



But there arose a new Kaiser in Gernany; the old King, who had simply followed the lead of his Chancellor, was gathered to his fathers, and his grandson reigned in his stead. This talented young man discarded the wise and wicked old counsellor, and took the advice of the younger nien about him, who flattered him and fired his ambitions, until he and the whole nation longed for new conquests which would make the German Empire the greatest in the world-instead of the British Empire. It is hard to be an absolute monarch, and yet to remain sane. At length the madness has arrived, and this great and powerful ruler, who might have done incalcul-




