A Great Financial Collapse. London, Nov. 1.—The collapse of the Liberator Building Society simultaneously London, Nov. 1.—The collapse of the Liberator Building Society simultaneously with the downfall of the London and General Bank is likely to prove one of the most gigantic financial sensations of the generation. The official figures presented yesterday by the receiver show that there are absolutely no assets, while the liabilities are very heavy. The directors of both establishments are accused of liming their own pockets at the expense of the shareholders, and threats of criminal prosecutions are freely made. The Liberator Society owed the shareholders, 23,313,000, while the reserve fund was only £90,000 and the assets are probably valueless, as £3,188,286 had been lent to three companies which are now in liquidation. There are virtually no free assets, there being only £50,000 in sight with which to meet a deficiency of £3,000,000. There is reason to believe that Mr. J. Spencer Balfour, M.P., the vice-president and real head of the concern, together with the several directors, have pocketed hundreds of thousands of pounds in the shape of commissions, which are now alleged to be illegal.

Hay from Canada.

London, Nov. 2.—A week or two since Sir Charles Tupper addressed a circular letter from the high commissioner's effice to a carefully selected list of firms dealing in hay, in which, in view of the high price likely to prevail during the next few months, he asked whether a ready market existed for Canadian hay, and for any suggestions as to the lines upon which such a trade might be developed.

In reply Massrs. Henderson, of Westminster, write that, in their judgment, Canadian hay of good quality is worth 80 shillings a ton, and that there is practically an unlimited demand for goods of best character.

Appalling Accident!

Railway Collision in England and Twenty Killed.

Large Number of Passengers More or Less Injured.

Pitiable Scene at the Wreck-Fire Adds to the Horror - Several Bodies Burned Beyond the Possi-bility of Identification.

London, Nov. 2 .- An appalling railway accident occurred early this morning near Thirsk, in Yorkshire, by which twenty perwere killed and a large number in-

The express train which leaves Edin burgh every evening for London was run-ning at full speed as it approached Thirsk, when ahead of it appeared a heavily-laden oods train. The engineer of the express train re

goods train.

The engineer of the express train reversed his engine and put on the brakes, but the momentum of the heavy express was too great and it dashed into the goods train, making a most terrible wreck.

To add to the horror the carriages caught fire and were soon destroyed. A large number of persons from near-by places were soon at the scene and did everything possible to extricate the dead and injured. The burning cars greatly hampered their efforts, but had it not been for their bravery the loss of life would have been much greater.

The scene at the wreck was pitiable. Some of the bodies taken out of the debris had been burned beyond all semblance to humanity. The clothing had been destroyed and in some cases the jewelry worn had been melted by the intense heat. This will render the identification of the dead in some cases extremely difficult, if not impossible.

A wrecking train was dispatched to the scene as soon as the fact of the disaster became known. A number of physicians

scene as soon as the fact of the disaster became known. A number of physicians were carried to the wreck, and they at once devoted themselves to relieving the suffering of the injured.

The railway officials state that nine intead of twenty persons were killed.

A large number of cattle owners were present. Ex-Ald. Frankland, presi-dent, occupied the chair, and explained his conviction that the disease which had dent, occupied the chair, and explained his conviction that the disease which had been discovered among cattle sent to Scotland was not genuine contagious pleuropneumonia, but a form of bronchitis with which cattle are often attacked in the cold weather on being landed from a warm rhip where often the air is extremely close. He was sorry the Veterinary Department of the Privy Conncil in Britain had seen fit to order the slaughter of the cattle, and believed that Dr. McEachren and Dr. Smith, aided by Dominion live stock men, would succeed in demonstrating that no contagious pleuro-pneumonia existed in Canada. After some animated discassion the following resolution was unanimously carried:

LADIES LEFT THE CHURCH.

LADIES LEFT THE CHURCH.

Bishop Fewler's Description of Death
Was Teo Chastly for Them.

New York, Nov. 2.—Bishop Charles
Fowler, who is known among the Methodist as the "Prince of Pulpit Orators," presided in St. James' M. E. Church, One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street and Madison avenue, Sunday morning. His theme was "The Resurrection." During his sermon he depicted death in such ghastly forms that many of the large congregation left the church in cears.

In speaking of the resurrection the minister referred to death and described it as a grim, ghastly and fleshless specter that paraded through the streets at all hours, unseen but always about, coming at unexpected times and stealing away loved ones in spite of the physician's skill.

Mr. Fowler gave so many ghastly details that there was a distinct feeling of unrest and dissatisfaction manifest among the ladies present. To many the theme was distressing, for it recalled painful memories. There was a flutter of handkerchiefs in all parts of the church, but Bishop Fowler either could not, or would not, see the effect his words were producing upon the congregation.

Matters reached a climax when fourteen ladies and two men rose from their seats and walked from the church, when the bishop brought his peroration to a speedy close. After the sermon the members of the church severely criticised Mr. Fowler for not changing his method of procedure, when it was apparent to all that his dramatic description of death was distressing to most of his congregation.

He talked incoheretly, and at times declared he was King d Siam. His attorney had him brought before the insanity commissioners, and he was sent to the asylum.

This was four months ago. Last week he was released and suit was at once brought against him. Witnesses told the story of his vagaries, the chief winess being his wife. Then his counsel proposed to put Livernash into the hypnotistate in court and let him live over again the incident of the night of the attempted murder. SENATOR BOULTON continues his crusade against the policy of high taxation, upon which within the last few months he has taken an enlightened position. In a recent

letter he says:

"The most profitable trade we have today is our cattle trade. Does protection foster that? No! The purchasing power of free trade England gives us such good prices for our cattle that while in 1872 we had not yet developed the trade, in 1891 nearly \$9,000,000 was realized. Protection has not assisted that trade. Rather the reverse. It has reduced the value of the proceeds of the sale of our animals. We do not receive money for our cattle. We receive goods, and at the port of Montreal the British purchaser returns us \$100 value in goods for every \$100 worth of cattle which leave that port, but under our protective policy those goods are subject to a tax of 24 per cent, and the farmer when he lays out his \$100 has to pay 24 per cent. additional on his purchases, and to that extent the value of his cattle trade is reduced. The same condition applies to our \$9,000,000 export of cheese.

We have had it publicly charged against this judge that before the votes were counted, he asserted that the candidate not to his liking should never ret his seat.
