The election in Newfoundland brought to a close one of the keenest and bitterest campaigns in recent years. The so-called Liberal Government, led by Sir Robert Bond, has been in power for two terms, eight years. At last election, four years ago, they carried the country by a sweeping majority, winning 30 seats out of 36. A year ago, Sir Edward Morris, admittedly a man with a large personal following, who was regarded as Sir Robert Bond's lieutenant and held the portfolio of Minister of Justice, resigned and threw in his lot with the Opposition. This led to the formation of the Liberals.

Urquhart Shooting Case Resumed in Fredericton Yesterday Afternoon.

Fredericton, Nov. 3.-The preliminary examination of Chester Urquhart, charged with causing the death of a boy named George Clarey at Covered Bridge, was continued in the police court this afternoon. The evidence of George Murray and James McDonald was taken and went to show that the boys had quarrelied on the day before the shooting but the accused had not issued any threats.

Urquhart went on the stand and declared that the shooting had been accidental. He said that he went to pass the rifle to Clarey when the hammer caught in his clothing and the piece was discharged. He was most sincere and emphatic in his declaration that the shooting had been accidental.



The population of the island proper is about 230,000, or considerably less than that of the city of Toronto, while there are possibly 10,000 more scattered along the one thousand miles of Labrador coast and in the back countr adjacent thereto. There are about 600 miles of railway in Newfoundland, and of late years there has been considerable de velopment of mining and pulpwood interests. Doubltless confederation with Canada will come but it will only come when the people of Newfoundland are themselves roughly satisfied that that is the best



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
