
NEWMAN CLARK IS SENTENCED TO DIE ON MARCH

Prisoner Displayed No Emotion When Capital Punishment Was Amounced

Andover, N. B., Dec. 5.-Newma Clark, of Four Falls, was sentenced vesterday to be hanged on March 1, Bell on March 25 last.

The sentence was pronounced by Judge Chandler immediately after the opening of the court. Clark displayed no emotion on hearing the sentence, and smiled as he left the court room His mother was present.

Sometime during the night the pris oner asked the witness what he thought of his condition and witness told him he thought he could not live. Later that night his condition seemed improved and he said, "Take me to a good hospital with a good doctor and get a good lawyer, Jones would put up a good fight." When told that he might recover the prisoner said to witness that if he did recover he would only be hanged. Prisoner told witness that he first met Phoebe Bell at Mrs. Woods', where his little boy was board-The child called Mrs. Woods "Mama" and Phoebe Bell said she would like to have the child call her 'Mama." This was the first converation the prisoner had with Miss Bell. The prisoner when asked by the wit-

ness on the night of the tragedy why he murdered the girl said he could not help it and that he had to do it. Dr. Chapman of Grand Falls on being questioned answered that in his opinion there was nothing in the evi

dence to show that Newman Clark was incapable of distinguishing right from wrong at the time of the murder. The defence asked to be allowed a special rebuttal which is being con sidered by the judge. The court ad

journed at 6 p.m.


