


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



LOYALTY OF INDIA TO BRITISH **CROWN PUT TO THE ACID TEST**

But Has Proved to be Still the Dominant Quality of All Races in India, Says Correspondent, in Reviewing the Results of the Prince of Wales' Tour — Political Situation Grows More Acute.

London, March 12.—The British Government has taken full military precautions to cope with possible out-breaks of violence attending the arrest of Mahatma Ghandi, chief Nationalist leader. Twenty-two Indian tribesmen were killed and 29 wounded, says a Reuter despatch from Delhi, when Govern-ment troops repulsed an attack by several thousand natives, under a chieftain named Moti Lal, in the Idar district, on March 3. The tribesmen were armed with bows and arrows, guns, spears, swords and various other forms of native defence. The tribesmen are


