EQUITY COURT

The Cases Before the Court Yesterday Afternoon and Today. Yesterday afternoon the court was engaged in hearing the arguments in the case of the New Brunswick Telephone Company vs. The St. John Gas and Electric Light Company.

The argument was upon the right of plaintiffs to call for the relief prayed for by their bill. The attorney general claimed that it was simply a question of expense as appeared from the affidavit in the cause. The plaintiffs asked to have their status determined. The defendants might set up that they had the same right to use the earth as a return conductor as plaintiffs had.

The earth, as the attorney general claimed, was used to a large extent as a return conductor. The question of a settlement was then discussed for a few minutes. Dr. F. E. Barker, C. C., for defendant, asked that plaintiffs' lines be as much disturbed by the Eastern electric company and the New Brunswick Telephone Company, as by defendant company. The attorney general and Dr. Barker denied that. It was suggested that the electric lighting system in the city and the electric street railway company to what, if any, arrangement could be made for plaintiffs' protection. This morning it was arranged that the case of the Albert Brothers' railway would be called Wednesday next.
