

> NARROW **ESCAPES**

The Speed and Force of the Tornado Was Terrific-Elora Also Suffers.

Amherstburg, Ont., May 28. - About o'clock yesterday afternoon a small tornado swept everything before it for a width of about 60 rods, passing through the district about half a mile south of here, going in a northerly and easterly direction. 


