Before any Salmon net shall be used, the owner or person interested in such net shall cause a memorandum in writing, setting forth the name of the owner or person interested, the length of the net, and its intended location, to be filed with the local Fishery Overseer, who, if no valid objection exist, may, in accordance with instructions from the Department of Marine and Fisheries, issue a Fishery License for the same; and any net used before such License has been obtained, and any net used in excess or evasion of the description contained in such License, shall be deemed to be illegal and liable to forfeiture, together with the fish caught therein, and the owner or person using the same shall be also subject to fines and costs under the Fisheries Act.

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
