

The debate on the answer of the Government to the interpellation concerning the mutiny in the prison at Riga April 13, when seven mutineers were killed and 12 wounded, was then continued. This matter last came up in the House on April 23. The Minister of Justice, M. Chtolegiovitori, denied that medieval tortures had been inflicted on the mullineers but admitted they had been beaten with Cossach whips and rubber sticks. At the close of the session today Count Bobrinsky, Monarchist, who had been charged with bribery in connection with the elections in Tula, secured the floor on a question of privilege and accussed F. I. Rodritcheff, Constitutional Democrat, of falsehood. At the same time he announced that V. V. Shulgin, Monarchist, had challenged M. Rodritcheff reaffirmed the bribery charges and declined to accept the challenge.

LONDON, May 30.—The congress of Russian Social Democrats which has been in session in this city since May 31, decided today by a majority of 53 votes definitely to sever all relations with the Constitutional Democrats and other Liberal parties which they lost a year ago.

It was decided that the Ludlow be painted on Hilyard's blocks. Some discussion concerning the wash-ing and cleaning of the Ludlow fol-

lowed.

After some talk on the renovation of the East Side toll-house it was decided to settle the matter at a special meeting of the committee.

Aid. Bullock moved that the matter of the East and West Side ferry gates and approaches be left to the superintendent and the chairman to report at the next regular meeting.

The chairman next proposed the substitution of electric incandescent lights for the West Side pier-head lights. He decided to investigate the cost of the substitution and report at the next meeting.

Ald. Baxter recommended changes in the hand-steering gear of the Ludlow in order that it might be made a little handler. He will take the matter up later and the change will be made when the boat is laid up for inspection.

Chairman Baxter next informed the meeting that it had been practically demonstrated to him that the Ludlow's life-boats could not be lowered into the water. They were no good unless they could be used. The matter will be further considered in the future.

Ald. McGowan next brought up a matter which had come to his notice. A little girl had sat on the railing and only by the merest accident had not fallen overboard. Yet the life-preservers were all inside the cabins. These should be placed for life preserving about the railing.
