



(Continued from page 31 stand against Germany, and we, as Belgium's ally, must asist her in the struggle. Again our attention is called to the famous song Rule Britannia", for that is just what she is doing at present—ruling the waves.

"Some people say our navy is doing nothing at present; if this is so, it is because it has done what is required of it, for the great ocean routes are free from German warships, and the submarines dare not come into too plain sight lest the navy, which is always on the watch, should seize them. But, should the German navy summon up courage enough to come out into the North Soa we can be sure that our navy will be ready for them. It is altogether due to the navy that we are still able to carry on business as we are.

"Look what Canada has done. She has sent well on to 100,000 men to Europe, and nobody can say that they have not done their duty. But for all this, more men are needed—recruit-ing must be stimulated. Munitions also are needed, and we, who stay at also are needed, and we, who stay at home, must see to it that they are sent. St. John is in no way behind any other part of Canada in this line, for she has sent her share of men and in a short time 20 machine guns will be forwarded.




