The Food Supply Newfoundland Codfish Should be in Demand

The world's food supply is bound to suffer a great shortage owing to the war. The countries at war are hoarding all their food for their own use, and consequently none is exported. Newfoundland fish, being a splendid article of food, should be in good demand, and a good price should be obtainable.

When a shortage occurs in one or several lines of food products, people are bound to turn to another. But in order to get the best price for our fish there must be mutual cooperation between the fishermen and the exporters, and the latter must see that the fish is marketed in such a way and at such a time as will bring the best results.

We notice a letter in the St. John's press on Saturday from Messrs. C. T. Bennett & Co., of Bristol, stating that the policy of sending four steamer-loads of fish to practically the same market within a month is suicidal. It goes on to state that if we hope to maintain present prices, shipments must be regulated. The four steamers will carry approximately 80,000 qtls codfish.

It seems to us that the fishermen of this country will have to do what the farmers of Canada and other agricultural countries are doing, cooperate in the catching, curing and exportation of their fish.

In the Province of Alberta they have what is known as 'The Farmers' Co-operative.' The primary object of this organization is to secure a better market for farmers' products. Then they have in the same province 'The Alberta Farmers Co-operative Elevator Co.' with 50 local branches, each owning a grain elevator, holding from 120,000 to 500,000 bushels of grain. During 1914-30 more local branches with elevators will be formed. Under the Act the Government gives a loan of 85 per cent. of the value repayable in 20 years. The first season's work has been much more successful than was ever anticipated.

The Causes and the Progress of the Great War

Being a Lecture delivered by His Excellency Sir Walter Edward Davidson, K. C. M. G., Governor of Newfoundland, etc.

But there arose a new Kaiser in Germany; the old King, who had simply followed the lead of his Chancellor, was gathered to his fathers, and his grandson reigned in his stead.

In the programme of world-power on which all Germany counted, the first conquest was to be that of England, the first nation to be absorbed was to be the British.

And this is how the German Kaiser began. On the first of January, 1900, the Kaiser said: 'I shall organize my Navy, so that it shall stand on the same level as my army, and with its help the German Empire shall attain to a place which it has not yet reached.'

Two events greatly helped him to fire the imagination of the doting dreamy people over whom he was the absolute War Lord. There was a wonderful Exhibition at Paris in 1900. In the pride of kingship he ordered his merchants to show at conquered Paris the wealth and splendour of his nation, and it was a brave show.

This was a great trouble to the Generals around the Kaiser, because they had been the officers who had led the Turkish armies and they had been beaten by Serbian and Bulgarian officers instructed in Russia and in France.

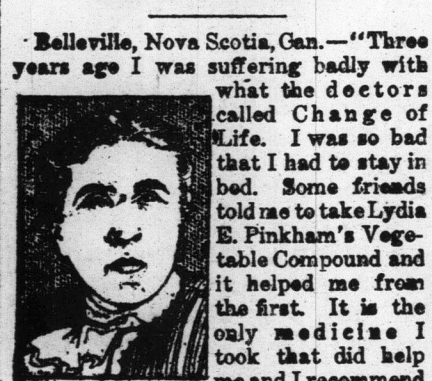

POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all principal places. Messages of 15 words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word.

A Government cable to Casco, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient telegraphic service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round on Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radius of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.

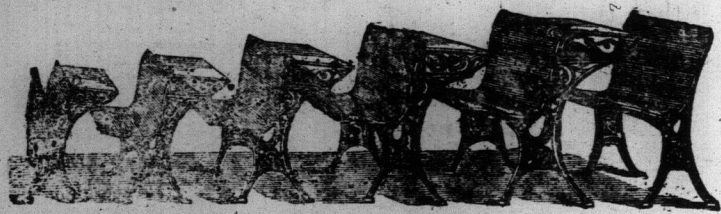

The Coming Crisis

(Continued.)

(Editor the Guardian.)

Despite the honeyed phrases and pleasing perorations with which the peace prophets are now exhausting themselves in a vain effort to produce conclusive evidence that this war will bring a cessation to international strife, the facts to the contrary remain. Time in its onward silent tread continues to prove the infallibility of the Word of God and the futility of the arguments of men.

All the efforts to conciliate the nations are made from a false premise, hence can only result in failure. While these delusive hopes are held before the world, the eagles of war are sinking their talons deeper than ever into the vitals of the world.

"Peace, peace," is the cry of the modern prophet, but the only peace there will be till the end of time is the peace that reigns in the heart of the individual who is fully surrendered to God. The very fact that the cry of peace and safety is so general is evidence that the great day of wrath's doom is drawing nigh.

From Dan. 11: 45 we learn that not only is "The king of the north" (Sultan of Turkey) to remove his headquarters to Jerusalem, but that subsequent to this move he shall come to his end. It will be seen by reading verses 1-3 of chapter 12 that in conjunction with these changes to the Turkish Empire, Michael (viz: Christ) shall stand up and his work shall cease in the heavenly Sanctuary and probation close.

This is in accord with Rev. 16: 12. Here we see that under the symbol of the River Euphrates the Turkish Empire is to be dried up under the sixth plague. This loss of Turkish rule will open the way for the battle of Armageddon, which is to be fought in the land of Palestine. The Moslem and heathen world will be there with the professedly Christian nations for the last great contest.

The word "Armageddon" or "Har-magedon," means the fortified city or mountain of Megiddo. The prefix "AR" or "HAR," has reference to this place as being a fortified place. In ancient days it was a military station. "It occupies an important position on the road from Bethshean and Jezreel to the coast, and guarded the northern end of the pass over the bridge of Carmel, which forms the easiest line of communication between the plain of Sharon and that of Judaea.

Through this pass ran the great road from Egypt to the north, along which invading armies have marched from the time of Thromes III. to that of Napoleon. A large ruined khan shows that, even in the middle ages, commerce followed the same route. (Hastings' "Dictionary of the Bible," article "Megiddo.")

It was "on the southern edge of the Betraelon or Jezreel plain, the frontier of Issachar and Manasseh, commanding a pass from the north into the hill country. . . . At Megiddo was stationed one of Solomon's commissariat of fleets. 1 Kings 4: 12. Solomon built, that is, fortified, Megiddo as a commanding military position. 1 Kings 9: 15. . . . Traces of a Roman road remain, and large tells mark the site of the fortress commanding hill and plain." (Fausset's "Bible Cyclopaedia.") Under the article "Manasseh," the

last quoted cyclopaedia tells us that Bethshean was in the hollow of the Ghor or Jordan Valley, the connecting point between the eastern and the western Manasseh.

Thus it is plain to be seen that Megiddo is in a valley, accessible also to the coast of the Mediterranean at the mouth of the Kishon River. It is accessible from the north and south and is just as accessible from the east, for it is on the caravan route between Damascus and Egypt.

In this "place of rendezvous," this "place of troops"—for such are the interpreted meanings of Armageddon—evil spirits will lead the nations to the battle of that great day of God Almighty. It is toward this struggle that the nations are wending their way. Joel 3: 8-10. The word for valley in verse 12 of this prophecy is emek, which means spacious valley, hence a place for many troops. "Jehoshaphat" means the judgment of Jehovah. Verse 14 makes it manifest that it will be a time of decision or judgment. A place of concision, or cutting down.

Since the Turkish Empire is not to be dried up until under the 6th plague, it is evident that probation will have ceased prior to this event, inasmuch as these plagues are to be unmixd with mercy (Rev. 15: 1), and will constitute one year (Rev. 18: 8; Isa. 34: 8) at the end of which period Christ will come. Five of these plagues will have been visited upon the earth before the end of Turkish rule, hence it is plain that the door of mercy will have closed some time prior, and the day of the Lord which will begin with the pouring out of the plagues will come as a thief in the night. 1 Thess. 5: 3. No man knoweth the day nor the hour, though the children of God will know when it is even at the door. 2 Thess. 5: 4; Matt. 24: 33.

Though clustered about with so many signs and proclaimed by the servants of God who give the meat in due season, the day of the Lord will come as a snare upon "all them that dwell on the face of the whole earth." Luke 21: 35. Seeing that the Turkish kingdom is soon to be dried up, and remembering that before this happens the day of God shall, like a thief in the night, have been ushered upon the world, is it not time to heed the Book of God and get ready for the Kingdom which shall never pass away?

"Now while pardon's last hour is expiring in heaven, And the last gracious call is on earth being given, O, haste, sinners, haste, leave thy sinful behavior, The commandments embrace and the faith of the Saviour!"

The Bosnian Assassins

Sarajevo, Oct. 28.—Judgment was yesterday passed on the assassins of Archduke Francis Ferdinand, and his wife. Gavrilo Princip, the actual assassin, escaped with a sentence of imprisonment for twenty years; four of the conspirators were sentenced to death by hanging, one to life imprisonment, two (including Madeljo Jabinvo who threw a bomb at the Archduke but which did not explode), to twenty years, one to 15 years, and to 15 years, two to ten years. One to seven years and two to three years. The other defendants were acquitted.

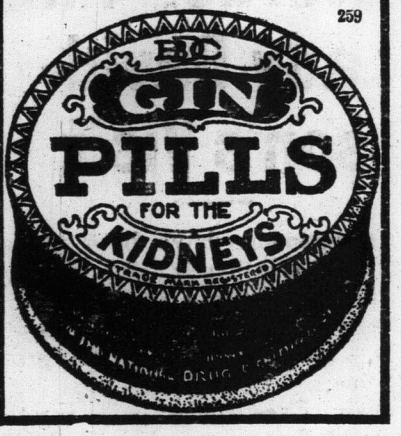

Public Notice Pulp-Wood.

Licenses to cut Pulp Wood on Crown Lands on the Labrador may be issued by His Excellency the Governor in Council, subject to the following conditions:—

1. The license shall continue in force until June 30, 1915, and no longer; Provided that any license shall have the right to export any pulp wood so cut at any time up to and including December 31st, 1915.
2. The licensee shall pay an export on any pulp wood exported of \$1.00 per cord.
3. The Governor in Council may prescribe the rate of wages to be paid men employed by the licensee for the purpose of cutting and exporting such pulp wood.
4. The export duty is to be paid at the Port of entry when wood is exported.

Any person exporting Pulp Wood without a License, shall be liable to a fine of \$5,000.00 and an amount equal to double the amount of duty on the quantity so exported.

PIT PROPS

Any person may export by the usual export entry any timber or lumber for pit props to any place in the United Kingdom for one year from 1st September, 1914. S. D. BLANDFORD, Minister of Agriculture and Mines, Dept. of Agriculture and Mines, September 10, 1914.

WHEREAS We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint Terms or Sessions for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our Island of Newfoundland, at the several times and places hereinafter mentioned:

We do, therefore, declare to all Our loving subjects within Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island, shall be open and holden—

At Brigus, on Friday, the 20th, and Saturday, the 21st days of November next.

At Harbour Grace, on Monday the 23rd, Tuesday, the 24th, Wednesday, the 25th, and Thursday, the 26th days of November next;

At Carbonear, on Friday, the 27th, and Saturday, the 28th days of November next.

And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods hereinbefore prescribed at each of the respective places, as aforesaid, provided the presiding Judge shall have business to do therein; and if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And We do by these Presents, farther order and direct that in the event of a Judge who may preside in the said Court, in the Northern District of Our said Island, being prevented by unforeseen circumstances from opening Our said Court on any of the days hereinbefore appointed, or if the said Judge should arrive at any of the places hereinbefore named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and shall deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those hereinbefore specified, and to keep the same open for the respective periods hereinbefore stated, as aforesaid, if he should deem it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Goals and other Officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

S. S. "Franconia" Takes 303 Naval Reservists

Thursday night, Nov. 5th, the large Cunard liner S. S. Franconia, over 18,000 tons, said to be the biggest ship that ever entered St. John's, arrived at St. John's to take a contingent of Naval Reservists to the Old Country. She sailed again at 8 o'clock Friday morning after taking aboard 303 of our sailors who volunteered for active service in His Majesty's Royal Navy.

Capt. Alan Goddridge went along in charge of the contingent. Large numbers of the citizens of St. John's viewed the ship as she sailed, and every steamer along the waterfront whistled a farewell. Guns were fired by many people from the houses at each side of the Narrows, and the Reservists aboard cheered heartily as the ship went through the Narrows.

The Franconia is 600 ft. 3 inches long, 71 ft. 3 inches wide, and 40 ft. deep. She has 40,100 horse power, and her speed is 20 knots.

Notes on the War

The battle reported to have taken place off the Chilean coast has been confirmed. Five German ships attacked four British. One of the British ships was sunk and the other is reported beached.

The German cruiser Emden, which was doing so much damage in the Indian Ocean, having sunk 22 steamers valued, with their cargoes, at \$4,000,000, was put out of business by the Australian warship Sydney. Several of her crew were killed and wounded, and the remainder, including the captain, were taken prisoners.

Tsingtau, the German possession in China, has surrendered to the British and Japanese forces. This will release a number of men and vessels for service in rounding up the seven or eight German warships still at large.

H. M. S. Chatham has got the German warship Keenigsberg bottled up in a river in German East Africa.

The Japanese army may be fighting in Europe before long.

The British torpedo gun-boat Niger has been torpedoed by a submarine near the Goodwin Sands, off Deal, England.

The rebels of South Africa have been given until Nov. 21st to surrender.

The British force of 1,186,000 men have been virtually recruited.

Severe fighting has taken place on the French-Belgium frontier lately. The Allies lost some ground in one place and gained in another.

The Russians are continually on the offensive, and have made much progress, capturing many prisoners and guns. They are now well on German territory.

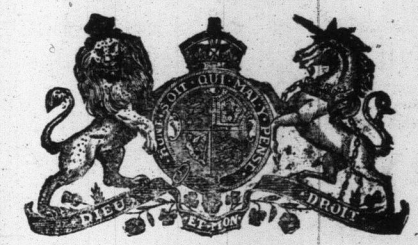

Proclamation

By His Excellency Sir WALTER EDWARD DAVIDSON, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

YOUR KING AND COUNTRY NEED YOU. WILL YOU ANSWER YOUR COUNTRY'S CALL?

A Proclamation was issued on the 21st of August calling on the Patriotic young men of Newfoundland to enlist in the First Newfoundland Regiment and rally round the Old Flag. The response to the appeal was prompt and our Contingent, 540 strong, is already training in England and will be sent to the front as soon as the men are made thoroughly efficient.

We need more fighting men. We need to train more men to strengthen our Contingent for land service and we need to raise a Contingent for Sea Service, but the special need now is for men-at-arms.

There is at present a force, nominally, of 600 men recruited from the Royal Naval Reserve. When the War broke out the roll was 525. A message was sent to the King that this force would be raised to 1,000 men, hardy and bandy and loyal men from the shores of Newfoundland. And the King has just now accepted the spirited offer. The fishermen have been a way on their summer voyage and will have waited for the return of the men to acquaint them of the King's acceptance of our offer. At the present moment the Reserve numbers only 550 men of whom 107 are already serving on board H. M. S. "Niobe."

The Lords of the Admiralty have now telegraphed that they are now ready to take over the Newfoundland Reservists. So it is our duty to respond as soon as possible and arrange for their training. The fishermen and landmen have responded nobly to the call and we have sent one Soldier Regiment from all the Districts. It is now the Seamen's turn. Let us not fail the Old Country in the great struggle for liberty on which she is now engaged. Newfoundlanders of old have been known for centuries to be staunch and true and loyal to the King. It must never be said that the descendants of the old Sea dogs, whose Fathers never failed when a blow had to be struck for Empire and the Call is made.

The Admiralty call for 500 seamen from Newfoundland, to engage for the period of one year. Let the best of the men of the Country come forward and report themselves on board H.M.S. "Calypso."

Brief News

We met with a man recently who in all sincerity refused to give anything to the Patriotic Fund because he thought half the money would be taken and given to our schools and school-teachers. We explained matters to him and he gave willingly.

We are pleased to find that the old British spirit, so dominant in their forbears, still exist in our young men who are joining the Naval Reserve. Those whom we have been talking with belonging to this section have exhibited a strong desire to fight for their King and Country, and we have no doubt but that they will give a good account of themselves.

During recent battles in East Prussia Germans lost 70 per cent. of their officers, and from Oct. 23rd to Nov. 5th 323 German officers and 21,750 soldiers were taken prisoners, and 4 siege mortars, 52 cannon, 50 Maxim guns and large quantity war stuffs and provisions were taken.

Two fishermen, Joseph Cassel and Joseph Richmond, of Herriag Neck, while going in a boat to Milner's Arm for wood, was found dead by Thos. Cutler on Boyce's Island. Their boat must have struck a rock and filled with water. Cassel was found in the bottom of the boat, which was full of water, and Richmond was found in a bunch of trees.
