GENERAL CIRCULAR.

THE MOUNT ALLISON WESLEVAN COLLEGE was organized in July, 1862, under a charter obtained from the Legislature of New Brunswick. By virtue of this charter it possesses full University powers. ar

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It is one of the affiliated Colleges of the University of Halifax. This relation involves important privileges to the graduates and students of the College, but does not, of course, impair or affect in any way its chartered rights. The University Act establishing the University of Halifax, passed by the Legislature of Nova Scotia during the session of 1876, is ostensibly an attempt to promote the cause of higher education, by securing the sympathetic co-operation of the governing Boards and Faculties of various Colleges. Interpreting it as a sincere movement in the interests of Educational unity and University Reform, the Board of Governors and Faculty of the Mount Allison Wesleyan College, in their conjoint character as the College Board, have authorized such a modification of the Arts' Curriculum as will promote the convenience of Students preparing for the Degree Examinations of the University of Halifax. The subjoined Course of Study will, it is believed, answer this end, and at the same time render it easy to conserve the acquired rights of Students who have been working for Degrees according to the original Curriculum.

The College, true to the historic reputation of the other and older Mount Allison Institutions, is conducted on strictly non-sectarian principles. The general denominational control, under which it is placed, furnishes a sufficient guarantee that sceptical license will never be allowed to run riot within its walls, but does not imply the existence of a purpose or a wish to interfere with the conscientious convictions of any. The fullest recognition, however, is given to the truths and claims of the Christian religion : the Bible is publicly honoured as the Word of God, and no pains are spared that the education imparted may be suitably leavened with religious principle.

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Course of Study for the Degree of B. A.

MATRICULATION.

The Matriculation Examinations are held on the first and second days of the first term of the Collegiate year. Supplementary Examinations for special cases may be held at other dates.

No student is admitted to undergraduate standing without passing the Matriculation Examination; but non-matriculated students, in the character of specialists, may attend any course of Lectures for which, in the judgment of the Faculty after due examination, they are deemed prepared.

By an Explanatory Regulation of the Senate of the University of Halifax, candidates for Degrees in that institution who shall have passed the Matriculation Examination of the Mount Allison Wesleyan College, are admitted to the first B. A. Examination without having passed the Matriculation Examination of the University.

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The number of hours per week to be devoted to the above subjects, respectively, will be determined by the necessities of the case.

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The Course of Study for the Freshman and Sophomore years includes the subjects required for the first B. A. Examination of the University of Halifax, which examination, according to the regulation of the Senate, cannot, in the case of any candidate, take place within one academical year of the time of his passing the Matriculation Examination. The course prescribed for the Junior and Senior years contains a similar relation to the second B. A. Examination of the University. It should be observed that the University regulations prescribe that the Mathematics, Physics, and Classics of these years are compulsory, save that Spherical Trigonometry and Analytical Geometry may be omitted by students who pass in Classics, and that one subject in Greek and Latin may be omitted by candidates who pass in Mathematics and Physics; also, that of the three subjects, French or German or Hebrew, Mental and Moral Philosophy, Constitutional History or Political Economy, two only are compulsory.

The Members of the Senior Class are required to prepare and deliver two original orations each term. All other students are required to prepare weekly an exercise either in English Composition or in Elocution.

EXAMINATIONS, DEGREES, &C.

At the close of the first term, all the Classes will be examined by the Faculty both orally and by means of written papers. The Annual and Degree Examinations at the close of the second term are conducted in the same manner by the Faculty and duly appointed Examiners.

The Degree of Bachelor of Arts is conferred upon those who complete the regular course of study and pass satisfactorily the required Examinations.

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16 MOUNT ALLISON The Degree of Master of Arts may be taken in course by any Bachelor of Arts of three years standing, who shall have prepared and forwarded a satisfactory thesis to the President, at least three weeks before the annual Convocation, and who shall satisfy the College Board that his course, subsequent to graduation, entitles him to this distinction. CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.

Candidates for the Ministry of the Methodist Church of Canada, who have been appointed to attend College, will pursue the course of study prescribed on page 192 of the Discipline of the Church.

The Educational Society of the Methodist Church makes provision for free tuition and aids in meeting the general expenses of young men appointed by the Conference to attend college.

PRELIMINARY COURSE OF STUDY.

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This course of study is designed to meet the wants of young men preparing to offer themselves to be received on trial for the ministry. It embraces all the subjects prescribed for the preliminary and first year's examinations of the Methodist Conference, and may extend over one, two, or three years, according to the previous attainments and circumstances of the student.

The Theological parts of this course may be pursued in connection with preparation for Matriculation in Arts.

The English and Classical parts of this course are prepared in the Academy and College.

Students presenting themselves for admission to this course should bring with them letters of introduction from the superintendent ministers of the circuits on which they reside. If they expect to offer themselves for the ministry at the close of the year they must be recommended from the quarterly meetings of their own circuits, and not from the Sackville quarterly meeting. Students bringing with them certificates of such recommendation will be exempted from fees for theological tuition. License as exhorters or local preachers should also in all cases issue from the superintendent and quarterly meeting of the circuit in which the student resides, and where his church membership and standing should be continued.

After examination at the close of the college year, all students in the preliminary course will return home in time to be presented at their own district meetings in case they wish to be received on trial by Conference.

In Elocution, a prize of twenty-five dollars was offered for competition, to the Conference students of last year, by John Macdonald, Esq., M. P., of Toronto; and another of fifteen dollars by Josiah Wood, Esq., of Sackville. The former was gained by Mr. Geo. O. Robinson, of the N. S. Conference; and the latter by Mr. T. L. 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Theological Library.

Efforts have been made during the past year to increase the value of this important aid to the professors and students of this department. Very generous assistance has been rendered by contributions of money, or of valuable books from the Revs. A. W. Nicolson, W. H. Heartz, D. Chapman, T. Rogers, M. A., R. Brecken, M. A., J. S. Phinney, and the Hon. Judge Marshall. It is earnestly desired that further contributions be made to the Library Fund, so that the latest and best results of Theological Science may be placed within reach of our Students.

Societies.

Towards the close of the past year, steps were taken to establish two Societies, having a relation to the department. The one was designed for the benefit of the Theological Students in the College; and the other to serve as a connecting link between them and the Ministers labouring in the three Conferences of the Maritime Provinces, as well as to promote among the latter a spirit of Theological and Ministerial culture.

Among the Students it is proposed by means of Essays, Exegetical papers, and oral discussions to stimulate enquiry as to the best methods of Ministerial efficiency, and so to assist in preparing each other for the great work of preaching the Gospel, and feeding the flock of Christ.

The Ministers' Theological Union will meet at the close of each Collegiate year, and, in addition to the consideration of topics of interest belonging to their work, will have an annual Sermon preached, and a Theological lecture delivered. The Rev. W. C. Brown, of Liverpool, N. S., has consented to preach the Anniversary Sermon in 1879, and the Lecture will be delivered by the Rev. C. Stewart, D. D.

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General Governmental Regulations, &c.

Students both regular and special are expected to conduct themselves with propriety, and to observe all the regulations of the Faculty as announced from time to time. Students whose conduct or progress in study shall continue, after suitable admonition, to be unsatisfactory, will not be allowed to remain in the Institution.

Regular and punctual attendance at their classes shall be imperative on all Students. Professors will mark the presence or absence of Students immediately before commencing the work of the class, and will note as absent those who enter thereafter, unless satisfactory reasons for tardiness be assigned.

No Student shall be absent from the College after 10 o'clock at night, without special permission of the President.

All Students are expected to attend Divine Service on Sunday, and to be punctual in attendance at daily prayers in the College Chapel.

No Student shall resort to any tavern or place where intoxicating liquors are sold, without special permission of the President; and no Student who is known to use intoxicating drinks will be allowed to retain his connection with the College.

The use of tobacco on the College premises is not permitted.

It has a well-furnished room in the College in which its meetings are held weekly.

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
