## FIFTH REPORT

Of the GENERAL COMMITTEE of the

## DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA.

THE Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society of Nova Sco-TIA took place in the Saloon of the Halifax Hotel, at Halifax, on Thursday, the 23rd day of February, A. D. 1843, at 7 o'clock in the evening.

and a numerous assemblage of ladies and gentlemen interested in the affairs of the Society.

The LORD BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA, President of the Society, took the Chair shortly after 7 o'clock, and opened the proceedings by calling upon those present to sing the two first verses of the Hundredth Psalm.

The Reverend Addington D. PARKER, M. A. read prayers.

The Right Revd. and Honble, the President then briefly stated the nature and objects of the Society, and called upon the Assistant Secretary to read the Report, which he had prepared of the Proceedings of the Society for the past year:—

## Report:

The period for holding the Fifth Anniversary of the Diocesan Church Society of Nova Scotia, again calls upon the General Committee to present to their brethren, the Representatives of most, if not of all the Local Committees, and to others, who take an interest in the operations of the Society, a brief report of

their proceedings during the past year.

In submitting this Report, your Committee have to regret the absence of their worthy and Reverend Secretary, as well for the cause of that absence, as for the loss sustained by your Committee, from the efficient services always rendered by that Reverend Gentleman, in conducting the affairs of the Society in general, and more particularly, on an occasion like the present, in preparing for your consideration, a full and accurate detail of its proceedings, which, from his intimate acquaintance with all matters connected with the Society, he was so well calculated to perform.

While your Committee thus express their deep regret, for the absence of their Reverend Secretary, they at the same time entertain the hope, that God, in His good Providence, will soon restore him, in renewed health and strength, to the

field of his labours and his usefulness.

Since the last report of the proceedings of the Society, several grants of money have been made by the Committee, in furtherance of the different objects contemplated by the Society, and though, what has been done, is of a silent and unpretending nature, yet it is a pleasing duty to report to those, who take an interest in the progress of the Society, the quiet and peaceful working of its principles, and that it trusts, it will be humbly instrumental by the blessing of God, in whose service it is engaged, in making some small portion of the wilderness to rejoice and blossom as the rose, by spreading the knowledge of the word, which maketh wise unto salvation, and by giving to those who have hitherto been destitute of them, the use of those ordinances, which in themselves, are so well adapted to the improvement and comfort of those who partake in them. In some places destitute of the more regular, and efficient ministrations, of the duly ordained servant of God, recourse has been had, to the humble but useful services of respectable Lay Readers, or Catechists, who have been licensed for such purpose.

In the appropriation of their Funds, the Committee have granted towards the erection of Churches, in places where much poverty prevails, the following sums,

On an application of the Revd. J. C. Cochran made by him in April last, the sum of £25 was voted, in aid of the erection of a Church at New Germany; in his letter applying for this grant, the Revd. Gentleman stated that "This Edifice, if God should bless their endeavours, so far as to permit its erection, would well deserve from its situation, the name of a 'Church in the wilderness,'"

An application was also made by the Revd. Mr. Elder in October last, for aid in the erection of a New Church at the Sydney Mines; in his application, he mentioned, that the people there had raised among themselves and their friends the sum of £166 19s, and that the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel had promised them the further sum of £50 sterling, and should the funds of the Diocesan Society allow of their assisting them, it would be received with gratitude, and would contribute, he trusted, to the great object which they had in view, the advancement of the cause of "pure and undefiled Religion." The sum of £20, was granted on this application.

To a New Church at Marshall Towa, in the Parish of Digby, the Committee have granted the sum of £25, on an application made for that purpose, by the Revd. Wm. Bulloch: The exterior of the building with its tower and steeple has been completed. It is situated four and a half miles from the Parish Church of Digby, and Mr. Bulloch states, that in a circuit of five miles, there is a population exceeding a thousand persons, not including the Town of Digby; the sittings in this Church are to be free, and will accommodate from two to three

hundred persons.

The sum of £25 has been voted to the Revd. T. C. White, on an earnest application made by him, for aid in the erection of a New Church in his Parish. The following statement forwarded by Mr. White, for the information of the Committee, is of a very interesting nature. "The Church is situated on the west side of Shelburne Harbour, 8 miles by land from the Parish Church, in the midst of a settlement six miles in extent, containing a population of 43 white families, the whole of which with two exceptions belong to the Church, besides 20 colored families, who, poor creatures, are in a most destitute condition, as well in temporal, as in spiritual things, and who will gladly avail themselves of the,

opportunity which will be afforded them, of hearing these things that make for their eternal peace. The Building will accommodate from 250 to 300 people. It is completed externally—the floors are nearly finished, and temporary seats erected; a garden also for the interment of the dead, has been neatly enclosed, and was consecrated by his Lordship the Bishop, during his visit to this place last summer. The amount of contributions on the spot in money, has been but little; they had it not to give, what they had, their time and labour, they have contributed cheerfully, and largely, as the progress already made abundantly proves, and they are anxious to continue their exertions, until they shall "bring forth the head stone with shoutings crying grace, grace, unto it."

"The natural difficulties surmounted in our progress, thus far, have not I believe been surpassed, if equalled, in this Province. The materials could only he procured at a great distance from the spot; the sills were brought by land and water 16 miles, and lumber, nails, shingles, and every thing, but the frame and even some of that, after having been landed upon the beach, was conveyed to the intended site, upwards of a quarter of a mile, on the shoulders of the people. These things speak for themselves, and need only to be made known, to excite

the sympathies of their fellow Churchmen."

In adverting to the expenditure for Lay Readers, the Committee deem it proper to mention, that the Society have expressed an opinion, against the expediency of establishing Lay Readers with salaries, but at the same time have consented to continue the allowance that had been granted, before the expression of that opinion, and that they are still willing to assist, in defraying the actual expenses incurred by licensed Catechists, and Lay Readers, in visiting distant

places, under the superintendance and direction of the neighbouring Clergymen.

The Committee have expended, on the applications of the Revd. T. C. Leaver, the Royd. R. J. Uniacke, and other Clergymen, in continuation of former grants, the following sums, viz:—£20 for a Lay Reader at Tracadie, being for the years 1842 and 1843. This place is distant 26 miles from the residence of

any Clergyman.

£30 for a Lay Reader at Country Harbor, being likewise for the years 1842, and 1843.

£5 for a Lay Reader at the Western Shore of Chester.

£20 for a Lay Reader at Walton.

£10 for a Lay Reader at Ship Harbor, this grant includes £5, for his services

for the past year.

On an application made by the Rev. J. C. Cochran, for a grant of £20, for a Lay Reader to visit New Germany, North-Field, and Pleasant River Road. The Committee came to the resolution of not granting a salary, but have placed at the command of Mr. Cochran, a sum not exceeding £20, to defray the actual expenses incurred by such Lay Reader, in attending the places named by Mr. Cochran,

The sum of £10, has been appropriated by your Committee, in grants for Books

from the depository of this Society, for gratuitous distribution, viz :-

£3, to the Rev. A. Gray, for Testaments and Cards for the use of the Day and Sunday Schools, established at Sackville.—£2, to the Rev. Mr. Maynard, for Prayer Books for the use of the poor people, at Ferguson's Cove and Harriet's Fields, and £5, to Rev. Mr. Bullock for Books for the use of the Sunday Schools in his Parish.—The number of Books which have been issued from the Depository, including the supplying of the one-fourth of the Remittances, from the different Local Committees, amounts in the whole, to 75 Bibles,-205 Testaments-603 Prayer Books-156 Miscellaneous Works-and 3450 Tracts.

While on the subject of the Books, your Committee would take this opportunity of stating, that, at the suggestion of his Lordship the President of the Society, the sum of £28, has been expended, for fitting up a Room on the ground floor of the National School House, as a Depository, and place of sale, for the Books imported by the Society, thereby affording a more easy access for pur-

chasers.

The sum of £15, placed in the hands of the Venerable Archdeacon Willis, to pay the necessary expenses of Missionary visits to destitute places, having been expended by him, a further sum of £20, for the like purpose, was entrusted to him by the Committee, at their quarterly Meeting in November last. The account of the expenditure of these sums, has been handed in to the Committee, by the Archdeacon, among the items of that account, is the sum of £3 12s. 6d. paid to the Rev. Mr. Porter, for incidental expenses, in travelling through the Island of Cape Breton, for which small sum, from January, to June last, he had been enabled to travel 732 miles, on Missionary excursions, to preach 47 times, had baptised 24 individuals, attended 3 funerals, had solemnized 3 marriages, and had administered the sacrament, to 19 persons, at out stations on different occasions.

It will therefore appear from the foregoing statements, that the amounts which have been appropriated by the Committee, since the last Annual Meeting

of the Society, are as follows:-

The Committee, in turning the attention of the meeting to the consideration of the income of the Society, have to express their regret, that the funds of this

Society have not been materially increased.

The subscriptions, in the City of Halifax, with but few exceptions, have been the same, since the formation of the Society. At that period, a number of persons readily came forward to its support, and put down their names as continuous to its funds; but since that time, your Committee sincerely regret, that the interests of the Society, have not been assisted by that earnest and affectionate zeal, and hiberality, for which, the present time seem to call upon those, who love Christ's Holy Catholic Church, to bind themselves together in union, and mutual good will, not in hostility, to those who may differ from them, but in love, for one another.

The sum received in the City of Halifax, for the past year, including the sum of £16, collected in St George's Church, in March last, after a sermon preached by the Lord Bishop, and inclusive also of the collection of £49 15s made in St Paul's Church, after a sermon preached by the Revd<sub>2</sub>Mr. Arnold, in aid of the Funds of the Society, on Sunday last, the 19th of February,

amounts to £154 5s Od.

The Committee have, for the first time, to report the pleasing intelligence of the receipt of a Legacy, by the hands of the Revd. Edwin Gilpin, Rector of the Parish of Annapolie; its amount is small, only £5, but it merks the pious dis-

cosition, and affectionate regard, of the Testator, for the objects of the Church ociety; and at a moment, when all his feelings must have been deeply solemn,

The Testator was Henry Harris, Esq. of Annapolis.

From Yarmouth, the Revd. Richard Avery has forwarded the sum of £15 10s 74d, of which, eleven shillings and tenpence, contributed by the Parents, and children of one family, was directed to be applied to assist in the education of Candidates for the ministry. The number of members, of which this Scciety consists at present, is 188.

The letter addressed to the Assistant Secretary, accompanying the remittance of £17, from the Digby Local Committee, by the President and Secretary of that Committee, has, among others, the following interesting particulars:-

It gives us great pleasure, to inform you of our continued success; the meetings of the Committee are always well attended, and the managing Com-

mittee are active, and the subscriptions generally paid.

"There are now 253 members enrolled, and the amount of their subscriptions is £40. There is every where in this neighbourhood, a more intelligent acquaintance with the Church, and a growing attachment to her services, and both are greatly promoted by the operations of the Society. The Communicants, who, last year, were forty in number, have increased to one hundred.-Besides the annual payment made to the Society, considerable sums have been collected, for special purposes: the building of the Marshall Town Church, and an excellent Sunday School House, has been commenced and finished, since the formation of the Society."

From Clements, £5 has been remitted, by the Revd. W. Godfrey, in addition

to £1 15s 6d, received in April last.

From the Liverpool Local Committee, the sum of £21 has been forwarded by Revd. J. T. Moody, through S. P. Fairbanks, Esq. one of the Delegates at the present meeting. The number of persons belonging to the Liverpool Society, is about 250; the amount subscribed at their last meeting, was ±30, the balance of £10, Mr. Moody writes, he expects to forward this week, £1 3s 9d, of the amount remitted is to be sent to New Zealand.

At the fifth Anniversary of the Antigonish Parochial Branch of the Church Society, recently held, the sum of £13 and upwards was subscribed for the various purposes of the Society; £10 of this sum has been forwarded by the Revd. T. C. Leaver; in addition to this sum, Mr. Leaver remitted from the Antigonish Committee, in April last, the sum of £10 8s, and in July, the sum of £2 18s, and a further sum of £3, to be sent to the Society for the Propagation of the

Gospel, in aid of Missions to the Heathen.

The letter from Dr. Shreve, accompanying a remittance of £10 5s, from the Chester District Committee, has the following pleasing information. "The Annual Meeting of our Society, took place on Wednesday evening, the 8th inst., at which a large number of subscribers, and others, were present, thus showing their undiminished interest, in the welfare of the Society. At the close of the Meeting, the names of upwards of twenty new members were added to our list. I am happy to say, the members of the Parish generally, evince a strong desire thus to enrol themselves among the number of those, who, not only in this Province, but in the Christian world at large, love and venerate the Church of their Fathers, "the pillar and ground of the truth." Five shillings of the above amount remitted, at particular request, is to be sent to the Society for promoting Christianity among the Jews.

The sum of £8 15s has been forwarded by the Sackville Committee, through

"It is a subject of congratulation, that look where we will, Church principles are making steady and rapid progress, but especially encouraging is the fact, that Churchmen are learning their true position, neither leaning in one direction to Rome, as to a centre of Catholicity, nor tending on the other to Dissent, but preserving unshaken, the middle way of the reformed Catholic Faith, the old undestroyed and Holy Apostolic Church of the Empire. In our own Diccese, we trust also, much has been done; we are not without our records of New Churches built, of an enlarged number of Missionaries, of increasing Congregations, and of more candidates for confirmation coming forward, with greater seriousness and preparation of heart. The number of Books distributed, circumstances prevent an accurate return being made, but the following is probably near the truth:-13 Bibles, 30 Testaments, 30 Prayer Brooks and 600 Tracts. The Chapel at the Mines is rapidly approaching completion. It is erected under the active and zealous superintendance of the Agent of the Mining Association. At the North West Arm, the little Chapel has been repaired, and very neatly fitted up, and painted, at the expense of the settlement, aided by a grant of £20 sterling, from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. At Louisburg, notwithstanding the pressure of the times, they hope to finish their Church externally, from their own fesources, during the approaching summer. At Cowe Bay, a Meeting was to be held a short time ago, preliminary to the attempt at erecting a Church, of which we have not yet heard the result. In many instances, it is but just to state, that proofs have been given of true Christian munificence. The amount of our Funds, when they are stated to be less than those of the former year, no one acquainted with the difficulties of the season will be surprised, especially if it be considered, how much has been engaged in, and is in prospect, locally, among our people; but notwithstanding this, had it not been for the extremely stormy autumn, which prevented the Visiting Missionary from meeting the people, at the usual time for collecting subscriptions, the deficiency would be small, if any thing. It is proposed that an adjournment be made to the first of March, when it is hoped, a more satisfactory account can be rendered to the Society than at present."\*

From New Dublin, the Revd. J. W. Weeks, has forwarded the sum of £5,

being amount of collections made in his Parish, on behalf of the Society

The Guysboro' Committee, with its usual punctuality, has forwarded the sum of £16 17s 2d; £14 for the general purposes of the Society-1 to be returned in Books, and £2 17s 2d, to be forwarded to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, in aid of their efforts for the conversion of the Heathen.

The Committee at St. Margaret's Bay has, as usual, made its punctual re-

mittance by the Revd. J. Stannage, amounting to £6 6s 6d.

From Lunenburg, in addition to the amount of £23, remitted in February last, the Rev. J. C. Cochran, has forwarded the sum of £24 6s. There has been an increase of 60 members, to the District Society at Lunenburg, since their meeting in January last.

The Newport Committee have forwarded by the hands of the Rev. R. Uni-

acke, the sum of £11 16s. 4d.

From Aylesford, the sum of £1, has been forwarded by the Rev. H. L. Owen. From Mahone Bay, where a Branch Society has lately been formed by the

Rev. Mr. Cochran, the sum of £3, has been paid by Mr. B. Zwicker, their delegate, at the present meeting. This Society, though only originated a fortnight

back, already numbers 60 members.

The Dartmouth Local Committee are still untiring in their endeavours, to increase the efficiency of their Society, and especial commendations are due to them from this Committee. The result of their labours, aided by the unceasing exertions of their Pastor, the Rev. Mr. Parker, has been, to enrol nearly every member, of every family, in the Parish, on the list of the Society, and to increase the amount of their subscriptions, to the sum of £58, of which £33 4s. 6d. has been paid to the Treasurer.

In closing their report, the Committee would earnestly call upon their Brethren of the Local Committees, and other members of the Society, (when they consider the happy, and exalted privileges, of church communion they enjoy,) for more strenuous exertions, in the great, and good work, which they have undertaken; until they shall be enabled, through the blessing of God, to place within the reach of the Poorest Individual, throughout the length and breadth of our land, all the blessings, and privileges, of the Gospel, through the ministrations of our beloved church—"A church, built upon the foundation of the Apostles and Prophets-Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone."

II. Resolved,—That this Meeting, deems the present a proper opportunity, to repeat their sense of gratitude to the Society, for the Propagation of the Gospel, and the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, for their fostering care of the Colonial Church, and especially that portion of it established in this Province, and to unite in Prayer, to Almighty God, for the continuance of his blessing on their efforts.

The Revd. George Morriss, then moved the third Resolution: C. Budd. Esq. M. P. P., seconded, and the Revd. Dr. Twining, and J. L. Starr, Esq.

supported the same.

III. Resolved,-That this Meeting, desire to express their grateful acknowledgements to Almighty God, for any progress that this Society may have made, in the furtherance of the cause of pure and undefiled Religion: and that they deem it a solemn and imperative duty, at all meetings of the Society, to record its conviction, that all human means, however high and holy their objects, must prove ineffectual, unless begun and continued in a spirit of entire dependence on Almighty God.

The Hon. CHIEF JUSTICE then moved the fourth Resolution, CAPTAIN POULDEN, R. A., seconded, and the Rev. ROBERT ARNOLD, B. A., supported

V. Resolved,—That the thanks of this meeting are due to the President, Vice-President, the Officers and the Committee, for their exertions in behalf of the Society, during the past year.

D. Weir, Esq., then moved the sixth Resolution, which was seconded by

VI. Resolved,—That the several Officers of the Society, be requested to continue in the discharge of their Offices, and that the following Gentlemen, with all the Clergy of the Church, do constitute the Committee for the ensuing year, viz:—

His Lordship the President, after having acknowledged the thanks conveyed by the fifth Resolution, briefly addressed the meeting, and in conclusion proposed a vote of thanks to A. Keith, Esq., for his kindness in giving the Society the use of the Saloon—which, on being put by his Lordship from the chair, was unanimously agreed to.

A Collection was then made, amounting to £22 5s 1d, and the Doxology having been sung, the Lord Bishop dismissed the meeting with the benedic-

## STANDING RULES

For the Constitution and Government

OF THE

### DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA.

I. His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia for the time being, and the Societies for the Propagation of the Gospel, and for Promoting Christian Knowledge, shall be respectfully requested to be the Patrons of this Society.

II. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be the President of the Society, with a control over all their proceedings. His approval shall be necessary for the completion of all important acts of the Society, and especially for the revocation or alteration of any of the standing rules, and for making any addition to

thorn

III. There shall be two or more Vice Presidents, of whom the Archdeacon of Nova-Scotia shall be the first; a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary when

necessary, and a Treasurer.

IV. There shall be a Standing Committee, consisting of the Officers, all the Clergy, and as many Laymen as it shall be thought convenient to choose at the Annual Meeting of the Society. The Lay Members shall continue in the committee for a year, or until other Lay Members be chosen in their place; and any or all of them may be re-elected. Seven of the Committee shall be a quorum, provided four of them be Laymen.

V. The Society shall be open to all the Members of the Church, all of whom shall be invited to unite with it. Ten pounds paid at any one time shall qualify a person to be a Member during his life, and the payment in advance of any sum, however small, shall qualify a person to be a Member for a year.

VI. The members of the Church in every part of the Province shall be invited to co-operate with the Diocesan Society, by joining Committees of it which shall be formed, under the direction of their respective Clergymen, either in each mission or parish, or in more than one mission or parish united, as shall be deemed most convenient, and in strict accordance with the design and rules of the Diocesan Society; and it is recommended to the Committees to forward their funds, as they may be collected, to the General Committee, who will faithfully apply them to the general objects of the Society; but when the Local Committees desire it, they shall receive books at cost and charges to the amount

of one fourth of their remittances.

VII. There shall be one General Meeting of the whole Society, including any members of the Local Committees who can conveniently attend, on such day and at such place as the President may name, of which due notice will be given, with an invitation to every Committee to send at least one Clergyman and two Laymen to represent such Committee, and with a recommendation that each Committee shall meet at some convenient time immediately before the General Meeting of the Society, that any necessary suggestions may be offered to the representatives of the Committees for their guidance at the General Meeting. And a Special General Meeting may be called at any time and in any place, when the President, or, in his absense, two or more Vice-Presidents, shall consider it desirable to appoint such special General Meeting.

VIII. The objects to which the attention of the Society shall be directed shall be, generally, those which have engaged the two great Church Societies in England for the Propagation of the Gospel, and for Promoting Christian

Knowledge, and none other.

IX. The following objects shall more particularly engage the attention of the Society, as soon as their means may enable them to afford such attention:

1. Supplies of Books and Tracts from the stores of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other, except in cases where other Books or Tracts, in strict conformity with the principles of the Established Church, and particularly adapted to local circumstances, shall first be carefully examined and approved by a Committee of revision, to be appointed by the General Committee, the approval of which General Committee shall be necessary in the next place, after which the books must likewise receive the written approbation of the Bishop.

Missionary visits to neglected and destitute places, under the direction of

3. Upholding by all possible and proper means, the Collegiate Establishments

Assistance to deserving young men desirous of being qualified for the Ministry of the Church, but requiring aid in pursuing their studies at the Collegiate Establishments at Windsor.

Aid to Sunday and other Schools, in which due attention is paid to in-struction in the principles of the Established Church.

Encouragement to the instruction and training of respectable Teachers for Sunday and Daily Schools.

Assistance to the erection or enlargement of Churches and Chapels belong-

ing to the Established Religion, in peculiar or extreme cases. To these objects, generally, the general contributions will be applied; while contributors who desire it may have their individual contributions scrupulously confined to any one or more of these objects. And as some members of the Church, who are not unmindful of the great spiritual wants in their own neighborhood, still feel constrained, in pious gratitude, for the blessings they enjoy, to allot something, however small, from the means with which a gracious Providence has blessed them, towards the spread of the glorious Gospel among the nations which still sit in darkness:-

X. This Society will gladly receive and forward to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, whatever sums may be given for the conversion and instruction of the Heathen, to which object such sums will be strictly confined

by the East India Committee of that Society.

XI. Books and Tracts will generally be on sale at cost and charges; and whenever in particular cases a deviation from this rule is desired, it must be considered by the Standing Committee, and only permitted when recommended by them and approved by the President, or, in his absence, by two or more of the Vice Presidents.

XII. All Meetings of the Society and of the Committees shall be opened and closed with the prayers used by the two Societies in England, adapted to

### APPENDIX II.

For the information of Local Committees applying to the Deposiotry of this Society for books and tracts, it is thought desirable to publish the following extract from the minutes of the General Committee, under date of May 7, 1841.

"The Chairman of the Sub-Committee to whom the concerns of the Depository were entrusted, reported several resolutions which had been agreed to by

the Sub-Committee, and are as follows:—
"I. Resolved,—That whereas the Diocesan Church Society can receive no books from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge except to the amount of the sum remitted with the order, no books can be supplied from the Depository of the Diocesan Church Society, unless the orders be accompanied with a remittance to the full amount.

"II. That all outstanding debts due the Depository be immediately called for, and until they be satisfactorily arranged, no further supply of books shall be

issued to those who are in arrears.

"III. That Mr. Maxwell be requested to forward their accounts without delay, to the several persons indebted to the Depository, together with a copy of

"That whereas the importation of books to the Depository must, by the present arrangement of the Book Fund, depend entirely upon the returns made for books supplied from the Depository, the Committee feel bound to approve of and adopt the resolutions of the Sub-Committee."
