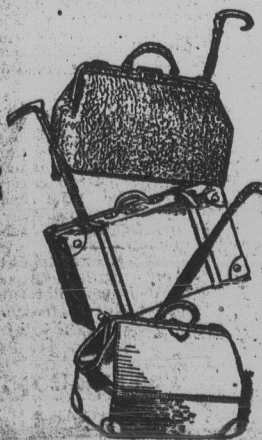

OPENING OF LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Some Thoughts for the Electors to Digest

Some forty-six representatives from the different counties of New Brunswick are supposed to be here again to talk for five or six weeks about how a little over a million dollars shall be spent in keeping up the public services of our little corner of the Dominion. And in addition to these members there is a small army of attendants and clerks besides those who mark time all the year, to assist them in this undertaking.

There are many business houses, many manufacturers, who carry on larger financial transactions every year and whom we do not hear of at all. They have a system of business that requires men to give value for the money they receive and if they do not, they do not linger on the payroll.

Governments are run in a different fashion. Jobs go very far in the main, ability is a secondary consideration. The results of the year's work is awaited always with some interests but if the government spends more than it earns there is no consternation such as would enter a business house; there is no determined effort made to reduce expenses and keep within their income; on the contrary they are apt to lend a willing ear to further demands and trust to luck that the territorial revenue may be greater another year or that providence will step in and call for some of the richer citizens so that the post office may make up the difference. And if this does not happen, the banks are willing to lend. It is easier to pay interest than principal and deficits and many other things are finally cast in oblivion behind a bond issue and the future generations left to look after the extravagance of living men.

Thus it is that the deficit acknowledged by Premier Fleming and his government of \$560,000 on the year that closed October 31st last does not seem to have made any deep impression upon the members that support him at any rate. And the people are apparently equally careless about so momentous a matter, for only a day or two after the session began some hundreds from all over New Brunswick met right here in the capital and formulated demands that call for greater expenditure in order to give encouragement and assistance to the project of getting more people to live with us.

This is apparently the day of easy money and if the people are not panic stricken soon at the prospect of direct taxation, over expenditure is likely to continue, the debt increased and interest charges in proportion. Even today there is a rumor that the revenue may be less. The lumber cut this year does not promise to be so large and that will mean less money to spend. If there were any signs of decreased expenditure this would not be a serious matter but rather one for congratulation for there has been far more lumber cut annually than the crown lands will stand and the end of it all must come too soon.

The government has a large following and an almost overwhelming majority and yet they have shown no disposition to reduce expenses.

How different are the protestations of a party when in opposition to their performances when in power. How economical they promise to be, how careless they become.

This government has been fortunate. They came in on the tide of greater revenues. There is more money from everywhere. Good times have prevailed since the panic of 1907 and 1908. Interest rates are lower. Then there are the increased allowances sought and fought for during many years and finally obtained by Fugley and the Liberals—to be spent, some say squandered, by Hazen and Fleming and their Tory followers.

These used to say when in opposition that it was a crime to spend more than was received—yes, they went further and even said that something should be paid every year upon the debt, that bridges and public works should be paid for out of current revenue. That was sacred music for them then—they are playing ragtime tunes now and there are plenty of camp followers to join in the chorus.

So it is no wonder with structural superintendents, foremen, inspectors, scalars and other public officials grafting at every town, that the expenses are becoming enormous. Every department is costing more. Instead of reducing staffs here and there as might well be done and as would be done by any business house, they are being increased and their salaries are increasing. The cost of government like the cost of living is getting greater and though the revenues are nearly half a million more than the Liberals had in 1907 the Fleming government comes to the House of Assembly with an acknowledged deficit of \$560,000.

What do you think of it? Even if many of you who read this are thorough going Conservatives will your politics stand for that? Put as the opposition point out, that is not all. There were many bills incurred during the year that were laid aside—just piled up until after October 31st. They were debts just the same and had Mr. Fleming wanted to start right, had he wanted to be as honest as his large penitence would encourage us to think he might be, he should have added those accounts together and said: "In addition to this \$260,000 we owe so many thousands for work done and services performed before the close of the fiscal year."

Now if he were the president of a big business corporation that is what he would say to his secretary treasurer. The stockholders in his company must have the fullest information and if they had any money on hand or owed any bills they must have a statement of them so that they could know just where they were. The people of New Brunswick are surely stockholders in Premier Fleming's government company. Every elector has a share in the concern and they have a right to a correct and proper report from their directors viz the members of the government.

We all know what would happen the directors of a business company if they failed to make a full and exact report to their shareholders. The law is most particular upon those points and the penalties are severe.

Now will anyone tell me where there is any difference in the moral obligation and what right the government has to keep the full knowledge from the people.

A ROMANTIC IRISH MARRIAGE

Claim That Only One Witness Being Present It Was Null and Void According to the Roman Catholic Church.

(Publishers Press News Service) — In the Probate Court, before Justice McLean, on application for a decree annulling the marriage of Usher vs. Usher was heard the case brought by the petitioner, William A. Usher, of the family residence is at Westwell, Limerick County, Galway.

Mr. Serjeant Mortimer, who appeared for the respondent, Mrs. Usher, stated in his petition that on April 24, 1910, at 10 o'clock at night he was married to Mary Usher, "now falsely called Mary Usher" in a bed room in his house. They are Roman Catholics and the ceremony was performed by a Roman Catholic priest in the presence of one witness. The petitioner now says that the marriage was null and void by reason of the fact that only one witness was present and that the ceremony was not carried out according to the rites, regulations, and ceremonies of the Roman Catholic Church or according to law. The respondent denied that the marriage was null and void for any of the reasons stated by the petitioner.

In a replying affidavit the petitioner said that the contract of marriage was not accompanied by a valid religious ceremony as was required by law, that it was subject to and on the express condition that it should be according to the rites of the Roman Catholic Church and on the express condition that the Roman Catholic Church should permit of the same being valid.

INDIAN PRINCE TO BE SPANKED

Delhi. — The Gokwar of Baroda, an Indian prince, is to be spanked, figuratively, for insulting King George of England at the Durbar ceremonies. The Indian potentate, who has long been hostile to British rule, attended the Durbar in casual dress instead of robes of state. When the time came to pay homage to the king, he gave a perfunctory bow and turned his back on the king. He has been forced to apologize and further steps will be taken to curb him.

A GREAT PAINTER'S START IN LIFE

How a Young Girl Inspired Ziem, the Great Portrait Painter, To Get Out of Himself.

Paris. — Ziem, sitting cross-legged on a table beside a window, worked as a tailor's assistant for several years. His life was thrown into a new channel by the arrival in the court yard of an Italian family in which there was a handsome, auburn-haired girl who sang as a ballad singer. The father played a hurdy-gurdy, the mother made lace and the boy performed divers gymnastic feats. The girl had a fine voice. Her father wanted a new coat and asked the sister Ziem to make it and Mme. Ziem to take in a part of the family as lodgers. She took in the boy and girl.

The latter lifted the future painter out of himself with her Venetian songs and accounts of the glorious city to which she hoped soon to return. Her name was Caterina. When she went away Ziem felt miserable. He lost spirit and could not shake off the sort of paralysis that had seized on all his faculties. At last he determined — with the help of his needle and his talent, as he thought, of portrait painter and violinist — to make his way to Venice. They answered to his hopes of going down by water to Marsellies, for he knew no geography, and thence to Rome. It would be now curious to see the portraits of Sane and Rhone captains of barges, wine and wood rats that he did for them, in lieu of passage money. In Rome he got in with painters and tourists. The former helped him to enlarge his artistic culture, and the latter look him about as a guide. But Caterina and Venice lay on his heart, and he took the bold resolution of going on foot to the city of his dreams. He so fell in love with it the first day he went on the tide that he did not break his heart when he heard that Caterina had not turned up, but had gone to Paris, to serve as a model.

- 3—If such other act is proposed is it the intention of the government to submit the same for the approval of the people before put into force?

Hon. Mr. Borden: The answer to each of these three questions is "Yes."

CONTINUATION OF MANCHUS UNLIKELY

Whatever the Outcome of Negotiations Yuan Shi Kai Will Probably Be Ruler of Celestial Land of Asia

(Publishers Press News Service)

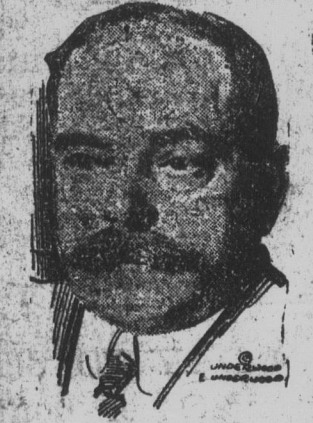
Shanghai. — Promise of peace in China becomes more definite today with the announcement that all six of the great Powers, Great Britain, Japan, the United States, Russia, France and Germany, are united in a co-operative effort to assist Dr. Wu Ting Fang and Tang Shao Yi in their negotiations. There was rejoicing today when it was learned that the representatives of the six Powers were preparing to offer formally their assistance for the speedy conclusion of an understanding of the negotiations of the present emergency.

It is clearly understood that this action by the powers is taken in the most friendly manner.

The negotiations between Wu Ting Fang and Tang Shao Yi opened with surprising smoothness and there was a complete absence of any sense of strain which might have seriously impeded the diplomatic progress of the conference. It is unmistakably evident, however, that the continuation of Manchu rule, even as concerns the imperial throne at Peking, is considered unlikely by either side. In this connection much significance is attached to the statement of Tang Shao Yi that he does not represent the throne, but rather the Frontiers. Coupled with Wu Ting Fang's early insistence upon the establishment of a republic, this is taken to mean that Yuan Shi Kai is prepared to concede the ending of the dynasty.

Even though the present dynasty is ousted, the Premier evidently hopes to retain the imperial form of government, possibly with the present Emperor designated as the first ruler of a new Chinese dynasty and with Yuan Shi Kai as regent.

STANDARD'S VICE PRESIDENT

New York. — The election of Mr. William R. Bemis as vice president and director of the Standard Oil Co. of New York has brought into greater prominence a career which has been remarkable in the annals of the oil world.

Mr. Bemis was born in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1864, and completed his academic education there, entering the service of the Standard Oil Co. in 1882. He organized the statistical department of the company and became interested in foreign trade relations.

In 1893 Mr. Bemis married Miss Frances Ford in Cleveland, and now resides in Larchmont, New York. He is an enthusiastic sportsman and possesses a unique collection of trophies gathered from all parts of the world.

CANARY IN CAGE HELPS SAVE MINERS

DECREASED BUDGET FOR GERMANY NAVY

Germany Will Spend \$200,000 Less Next Year on Her Navy — What Is the Reason for the Decrease?

Berlin. — The Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung publishes a summary of the imperial budget for 1912. The total expenditure is given as 2,819,000,000 marks (approximately \$704,840,000). 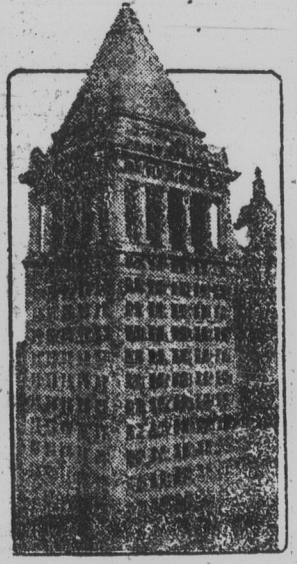

be spent, a decrease of 798,000 marks (\$199,500). The naval ordinary and non-recurrent expenditure shows an increase of 25,542,000 marks (\$6,385,500), but the extraordinary expenditure for the navy is decreased by 26,340,000 marks (\$6,585,000). The army increase is due to the larger peace footing voted in the Reichstag during the last session. The interest on the national debt calls for 32,792,000 marks (\$8,196,000) less.

MORGAN'S MILLIONS IN VAULT AT TOP OF 42-STORY BUILDING

New York. — This picture shows the top stories of the new Bank of Commerce building in New York. J. Pierpont Morgan has picked out for his new offices the forty-second floor,



Immediately beneath the odd-looking pyramid on top. The pyramid will be used by Morgan and his banking house as a safety vault for the storage of millions in gold cash, stocks and bonds. If this idea of storing wealth high in the air becomes at all general it may lead to a new type of daring bank robber, operating by aeroplane.

A TREASURE HUNT IN AUCKLAND

After Four Previous Attempts to Recover Lost Gold, a New Expedition Has Started Out on the Hunt.

Auckland, N. Z. — Captain N. C. Sorensen, formerly employed as diver by the Auckland Harbor Board, purpose in conjunction with a partner in Dunedin, to fit out an expedition, to cost about \$50,000, to proceed to the Auckland Islands to endeavor to recover the treasure believed to have been lost in the General Grant wrecked there in 1866. Four previous attempts to recover this treasure were unsuccessful. Captain Sorensen believes that the treasure was through attempting the work from the seaward side. His idea is to land an expedition on the landward side and cut a road across to the wreck, and operate by means of derricks erected on the cliffs.

The General Grant was a sailing ship of about 1,300 tons. She left Melbourne for London, laden with valuable produce of the Ballarat goldfields, on May 3, 1866. Just ten days later she struck hidden rocks off the Auckland Islands, and the majority of those on board were lost. The survivors experienced hunger and cold before they were discovered in the month of March, two years later, by Captain Oliver, of the ship Hesperus, who took them on to the shore.

Report of School

There will be ushered in on Dominion Day, in the year nineteen hundred and sixteen, the Semi-Centennial of Canadian Confederation—the jubilee of the Canadian people. The outstanding importance of the event and the adequate marking of it by Canadians should now begin to possess the minds of our people and lead them to plan for its celebration on a scale proportioned to the growing greatness of Canada.

We are not a demonstrative people. Those without the borders noting this have deemed us non-patriotic. From time to time, however, the deep, strong current of national sentiment has risen against some great obstruction and demonstrated to the world that patriotism is a force in Canada and as such demands consideration and respect.

No one may read the pre-Confederation debates without being deeply stirred by the sentiments uttered by our ever-to-be-remembered Fathers of Confederation. They employed their great talents for a most noble purpose when they sank party and parochial differences, as well as racial and sectarian ones, and together fought valiantly for a principle that alone could make those divided provinces great and enduring.

Surely the greatness of the measures of our own "Fathers" will compare favourably with those of the other Fathers of a European Confederacy. Surely, too, it is the highest form of economy to preserve human lives and to conserve national treasure.

In 1917 let us witness to the world that we desire to magnify the triumph of a great idea won by clear intellects and eloquent tongues in the long ago.

Loss to operators, estimating profits of production and interest on investment at 6 per cent, daily, \$700,000.

Loss to railroading, shipping, to employees in allied and dependent industries will be almost beyond computation in the course of two or three weeks.

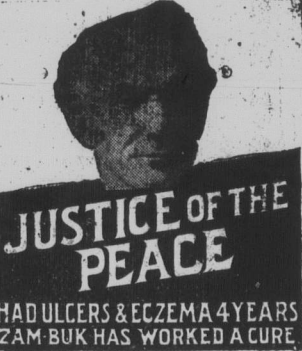

WHAT N. B. CAN OFFER THE IMMIGRANT

Some Suggestions to the Immigration Convention by H. H. Stuart of Newcastle.

In the discussion in the Immigration Convention in Fredericton on the 8th instant on the question, "What New Brunswick has to offer as a home for the immigrant," Ald. H. H. Stuart of Newcastle, spoke in part as follows:

The first aim of the country should be to keep its own people at home. Acquisition of land by its young people should be made as easy as possible, the colonizing methods of the French speaking people of Quebec and Northern New Brunswick being worthy of careful consideration.

In looking for immigrants we should not select people of different color, for they will not assimilate with us and would be a source of division and weakness rather than of unity and strength. Neither should we go to much warmer climates, for their people can stand our conditions much better than we can accommodate ourselves to theirs, and their settling here would reduce the area inhabited by people of our civilization and temperament. But if we must have immigrants, let them be of the kindred peoples inhabiting the British Isles, Germany, Scandinavia, etc., and in any case, men of the temperate zone, and of the same color and, as nearly as possible, of the same grade of civilization as ourselves.

To the immigrant New Brunswick can offer an invigorating temperate climate, good land, well watered, well worked and, from In Douglstown and Ayco, and other places on the Miramichi, 20 bushels of wheat can be raised to the acre—a better yield than the average on West. Fruit can be grown in every county, and mixed farming precludes any possibility of famine.

While we have no gold mines, our deposits of iron, coal, gypsum, granite, gas etc., make this province as wealthy from the standpoint of the miner as most any other territory in the world of like area.

New Brunswick has manhood suffrage (I trust it will soon have adult suffrage) and the immigrant will find here, in theory at least, equal voting privileges.

New Brunswick has an excellent school system limited only by the scarcity of people in many of the school districts. Where the pupils are numerous enough and the teachers are as good as those of the rural districts of any country of Europe. If the vacancies in our villages can be filled up, either by immigrants or natives, the schools can all be brought up to standard at a high standard of efficiency.

The recent and rapid extension of the rural free delivery of mail matter and of the rural telephone system should make life in the country easier and more desirable. The railway accommodations fairly good.

What more do we need to hold our young people and attract the immigrants?

As an immediate preliminary to greater and more sweeping reconstruction, we should have:

New highways. These, it appears, the Dominion Government is about to assist us in securing.

A few more railways to serve as connecting links, as, for instance, lines from Newcastle to Fredericton, Longville to Richibucto, Gileston to Minto.

Nationalization of the telephone system. The telephone companies are quite willing to put in new telephones in cities, towns and larger villages, but under private ownership the more remote settler, who has as much right to the good things and conveniences of life as the one who lives nearer the front, becomes discriminated against and who can blame him for leaving?

The extension of rural mail delivery to all sections.

The death of Miss Mary F. Mair, daughter of John Mair, took place last Monday. Deceased had been confined to her room for some time and was not making much improvement. The deceased lady was very highly esteemed in a large circle of friends, all who knew her feeling her loss very keenly.

Besides her father, Mr. John Mair, she leaves three sisters, Mrs. Donald McLean, of Campbellton; Mrs. Alex. Miller, of Athol; and Mrs. Young, now in Korea; three brothers, Edgar, of Woodstock, Douglas, in Vancouver, and Jack in Idaho. Rev. T. P. Drumm conducted the services at the house and grave. The sympathy of the community is extended to the sorrowing father and family.

The elimination of extortionate express charges by the introduction of a system of parcel post.

The removal of all legal restrictions upon the establishment of co-operative trading, which is so successfully carried on in Britain, Belgium and elsewhere.

A better system of taxation. Let land values, rather than improvements, incomes and polls, bear the burden of taxation. Let people once understand that while idle land will be taxed too heavily to allow it to be held without being improved, a man will not be taxed extra upon every little improvement he adds to his estate, then both natives and foreigners will desire to settle and make homes for themselves among us. The close settlement made possible by the land tax would, indirectly, raise the standard of the schools.

With the above improvements joined to the resources and facilities we already possess, our province would begin to prosper and to take a leading place among the communities of the earth.
