes of Conference; and for those fatherly and judicious councils which you have tendered to us the past year on various matters of management, through the officers constituting your General and Missionary Committees.

If in some instances we have not precisely and promptly carried out every recommendation, it

has not been because our love toward you has chilled, or our opinion of your JUDGMENT in official matter has become impaired; but because, as colonists, our acts are occasionally in advance of your suggestions and decisions.

Colonial society differs in many of its features from home peculiarities; and those differences apply equally to religious societies in both hemispheres.

We are probably too precipitate and impulsive in our measures in this young country, whilst our fathers in England may be considered characteristic for cautious and slow deliberation.

It cannot but be, that in correspondence, at such a distance, there will be mistakes and misapprehensions; and that the same questions will be viewed differently as seen from opposite stand points.

The difficulties in preserving intact all the peculiarities of our church discipline, are often very considerable—moving alongside other bodies, and in some places hemmed in with rival and adverse communities.

If we, in this country, have no dominant church and little bigotry and intolerance to combat, we have sectarianism on the one hand, and laxity in church government on the other, which more or less react upon our people; and which force us to li facto sym corr our

to lines of proceeding which are not always satisfactory to ourselves. We therefore claim your sympathy and special charity in construing our correspondence, and deciding on the character of our conclusions.

We are truly glad to ascertain that our relations with you are so harmonious, that in all original principles and vital measures, we are of one heart and soul!

We have in Canada an immense country before us, and whilst in some few localities the supply of the gospel is abundant, others are seriously deficient. It is to those parts of the province we keep constantly directing our attention; and we have taken up fresh posts of labor, and added to our agency additional supply, as will be seen in our despatches.

But it will be borne in mind, that in the back settlements the people can do very little towards contributing to the support of the missionary. Although on his own land, in the depths of the forest, the settler's means are equally limited with those of the English laborer and factory operative, until by long and exhausting toil, he realizes enough and a portion to spare. Your noble help, therefore, which you annually grant is still needed, and will be in time to come, as ours is real mission ground; and whilst you contribute to Canada in reinforcing ther mission

You will rejoice with us that the pecuniary aid transmitted, in connexion with our own missionary contributions (of which no portion is retained in stations), God has blessed, and we report, this year, a respectable increase of members.

Our Conference—held in Hamilton, Western Canada—was truly an assembly of special interest, both as regards the business order, and the blessed devotional exercises.

We are glad also to intimate that a stronger denominational patriotism, and a deeper tone of spiritual and converting power, grows amongst us.

Many of our "special protracted efforts" have been greatly blessed, so that we are sanguine in our hopes for the future.

Allow us, then, to solicit your earnest prayers and co-operation, that God may enable us to carry to the boundaries of this great land Primitive Methodism; or, a "present, full and free salvation" through the blood of the world's Redeemer!

And now, fathers and beloved brethren, may the "God of peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work, to do his will, working in you that which is well pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ; to whom be glory for ever and ever." Amen.
