A GOOD APPOINTMENT

The temperance people of New Brunswick will now see how unfounded and how grossly unfair was the charge made by the Murray government press and speakers that the opposition would not enforce the prohibition law. Ex-Premier Murray himself stands condemned, for reeatedly on the public platform always safe to make unfounded week. charges. Mr. Murray did not dream that his government would be beaten, and he felt quite safe. How does he feel now? The Foster government has named as chief inspector the nominee of the Dominion Alliance, a gentleman who has been the trusted and honored agent of the Alliance in this province and who has been engaged in labors connected with probibition in other provinces as well as in New Brunswick. Nor will the government interfere with the work of the new inspector. A member of the old government is said to have intimated that he would expect to be dictator in his constituency, but the Foster government proposes to enforce the law, and to

It is now the duty of all good citizens also to get behind the inspector, and to do their utmost to make New Brunswick bone dry. If it is found the law needs strengthening, that can be done when the people is clear and urgent. The law should be enforced to the hilt and the storm centre will not be around the saloon men of today, but the boot-leggers and dive keepers of the period after the first of May.-Times.

Three years ago this month, Mr. L. A. Dugal rose in his place in the Legislature and preferred grave charges against Mr. J. K. Flemming, the then Premier. He proved his charges to the hilt. Flemming was forced out of the government and the government and the government was itself forced out by the electorate. Now after a lapse of three years, Mr. Dugal returns to Fredericton and is sworn in as a member of a new administration. Every friend of good government must rejoice that Premier Foster in forming his cabinet took cognizance of the great public service rendered by the man from Madawaska.



With a view to getting actual figures under the average conditions in New Brunswick, a careful record has been made at the Dominion Experimental Station, Fredericton, for the past two seasons with an acre of land set apart for this particular purpose.

Neither rent of land nor depreciation of machinery was included in the calculation, for these two are items that are largely in the hands of the individual grower. As a general rule, however, it would be fair to charge as rent, 10% of the value of the land, and special potato machinery will depreciate from 25 per cent to 50 per cent per year if used steadily for ten days each season. In 1915, the depreciation of the potato digger alone, used at the Experimental Station, was \$6 per

In 1915, the acre was planted with Green Mountain, Irish Cob bler and Empire State. Seed, cultural operations and harvesting cost in all \$67.93. Eighty barrels of 165 pounds each of marketable potatoes were obtained and sold at \$1.75 per barrel making a profit over cost of production of 90c per barrel. Seven barrels of culls were sold for 3.50, so that the total profit for the acre amounted to \$75.50.







Plaster Rock, N. B. Dear Sir: Reference to bulletin 239 on potatoes by C. A. Zavitz, B. S. A. of the Ontario Agriculture College, page 48, just to hand shows that after experiments conducted at Guelph, Ont, for five years, the average results give an increase of 23 barrels per acre per annum in favor of freshly cut seed potatoes which were coated with land-plaster, or gypsum, over those which were left untreated; also, that this was superior to slaked time, the percentage of crop marketable being higher.

Experiments carried on on through the cooperation of the Experimental Union in some twenty other places throughout Ontario obtaining 97 good reports therefrom in the five years during whice the test was being made disposes of any argument as to soil conditions at Guelph being especially favorable to his experiment, and we kdow also that the section already is full of lime, there being a number of lime-kilns in operation a a short distance from the farm.

You can cut the potato seed one month before planting and coat them with Tobique Gypsum Lime; it is this which causes the seed to heat and rot in the ground. The longer you keep the lite off the seed in the ground, the larger the potato will grow. Notice when digging; if you find the sped

still alive, you find large potatoes. The above, only confirms what I have said as to the value of the plaster

rock deposit in the province from an agricultural standpoint. Can we not do something to impress this view upon the farmers of New Brunswick and get them to make a larger use of this material?


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
