## Church Services and Stated Meetings.

SABBATH SERVICES morning at 11 a. m. evening at 7 p. m. Sabbath School, at 3 p. m.

A SOCIAL PRAYER MEETING every Sabbath morning, at 10, 15 in the Session room, to which all are invited.

WEEKLY PRAYER MEETING every Wednesday evening at 7, 30.

STATED MEETINGS of session are held on the first Tuesday of every month, in the Session Room, at 7, 30 p. m.

STATED MEETINGS of the managers, are held in their room, on the second Monday of every month, at 8 p. m., and in the church on same evening, at 7, 30 p. m., for the purpose of allocating pews.

The ORDINANCE OF BAPTISM is dispensed on the first Sabbath of every month, at the commencement of the morning service, and on the first Wednesday of every month, at the commencement of the prayer meeting.

The ORDINANCE OF THE LORD'S SUPPER is dispensed on the last Sabbath of JANUARY, APRIL, JULY and OCTOBER.

A PREPARATORY SERVICE on the Friday immediately preceding each of the said sabbaths, at 7, 30 p. m.

SPECIAL COLLECTIONS for the poor are taken up on the FRIDAY EVENING and SABBATH MORNING, on every sacramental occasion, separate from, and unconnected with the envelope system, now in use for raising the ordinary revenue of the church.

The ANNUAL MEETING of the congregation, is held on the third Wednesday of January.

The JUVENILE TEMPERANCE ASSOCIATION meet in the Lecture Room monthly.

MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS leaving the church are requested to give notice to the Managers, in order that their sittings may be again allocated.

NOTICE.—When any person is desirous of becoming an adherent of the congregation, it is desirable that notice of name and residence be given to the Elder of the district in which he resides, he cannot expect to be visited or acknowledged by either the Pastor or Elders, unless it be known to the session who he is, and where he dwells. If any adherents are omitted in the subjoined list, it is because their residence is not known.

WHEN members change their residence they should give notice either to the Pastor or Elder of the district, otherwise they cannot reasonably expect to be visited or have their communion cards delivered.

P. S.—The younger members of families who are placed on the annexed roll as ADHERENTS are those at and over the age of 15.

# THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

—OF THE—

## Managing Committee of Knox Church,

—FOR THE—

YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1878.

---

Your Committee in presenting the Annual Report of the congregation, would give thanks to God for his continued goodness to us as a congregation, and for the measure of success vouchsafed during the past year.

By referring to the printed Annual Statement you will observe that the liberality of the congregation is shown by the increased amount of Sabbath Collections, these collections in 1877, after deducting poors' fund, were \$1,587.52, whilst this year they amount to \$1,720.17, or an increase of \$132.65, if to this is added the Thanksgiving Collection, we have the gratifying increase of \$936.81.

Your committee after careful consideration, and consultation with the session, have concluded to recommend to the congregation, a change in the mode of raising the revenue, viz :—to adopt the system of receiving from each member and adherent, a weekly sum, in envelopes provided for that purpose, in room of the usual collections and pew rents ; believing that this will be the means of getting many present sitters to contribute to the support of the Church, who have never done so by paying pew rent.

The ordinary expenditure of the Church for the current year will be about \$4,900.00, and it will be seen that there are liabilities, incurred for improvements, alterations and repairs, amounting to over \$2,000.00, which have been pressing upon us for the last year; in the present depressed state of all trades it will take all our energies to meet the ordinary expenditure, without endeavouring to pay off any of our indebtedness. And your committee would therefore recommend that as the mortgage for \$2,000.00 to John White Esq., becomes due this year, that it be paid off at once, and that money be borrowed for that purpose, as also to pay this \$2,000.00 floating indebtedness, and that a mortgage be given for \$4,000.00; this will make our mortgage indebtedness \$3,000.00, which can be easily reduced when business prosperity returns.

The managers whose term expires, are James Williamson, William Marshall, Robert Evans, John Stuart and Robert Dunlop, who are all eligible for re-election.

There is also a manager to be elected for one year, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Robert Wallace.

In conclusion, the managers desire the congregation to unite with them in seeking God's blessing on all that belongs to our christian work.

## Address from the Session.

*To the Members of Knox Church Congregation.*

DEAR BRETHEREN,—In addressing you through the pages of your Annual Reports, we desire to present you with some figures shewing the position of the congregation numerically during the past two years. In 1877 we admitted to the fellowship of the Church by profession of their faith, and by certificates from other Churches, 68, and in 1878, 67, making a total of admissions for the two years, 135.

When the Communicant's Roll was purged on 10th July, 1877, it was found that since January there had been disjoined by certificate and death, 18. As at 22nd January, 1878, there had been disjoined 14, and as at 19th December last, by certificate and death, 36, and 1 suspended; making a total from January 1877, till 19th December 1878, of 69, and shewing a net increase of admissions over dismissals of 66. Whilst there has thus been a small *actual* increase in the membership during these two years, we have to state that there has been a large *nominal* decrease. For many years our Communicant's Roll has been burdened with a great many names of parties whom the session suspected had long since removed from the City or left the Church, and regarding whom we had no means of ascertaining, until we obtained an increase of Elders. After careful examination we have dropped (during the past two years) the names of 123, and now our Roll, which as at 10th July 1877, contained 564 names, is reduced to a bona-fide membership of 483, in full communion as at 19th December last.

There have also been admitted as members of the Church, by the ordinance of Baptism, in 1877-26, and in 1878-32 children of members of this congregation, and 1 adult, in all 59. From the foregoing it appears that during the past two years we have had a slight actual increase.

Regarding spiritual progress it is not our province to speak so definitely, seeing we can only judge by the outward profession and conduct, which are sometimes deceptive. We have cause however to thank God and take courage. Our Moderator has from time to time reported very favorably regarding the spiritual state of many of those whom he has examined and we have admitted during these two years; as for example on 25th April last, when he reported regarding thirteen applicants by profession, "that he had received especial encouragement from the conversations held with them." As to the spiritual advancement of our Brothers and Sisters in Christ in the congregation, we feel it to be our duty to refer to the very able teachings and expositions of Scripture from the pulpit by our beloved and devoted Pastor, and to say that we know they have been blessed for the growth and expansion of vital christianity in the souls of many. As to the conversion of sinners, we would hope that the many faithful and earnest appeals, also made from the pulpit, have not been in vain, but have been carried home, by the effectual working of God's Spirit, to the heart's of some, causing them to flee from the wrath to come. We long however to see signs of greater spiritual vitality in the congregation, and to be the recipients of a more copious outpouring of the Holy Spirit, so that God's people amongst us may be revived and quickened, and many more may be added to the Church of such as shall be saved.

In conclusion,—As the Master told the disciples, to go into all the world and preach the gospel, and added, “beginning at Jerusalem,” so we believe that, whilst it is our duty to send the gospel to the ends of the earth, it is our first duty to extend the invitations thereof to the neglected in our own City ; and believing that—from the geographical position of Knox Church—the north west portion, lying north of the Great Western Railway, (where there are many of the lapsed classes of the community) naturally falls to the care of our Church, we have for some time past been directing our attention to the practicability of Mission Work in that locality by our Session. After careful inquiry and much deliberation on the subject, we have secured the use of a room for Mission purposes from Mr. Barr, No. 315 James Street, North ; and have resolved to hold a meeting for the young each Sabbath morning, and for adults each Sabbath and Thursday evenings, and to endeavor to obtain the services of a few devoted lady workers, to visit amongst the lapsed classes in the district, with the view of securing their attendance at the Thursday evening meetings. We have appointed three members of Session to superintend the work, and our Pastor has offered to take the Thursday evening meeting when convenient for him. We know that if we go in our own strength, this work will prove a miserable failure. We would therefore look to the great Head of the Church for his blessing upon our undertaking, and for the outpouring of his Holy Spirit, and we hereby ask your sympathy, support and prayers, for the success of this Mission.

And now, “beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord.”

## FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

—OF—

## Knox Church Sabbath School,

—FOR THE—

YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1878.

The report of last years operations is an encouraging one, and one which is well calculated to stimulate teachers and scholars alike, to fresh endeavors and renewed determination, to reach forward to higher attainments than ever before.

Our average attendance during the year 1878 was 277 in all, composed of 138 Girls, 104 Boys, 17 male teachers and 18 female teachers.

The singing of the children, during the past year, has greatly improved, under the leadership of Mr. Johnson, and this important exercise is made a leading feature of the school programme, by the heartiness with which the scholars perform their part in ascribing praise to the great head of the Church.

The Thursday evening meetings of the teachers for the study of the lesson were kept up till the beginning of December, when it was decided to substitute the latter part of the

Wednesday evening prayer meetings, thus giving Dr. James three quarters of an hour to devote exclusively to the study of the lessons for the coming sabbath.

As each teacher is invited to propose questions on any part of the lesson they may wish explained, and as the meetings are intended to be perfectly free and informal, the teachers can here combine all the benefits of the Thursday evening meeting with the advantage of the ripe scholarship and experience of our worthy pastor, and we would here urge upon all who wish to come to their classes thoroughly prepared to impart the lesson to others, not to fail in regularly attending the Wednesday evening teachers meetings. During the past year the sum of \$51.00 has been expended in the purchase of new books for the library. Great care has been taken in their selection, and they are of a character calculated to improve the minds and morals of the young, so parents and guardians may rest assured that none but the best class of books will be given out. The number of volumes at present is 600, of which 107 were added during the last twelve months. The number of pupils who make use of the library is 315, of whom 208 are constant readers, 8165 books passed through the librarian's hands during the past year.

The Treasurer's report shows a balance on hand of \$138.60, after providing for all disbursements.

The total amount collected was 219.05, out of which we paid for Library \$51.00, for Hymn Books \$12.00, for Sundries \$17.45, and the balance of 138.60 falls to be distributed among the mission fields of the church.

The monthly sermons to the young by the pastor are still kept up and largely attended, the collections on these occasions going to the library fund.

In conclusion, we have only to congratulate the school on the measure of success with which the past year has been blessed, and to earnestly desire a continuance of the divine favor and guidance.

In summing up the labours of another year, we are thankful for the measure of success which in spite the heavy cloud of financial depression that at the present time enshrouds the business world, has attended the appeals of our members to the friends of this institution. During the past year there has been collected the sum of seven hundred and eighty three dollars and sixty cents, (783.60) and notwithstanding that we lost some of the collectors appointed a year ago, this satisfactory result bears evidence to the thorough organization and practical energy displayed by the gentlemen who subscribed their names as collectors twelve months ago. Realizing the claims of missionary enterprise upon the liberality of all who call themselves christians, they have during the past year waited upon the members and adherents of our church, and the aggregate of the small, (in many cases even trifling) amounts collected from time to time, has left us the sum of four hundred and forty-five dollars (\$445.00,) to be distributed in the mission fields of our
